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CHAPTER 1

INTRODUCTION

Delhi is an old city that has slowly expanded over the years to acquire its present status of metropolis. According to census 2011, the total population of Delhi was 167.53 lakh spread over an area of 1483 Sq. km. The population density of Delhi was 11297 persons per Sq. Km. in 2011, which is the highest in India amongst all states / union territories. People come from all over India for livelihood and settle in Delhi being the economic hub for development.

In Delhi, health care facilities are being provided by both government & non-government organizations. Besides, local self governance agencies such as Municipal Corporations of Delhi, New Delhi Municipal Council and Delhi Cantonment Board are instrumental in delivery of health care facilities in their respective areas. Various agencies of Government of India such as Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, CGHS, ESI, Railways are also providing health care to general public as well as to identified beneficiaries. Amongst the government organizations, Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) of Government of NCT of Delhi is the major agency related to health care delivery.

This Directorate actively participates in delivery of health care facilities and co-ordinates with other Govt. & Non-Government Organizations for health related activities for the improvement of health of citizens of Delhi. Services under Directorate of Health Services cover medical & public health. This Directorate plays the key role in co-ordination and implementation of various national and state health programs.

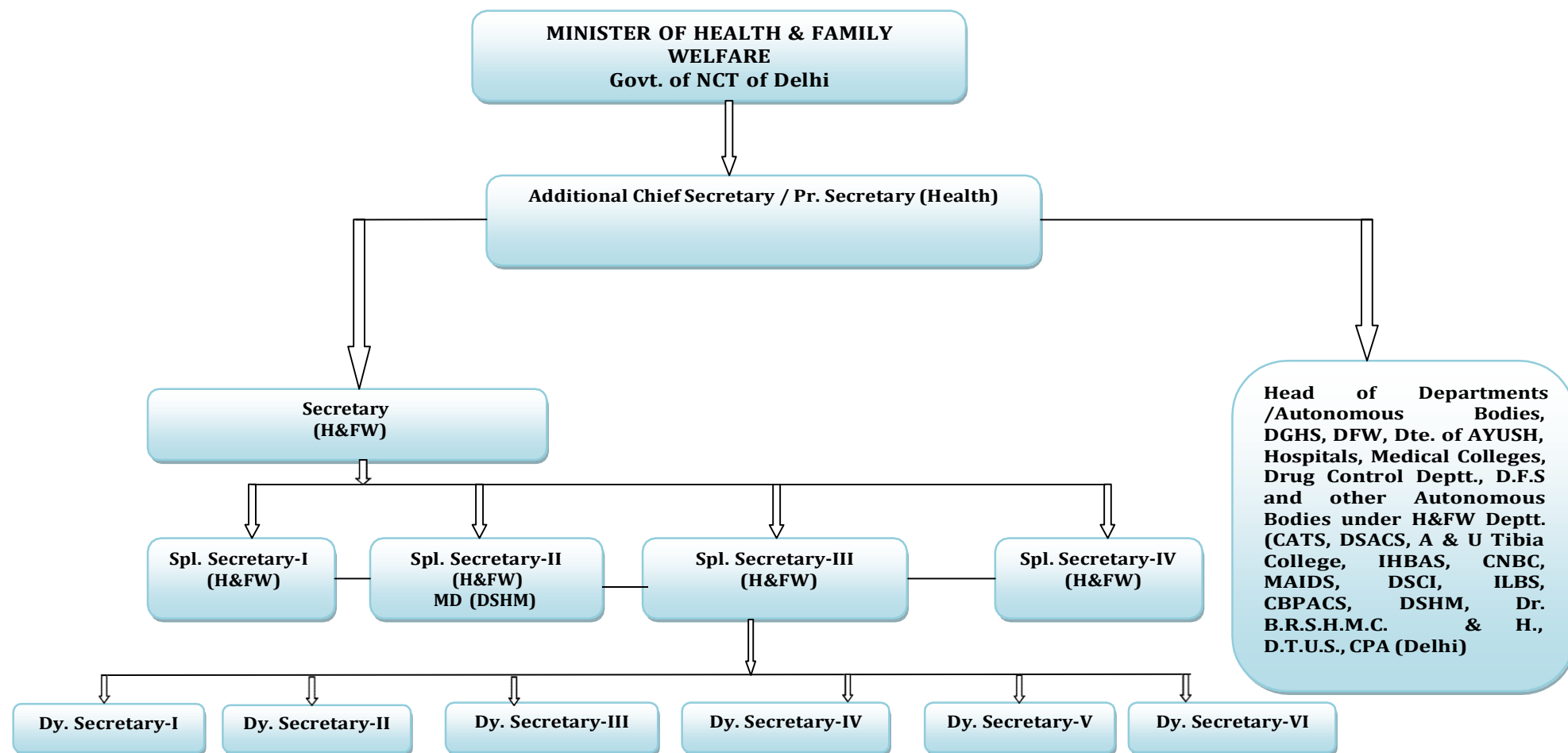

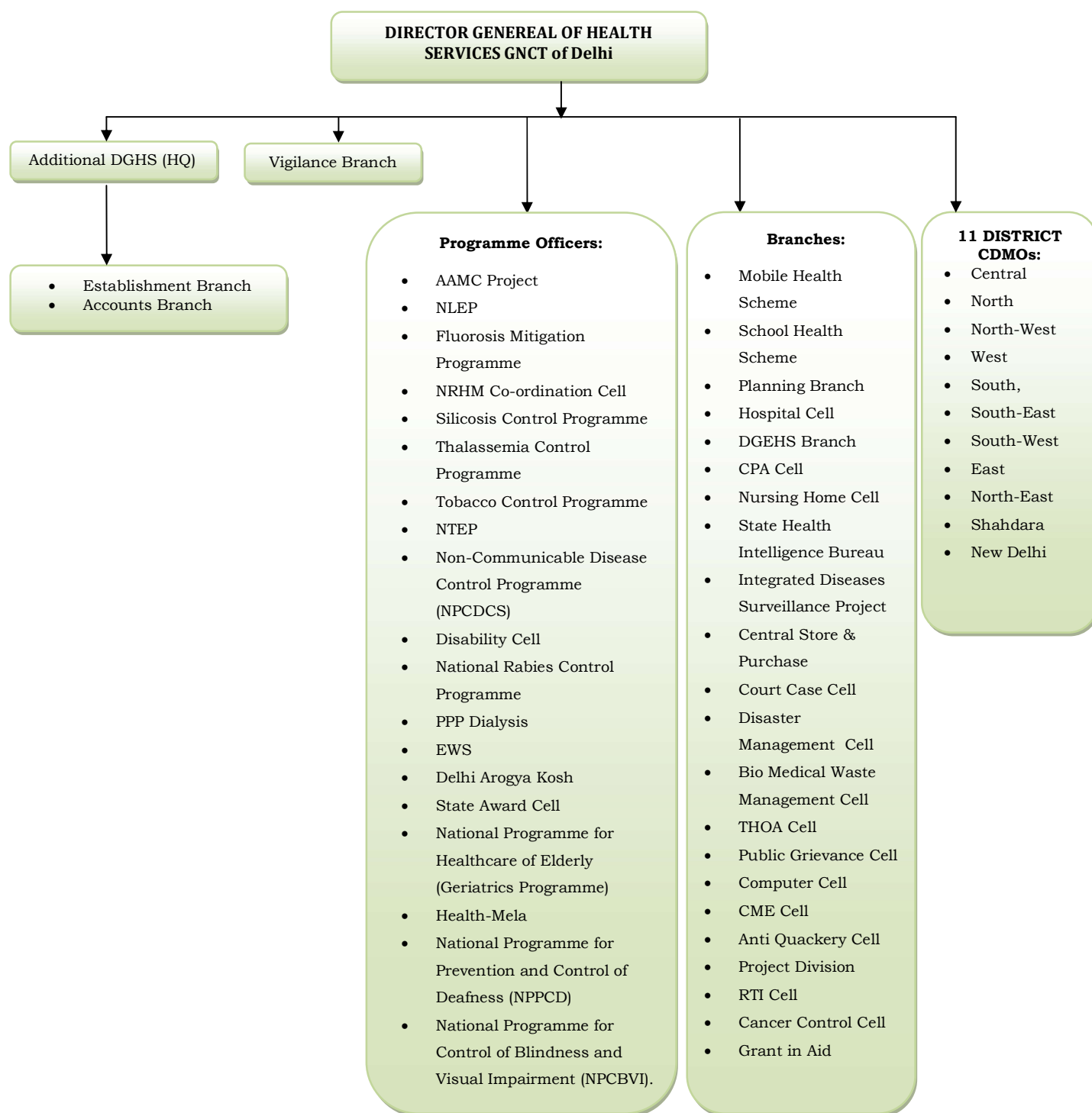

DIRECTORATE GENERAL OF HEALTH SERVICES

The Directorate General of Health Services is one of the largest department under Department of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of NCT of Delhi providing health care facilities at primary and secondary level to the citizens of Delhi through various types of health outlets, spread all over Delhi viz., Dispensaries & Health Centres, Schools, Health Clinics, Mobile Health Clinics, Aam Aadmi Mohalla Clinics and Polyclinics.

To cope with the situation regarding increasing need for health outlets, many more health outlets are being added to existing ones from time to time to meet the health needs subject to the availability of resources.

This Directorate also monitors the health services being provided by Registered Private Nursing Homes. The registration is done subject to the fulfillment of prerequisite of Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act 1953 and renewed after every three years. The registration of all private nursing homes is mandatory under the Act.

As far as the monitoring of various health schemes being run by DGHS, the regular information / data is being obtained from various health outlets under the direct control of DGHS, which are then compiled and analysed. On the basis of data from Dispensaries / Health Centres / Hospitals and its analysis, the evaluation of various schemes is carried out and necessary corrective measures, if needed, are taken.

In addition to above, this Directorate is also collecting information regularly from other agencies on communicable diseases, non-communicable diseases and other public health data for taking appropriate measures related to prevention and control of notified diseases.

CHAPTER 3

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE SYSTEM UNDER GNCTD

3.1 DELHI GOVERNMENT DISPENSARIES

Primary health care is the most important component of health care services for the citizens. This view has been equally echoed by Bhore Committee Report (1948) and accordingly, this aspect has been given due consideration in National Health Policy. Directorate General of Health Services, Government of NCT of Delhi is providing primary health care services to the people of Delhi through a network of Dispensaries, Seed PUHC, Poly Clinics, Mohalla Clinics, School Health Clinics and Mobile Health Clinics throughout Delhi to meet the primary health care needs of citizens of Delhi.

Dispensaries (Health Centres) under DGHS are its front-line health outlets that provide treatment for common ailments including provision of essential medicines to all the persons coming to these dispensaries and also undertake various preventive and promotive activities. The vision of this Directorate is to promote these front-line health outlets as the backbone of health services and overall health development and to actively involve these outlets in bottom up planning.

Functioning of Dispensaries

Planning Branch of this Directorate is responsible for planning and opening of new dispensaries, matter related to identification of area, allotment of land, planning and construction of building etc. and financial aspect are being taken care of by this branch. The operation of dispensaries under the Directorate General of Health Services is based upon district pattern. There are 11 districts functioning under the administrative control of Chief District Medical Officers. Geographically these districts correspond with the revenue districts.

Facilities at Dispensaries

The facilities provided by these dispensaries are:

- General OPD for treatment of common ailments.
- Free distribution of prescribed essential medicines.
- Treatment of minor injuries and dressing etc.
- Basic emergency care during working hours.
- Laboratory Services (Routine Lab. Services)
- Immunization and Family Welfare activities.
- Health Education.
- Malaria Clinic (in selected dispensaries only).

CHAPTER 4

MOBILE HEALTH SCHEME

Mobile Health Scheme is an independent plan scheme “Special component plan for Scheduled Castes”. RAPID urbanization and construction boom has brought about migration of rural population to urban settings in search of food and job. Prevailing high disparity between rich and poor has forced this migrant population to settle in the small groups in unauthorized colonies called J.J. Clusters. Poverty sub-human conditions, poor quality of life and lack of medical facilities has resulted in higher incidence of diseases in the population. More than 2 million migrants were found to be in Delhi itself with around 35% living in the J.J. Clusters and unauthorized colonies.

PRIORITY AREAS:

Civic bodies are not able to provide required civic amenities as they are all settled in the areas labeled as unauthorized. Among the many initiatives of the Government of Delhi to benefit the population residing in the fringe of society, Mobile Health Scheme was one of them as the Govt. took a serious note of poor health status of residents of J.J. Clusters and decided to strengthen the Mobile Health Scheme to provide basic health care to residents at their door step according to their felt needs. This was to start with a fleet of 20 Mobile Dispensaries which was launched covering different J.J. Clusters all over Delhi on weekly basis in 1989, which was strengthened gradually with time and providing health care to the J.J. Clusters / unserved areas / farmer protest / construction sites, welfare homes etc.

OBJECTIVE AND SERVICES:-

The present status of Mobile Health Scheme is as follows and the functioning of Mobile Health Scheme is as under:-

1. To provide basic health care to people living in J.J. Clusters / underserved areas / construction sites / night shelter etc. at their door steps regularly but as per schedule all areas covered at least twice a week.
2. To provide health education.
3. To take active participation in National Health Program like Pulse Polio, Measles and other Immunization. Dengue Control, Family Welfare etc.
4. To provide medical coverage in important institute and at activities and special events.
 - a. Haz Manjil pilgrims (for three months at different locations round the clock).
 - b. Urs Mela for pilgrims (for 20 days at Burari Ground round the clock).
 - c. Kanwar Camps (for 15 days at more than 100 camps spread all over Delhi round the clock)
 - d. Bhartiyaam.
 - e. Sant Nirankari Samagam (10 camps round the clock for 5 days).
 - f. Chhat Puja (More than 100 camps round the clock for 5 days).
 - g. Bangladeshi Prisoners (as per court instruction on regular basis).
 - h. Juvenile Home, Majnu Ka Tilla.
 - i. Tahirpur Leprosy Complex (on regular basis).
 - j. Lampur Beggar Home and FRRO (AS per court instruction on regular basis).
 - k. Tilak Nagar, peeragardhi, Shalimar Bagh, R.K. Puram, Lajpat Nagar,

Shadipur Depot Leprosy Colines.

- l. Children Home, Alipur etc (regular basis) and Arya Anathalaya Daryaganj.
- m. Destitute Home Motia Khan, old age homes and senior citizens homes and welfare clubs.
- n. Matratva Chhaya at Jahangirpuri and Sarai Rohilla (on regular basis).
- o. Night Shelter (as per court order more than 200 camps on regular basis).
- p. Construction sitse (all over Delhi on regular basis).
- q. Other activities such as public political gatherings, senior citizen screening, disasters management, various melas.
- r. To organise special health camps at underserved areas and J.J. Colonies and focus groups like workers and labours.

MODUS OPERANDI:-

1. For the above mentioned activites, staff, logistics, supply of medicines and equipment for all camps are provided through Mobile Dispensaries Vans.
2. Activities of Mobile Health Dispensaries are not stationary but mobile in nature i.e. these areas are covered by one Mobile Health Dispensaries to cover the aforesaid activites, due to its wider approach and flexibility in terms of spatial area and population, Hence the concept of Mobile Health Scheme is totally different in nature from the concept of Mohalla Clinics.
3. Mobile Van Dispensaries for providing basic health care facilities to under served / J.J. Clusters where there are not permanent health facilities available nearby.

These Mobile Van Dispensaries as their name suggests are Mobile Units that cater to the population and which are equipped with staff, medicines, other logistics and move from their respective control rooms to their working stations or designated places on daily basis. On reaching the J.J. Clusters the mobile van parks itself at their pre determined regular spot and render health care services as per timing and moves to next designated place for functioning. After completion of scheduled work, the mobile teams return to the control room.

The medical facilities include examination of patient and dispensing of medicines to patients and record keeping there of are being managed by staff in and around the vehicle itself as there is no proper place in J.J. Clusters etc. for staff other than vehicle.

Vehicles are also used as Mobile Van Dispensaries to provide health care facilities in night shelters also. Each vehicle assigned for night shelter covers minimum eight to ten night shelters daily.

ANNUAL OPD 2021-22, Total OPD-60311, NEW- 36146, OLD-24165.

1. Every year MHS provides medical coverage to all important events in the city as per need or as deemed necessary as mentioned above like Kanwar, Haj Mela etc.
2. MHS zones are divided into five main zones and each has a QRT or Quick Response Team for emergency and disaster management.
3. Conducting health awareness and diagnostic camps in their designated areas, construction sites and welfare homes regularly.
4. Contribution towards the various Govt. Health Programmes as and when necessary for a common goal of disease control and eradication.
5. Creating awareness in its own individual way for various health related international days in its targeted population.
6. MHS staff training programmes, refresher programmes and discussions.

ACTIVITIES STARTED

MHS has already provided coverage in Republic Day Celebration, NCC Camp training programme, farmer protest, Independence day other events etc.

IMPLEMENTATION STRUCTURE AT STATE AND DISTRICT LEVEL

Mobile Health Scheme is headed by the Addl. Director MHS which is headquartered at Dwarka, The functioning of MHS has been divided into 5 main zones of Delhi-North, West, South, East and Central. Though there is no clear cut demarcation of areas in district level but for convenience sake, areas from North and North-West Districts are covered by North Zone. From East, North-East and Shahdara are covered by East Zone, areas of South, South-East are covered by South Zone, areas of Central, New Delhi District areas are covered by Central Zone, South-West and West District areas are covered by the West Zone, However that is not a strict norm and is flexible as per need. Each zone has a zonal incharge to administer the daily affairs of a particular zone who also has the additional duties of covering his or her assigned areas. Each team is led by a medical officer under whom the following staffs work PHNO/ANM, Pharmacist, Dresser and N.O.

MHS has a sanction of 35 posts in each category. The team provided the services as stated above.

REPORTING SYSTEM:

Every month a monthly morbidity report is compiled and sent for further submission to the MHS Headquarter. The reporting is done in a modified version of ICD-10 format and is further submitted to SHIB.

Immunization and other reports as prescribed by the state Health Department is regularly sent to the DHS are usually sent monthly, quarterly and annual mode.

PENDING ISSUES:

At present vehicles are not available with MHS and the dedicated teams are carrying out their assigned duties on their own.

POTENTIAL:

Mobile Health Scheme is a unique and novel initiative and in a modern system where mobility and flexibility is the order of the day, this scheme can be developed to its full potential for the maximum benefits of its targeted population. Infact it can achieve phenomenal results by not only performing in its targeted population, but also in population beyond its perceived scope.

Its mobility is the biggest plus points as it will have a broader outreach and can cater to a far greater population than a fixed dispensary.

Since it is a Mobile Dispensary, providing treatment and care for general complaints, it can be incorporated for the promotion and awareness of any government health scheme. It also can procure data for analysis from a population which is dynamic in nature and is variable, that which is missed during surveys.

These are just a few of the many fold ways a Mobile Van Dispensary can function in the health care system.

CHAPTER 5

SCHOOL HEALTH SCHEME

Due to COVID 19 pandemic all schools were closed from 5th March 2020 officially and staff of school health scheme was kept under administrative control of DGHS & detailed to CDMO/ DGHS/ Control Room/ Airport for COVID related duties.

The staffs were relieved in phase wise manner due to rapid decline in No. of COVID positive cases. In 1st slot DSI and NO were relieved from 22/02/2022 for distribution of WIFS tablets to the schools. In IInd phase District Incharges and District PHNOs were relieved on 11/03/2022 and rest of the staff was relieved on 22/03/2022. Since then following activities were performed in School Health Clinics:

- Preparation of National Deworming campaign April 2022 (1st April 2022 to 13th April 2022) started on 12/03/2022.
- Distribution of IFA and Tab. Albendazole to all Schools.
- Meeting with DDE, DOE regarding venue and date for training.
- Training and orientation programme for nodal teachers of all Govt, Govt.aided and private schools were done.
- Distribution of some OTC ERS medicines along with IEC material for sensitization
- ERS Coordination and OPD services.
- Coordination with CATs, Dispensaries and hospitals for any adverse affects.

CHAPTER 6

FUNCTIONS OF BRANCHES AND STATE SCHEMES

6.1 PLANNING BRANCH

The Planning Branch of this Directorate co-ordinates with all Programme Officers, CDMOs, Incharge (MHS), Incharge (SHS) for monitoring respective Schemes, Outcome Budgets targets and achievements. It also co-ordinates with Planning Department GNCTD for related policy matters on all schemes.

In Delhi, the main thrust under the health sector is to provide preventive, curative and promotive health care services through a network of dispensaries/ Polyclinics and hospitals in deficient areas in order to provide better health care facilities at the doorstep of the people.

6.2 HOSPITAL CELL

Introduction:

The planning establishment of different hospitals are being taken care of by Hospital Cell functioning, in this Directorate under direct supervision of Director General Health services. The responsibilities of Hospital Cell include planning and commissioning of hospital which include preparation of MPF (Medical Function Program), site inspection, monitoring and co-ordination with different Govt. /Semi-Govt. /Autonomous/Pvt. Agencies etc. related to establishment of hospitals. The financial aspects of these upcoming hospitals are also being taken care of by Hospital Cell, like preparation of SFC/EFC memo for cost estimates of hospitals which include estimates of manpower, equipments and other vital components required for establishment of hospital.

The broad functioning of Hospital Cell involves in close coordination with executing agencies and undertakes site inspection etc. along with the engineers. The selected agencies then appoint architects and hospital consultant for preparation of building plans etc. The Director General, Health Services approves the preliminary drawings once the detail drawings are prepared by the consultants which are then submitted for approval of DDA/MCD. Once all approvals are in place, the estimated cost is worked out and proposal submitted to Expenditure Finance Committee (EFC) for approval of the project. The Hospital Cell prepares the EFC Memorandum & Cabinet Note including cost estimates, estimates of manpower, equipments etc. In addition to above, the Hospital Cell has been coordinating with secondary care hospitals of Delhi Govt. for various hospitals related works.

Other responsibilities under hospital cell: -

- 1) Plantation Issues in Hospitals
- 11) Club Foot Management Programme

Status of Various Hospital Projects Under Hospital Cell (DGHS)

1. 600 bedded Hospital at Ambedkar Nagar Delhi.(North):

The hospital was started exclusively for COVID-19 patients on 09 August 2020. The Further development/progress in r/o Ambedkar Nagar hospital may be obtained from Medical Director, Ambedkar Nagar, B-Block, Dakshinpuri, N.Delhi-62.

2. 768 bedded Hospital at Burari, Delhi (North):

The hospital was started exclusively for COVID-19 patients on 25 July 2020. The Further development/progress in r/o Burari hospital may be obtained from Medical Director, Burari hospital, Kaushik Enclave, Burari, Delhi-110084,

3. 1241 bedded Indira Gandhi Hospital Project at Sector-9, Dwarka:

The Indira Gandhi Hospital at Dwarka has been started operations as a dedicated COVID facility wef 08/05/2021, initially with a partial capacity of 250 beds, which will be seated up gradually. The Further development/progress in r/o Indira Gandhi hospital may be obtained from Medical Director, Indira Gandhi Hospital, Sec-9, Dwarka.

4. 1164 bedded hospital in Phase-1 at Siraspur, Delhi:

Earlier Plan of 200 bedded Hospital has been revised. The present proposal comprised of a 2716 bed Hospital building (Block A 1164 beds Block B 1552 beds). In Phase (1), 1164 bedded hospital is being constructed. The Preliminary estimate has been approved by EFC on 10/12/2019 for construction of 1164 bedded new hospital work at Sirasput. Construction work has been started and 35% construction work has been completed.

5. 691 bedded hospital at Madipur :

Earlier Plan of 200 bedded Hospital has been revised The bed strength has been revised to 691 beds from Earlier Plan 200 beds at Madipur hospital. The Preliminary estimate has been approved by EFC for 691 beds on 18/11/2019 for construction of hospital. Construction work has been started and 50% work has been completed

6. 691 beds hospital at Jwalapuri (Nangloi):

Earlier Plan to the bed strength of the hospital project has been revised to 691 beds from 200 bedded hospital. The Preliminary Estimate has been approved by EFC for 691 beds on 18/11/2019 for construction of hospital. Construction work has started, and 50% work has been completed

7. 691 bedded hospital at Hastal, Vikas puri, Delhi:

The bed strength has been revised to 691 beds from earlier Plan 200 beds hospital. The Preliminary estimate has been approved by EFC for 691 beds on 18/11/2019 for construction of hospital. 5% work has been completed

8. Sarita Vihar Hospital Project, Delhi:

A setting up of 336 bedded Semi-permanent Temporary ICU hospital at Sarita Vihar for exclusive ICU beds to meet the demand during in pandemic 3 wave of COVID 19 was approved. The construction work has been started on 23/09/21. 45% work has been completed

6.3 NURSING HOME CELL

Nursing Home Cell was established in the DHS with a view to register the private nursing homes and hospitals under the provisions of Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act, 1953 and the rules made thereunder and amendment from time to time. The main activities of the cell are to receive the applications from Nursing Homes owners for new registration and for renewal of registration every third year, carrying out regular inspections in order to ensure maintenance of requisite standards in these Nursing Homes, & various other task as assigned.

The responsibilities assigned to the cell include:

1. Registration & Renewal of Nursing Homes under Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act
2. Various Court Case matters pertaining to Pvt. Nursing Homes.
3. Complaints against Private Nursing Homes in Delhi.
4. Compilation of information about the Foreign National Patients undergoing treatment in Delhi.
5. Sending recommendation to Excise Department for procurement of Narcotic Drugs by Private Nursing Homes.

REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES:

Registration is granted as per Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act, 1953; Delhi Nursing Home Registration (Amendment) Act, 2003 & Rules made thereunder 1966, 1992, 2011.

The registration of individuals / institutions carrying out nursing home activities in Delhi is mandatory. Besides this, Directorate monitors the

maintenance of quality of health services as prescribed under the said act. The registration is done subject to the fulfillment of prerequisites of Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act and renewed on every third year. The form of registration may be obtained from Nursing Home Cell, Directorate of Health Services or downloaded from our website. In case, the form is downloaded from the website, the cost of the form i.e. Rs. 100/- (through digital payment / online payment in favour of Director Health Services, Delhi) has to be submitted at the time of submission of the form alongwith the registration fee as applicable based on number of beds. Any complaint / grievance in regard of nursing home by general public may also be sent to the Director Health Services / Nursing Home Cell.

- Total Number of functional Registered Nursing Home in Delhi :1047
- Total Number of Beds available in 1047 registered nursing homes :27520

6.4 ECONOMICALLY WEAKER SECTION (EWS)

EWS branch, DGHS (HQ) deals with the patients who belong to Economically Weaker Section (EWS) of the Society. This branch works in accordance with the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi order dated 22.03.2007 in WP(C)2866/2002 in the matter of Social Jurist Vs GNCTD & Ors. This branch facilitates the free treatment of the eligible patients of EWS category in Identified Private Hospitals (IPHs). This free treatment in all aspects is provided by all Identified Private Hospitals (IPH) of Delhi who were given land on concessional rates by the land owning agencies of Delhi. Every IPH has obligation to provide free treatment on 25% of total OPD and 10% of total beds to the eligible patients of EWS category.

The number of EWS patients treated in IPHs during April 2021 – March 2022 is as follows:

OPD	:	4,57,919
IPD	:	33,357

Total number of EWS patients referred to IPHs from this branch during this duration are 12,575.

Total No. of EWS patients referred to IPHs from Delhi Govt. Hospitals are 3559.

At present, there are 60 identified private hospitals and out of these, five hospitals are under renovation / non-functional, namely R. B. Seth Jessa Ram Hospital, Febris hospital, Sunder Lal Jain hospital, Bhagwan Mahavir Hospital and Deepak Memorial Hospital.

RTI is being replied within specified time. Reply to Lok Sabha / Rajya Sabha and Vidhan Sabha questions are submitted within the time period. PGMS complaints, LG Listening portal, CPGRAMS, written complaints and complaints received online via email on freepatientcell.dhs@gmail.com against any of the IPHs are being dealt as per EWS guidelines and action is taken as deemed fit.

6.5 DELHI AROGYA KOSH

(A) Financial assistance to eligible patient undergoing treatment in Government Hospitals of Delhi:

“Delhi Arogya Kosh” (DAK) is a registered society that provides financial assistance to the extent of Rs. 5 lakh to the needy eligible patients for treatment of any illness/treatment/ intervention required by the patient undergoing treatment in a Government Hospital run by Delhi Government or Central Government or Autonomous Hospital under State Government.

Eligibility:

1. Patient having National Food Security Card or Income certificate of up to ₹3 Lakhs per annum issued by the Revenue Department, GNCTD.
2. Patient should be a bona fide resident of Delhi for last 3 yrs (prior to the date of submission of application)
3. Patient requiring treatment for any illness/ treatment/ intervention in a Government Hospital run by Delhi Govt. /Central Govt./AIIMS/Autonomous Institutes of the Govt.

Requisite documents for verification of INCOME:

1. National Food Security Card.
2. Income certificate of up to 3 Lakhs per annum issued by Revenue Dept., GNCTD

Requisite document for verification of DOMICILE for last 03 years (any one of the following):

1. Domicile Certificate issued from area SDM.
2. Ration card
3. Aadhar Card
4. EPIC (Voter ID)
5. Driving License
6. Passport
7. Extract from the Electoral Roll

Note: In such cases where the patient is a minor, Birth Certificate of the patient and the domicile proof of either of the parent (any one of the aforementioned document) is required to be submitted

Where to Apply: Duly filled Application form along with other supporting documents is to be submitted in the O/o Medical Superintendent/ Nodal officer, DAK of the concerned hospital where the patient is undergoing treatment.

- Two photographs of the concerned patient, duly attested by the treating doctor of the concerned Government Hospital affixed on the application form and estimate certificate.
- Photocopies of the treatment record
- Undertaking regarding income details of the family

Processing of an application:

A complete application form along with all the requisite documents is processed and sent for approval according to the following mechanism:

- Less than Rs. 1.5 Lakh -: SMO (DAK) -> I/c (DAK) -> A.O (DAK) -> Member Secretary (DAK)
- More than Rs. 1.5 Lakh -: SMO (DAK) -> I/c (DAK) -> A.O (DAK) -> Member Secretary (DAK) -> Chairman (DAK) – cum - Hon'ble MOH
- After due approvals, the application comes back to Delhi Arogya Kosh and the sanctioned amount is transferred through ECS issued in favor of the concerned Government Hospital. The applicant, too, is informed through letter.

6.6 DELHI GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEE'S HEALTH SCHEME

BRIEF INTRODUCTION

- Known as Delhi Government Employees Health Scheme (DGEHS).
- Welfare scheme for serving employees and pensioners of GNCTD of Delhi
- Launched in 1997 by Health & Family Welfare Department (H&FW) of GNCTD of Delhi.
- Purpose to provide comprehensive medical facilities to Delhi Govt employees & pensioners with their eligible dependants.
- **Pattern:** As per CGHS with some modifications as per need.
- **Recognised institutions:** All health facilities (hospitals/dispensaries) run by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi and autonomous bodies under Delhi Government, local bodies viz. MCD, NDMC, Delhi Cantonment Board, Central Government and other Government bodies and empanelled private hospitals/ Diagnostic centres.
- **Empanelled:** More than 400 private health care institutions in Delhi & NCR.
- **Membership:** Compulsory for serving employees but for pensioners optional. Pensioners can join any time by making payment subscription amount calculated as per prevailing rate.
- Life time card is issued by concerned department to pensioners. Benefits prospective in nature.

MEMBERS: serving employees, pensioners, their dependents,

- Ministers, MLAs, Ex. MLAs, Ex. Metropolitan Councilors of GNCT of Delhi and their dependent, family members.
- Judges and Ex. Judges of Hon'ble High Court of Delhi also
- Cashless facility is available to dependents of IAS (AGMUT) & DANICS officers posted on deputation/transfer to outside Delhi in all empanelled hospitals in the specialties the hospitals are recognized for and as per entitlement.
- Some autonomous bodies. Pensioners of Autonomous bodies are eligible who are covered either by CCS Pension rule or NPS.
- Retired officers of IAS/IFS of AGMUT Cadre, Officers of DANICS/UTCS Cadre.

BENEFITS OF DGEHS:

- Beneficiaries attached to Delhi Govt Disp/Hosp, who is AMA for all purpose.
- Vide O.M dated 17/08/2015-- Authorization/Referral by AMA removed.
- For Dental Treatment referral removed since 29-8-2017.
- For AYUSH treatment referral removed since 22-11-2019.
- Serving employees get reimbursement but in emergency conditions cashless treatment provision from respective organization.
- Pensioners get cashless treatment and Bills are paid by DGEHS branch for OPD & IPD of pensioners to the respective empanelled hospital.
- Pensioners also get medicines through authorized chemists after getting "NA from AMA at DGDs/Hospital.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF DGEHS BRANCH:

- Payments to hospitals / diagnostic centres for cashless treatment provided to DGEHS pensioner beneficiaries.
- Reimbursement to reporter's bills forwarded by DIP for examination and reimbursement of bills as per Delhi Press Reporters Medical Aid Rules, 1995 and its amendment dated 15.11.2011.
- Payments to Authorised chemists for supply of medicines to pensioners.
- Permission to DGEHS pensioner beneficiaries for costly treatment, injections, specific cancer treatment, cardiac treatment, implants etc as per CGHS guidelines issued from time to time.
- Ex post facto approvals wherever required.
- Expert Opinion to all departments on emergent nature of conditions when some beneficiaries get admitted in empanelled / non empanelled hospitals.
- Telephonically removal of doubts raised by beneficiaries/ institutions.
- Average 10-15 files received every day for different kinds of queries from various departments of GNCTD of Delhi.
- Efforts are made for timely payment to private empanelled hospitals.

CONSTRAINTS: Related to Staff, managerial and administrative in nature.

- Heavy workload, less staff comparison to work.
- Medical opinion /reimbursement cases take time to see rule position and rates and clarifications from experts of different hospitals which take time to respond.
- Large number of RTI, PGMS, PGC, CPGRAM, LG Listening posts which takes away lot of time of officials.

6.7 CENTRAL PROCUREMENT AGENCY (CPA)

INTRODUCTION & VISION OF DEPARTMENT:-

Central Procurement Agency (CPA) was established in 1994 as a component of State Drug Authority to procure medicines as per essential Drug List (EDL). Subsequently, it was separated from State Drug Authority and annexed with Directorate of Health Services because the State Drug Authority, being a regulatory body did not want to be associated with Drug Procurement. CPA (DGHS), thereafter, started procuring medicines.

CPA was to be established in 3 phases.

Phase 1: CPA shall float tender and circulate rate contracts to hospitals. Hospitals shall issue supply orders as per their requirements.

Phase 2: CPA will finalize rate contracts and issued supply orders centrally for all the hospitals/ stores.

Phase 3: CPA will additionally have warehouses for storing goods.

The establishment of CPA went up to phase 2 and the stage of phase 3 could never be arrived at.

In 2011, a supply chain software programme (NIRANTAR) was launched to manage CPA activities and make procurement more transparent. Before 2014-15 goods were being procured by stores through CPA, where CPA had rate contracts and locally through their own tenders or other hospitals rate contracts. Payment for all the items were being made by the hospital/stores themselves. There were multiple complaints of delayed payment by suppliers and the bidders from outside state were expressing the difficulty of liaising with 40 odd offices for their payments. Multiple discussion with the then Secretary Health took place and it was decided that the payment would be centralized to curb it, and the budget of CPA was accordingly increased, that of hospitals pruned down. In 2015-16 it was decided that all procurement and payment shall happen through Central Procurement Agency. Hence CPA got strengthened by diverting the manpower and infrastructure by the competent authorities.

Key targets of the department:-

- a. Ensuring 100% availability of essential medicines as per state EDL to various health facilities under GNCTD i.e finalising rate contracts for medicines.
- b. Ensuring standard quality medicines to all the beneficiaries attending to various health facilities under GNCTD.
- c. Timely processing of bills and payments to its suppliers.

Zero tolerance for defaulters and substandard quality suppliers.

6.9 CENTRAL STORE & PURCHASE

I. Aims & Objectives of the Branch

To facilitate smooth functioning of the DGDs, Seed PUHCs, DGHS (HQ) & subordinate offices. The following activities are undertaken:-

- Procurement of General items, Stationery items & Printing.
- Procurement of Lab consumables items & medical equipments for the DGDs & Seed PUHCs.
- Maintenance of the medical equipments installed in Delhi High Court & other districts Courts.
- Maintenance of the equipments of Mother and Basic lab functioning in the dispensaries, Seed PUHCs and DGDs & Seed PUHCs upgraded to Polyclinics and also equipment of the office of DGHS, HQ.
- Maintenance of cold storage for temperature sensitive items.
- To facilitate the role of Central store in case of specific item/ unprecedented event such as pandemic COVID-19 as directed by Competent Authority.
- Misc. matters RTI, Public Grievances, etc.

Physical Targets achieved in 2021-22

1. Nodal store for Pandemic Covid -19, 2021

Central Store, DGHS has been designated as the Nodal Store for Pandemic Covid -19 for Govt. of GNCT of Delhi. The central store played a pivotal role in the receiving and distribution of the logistics, equipments and medicines to all the Health Institution (Hospital and all activities under the CDMO) GNCT of Delhi and has also extended the service to MCD hospitals and zonal offices, CATs etc.

During the 2nd wave of the COVID -19, 2021, Central Store had faced several new challenges in comparison of the 1st wave in 2020. The second wave of COVID 19 was much more deadly and virulent in comparison of 1st wave. The cases were increasing very rapidly and the demand of items was more different from the Covid -19, 2020. The requirement was more for medicines and equipments as per the nature of virulence. Accordingly, H&FW Deptt. provided medicines, Inj. Remdesivir, Inj. Amphotericin, Tab. 2DG etc. besides the other routine, logistics and lab testing items.

The COVID related items received through CPA are as under:-

Efforts were made to supplement items from other stores whenever there is a drop in the supply and high in demand from the user end. PPE kits was supplemented from the other (DSHM) store to meet the needs of the users.

In addition, request for PPE kits, N-95 mask was also submitted to GOI. In response, GOI provided some quantity and in addition, medicines and equipments were also received by the Central Store. The items received is as under:-

The above mentioned equipments received through GOI donated by other countries are to be distributed on urgent basis to operationalise/ strengthen the Covid care centres and the Covid Designated Hospitals.

The equipments received are unloaded and entered in the stock register after duly inspection of the same, by the Inspection Committee and are to be distributed to the user within a short time frame. The record of distribution of the equipments is then provided to the competent authority on daily basis. Several correspondence /reportings with the nodal officer (Donations) of the state were also made.

Full effort was made to ensure the timely issuance of injectibles (Covid related) which are of urgent nature to the Hospitals.

Later, the quantities of supplies received far exceed the storage capacity of the central store and this became a problem to be dealt. Sufficient quantity of medicines was available in the central store.

Challenges

A. Distribution of the equipments

No pattern of distribution was received from the competent authority so the responsibility of the distribution fell upon the branch to manage the distribution. Several phone calls, messages on the e-mail, whatsapp had to be taken up for timely distribution. Most of the essential equipments received had been distributed to the concerned Hospitals.

B. Distribution of Medicines

In the beginning the quantity of the medicines was limited but the pattern of distribution was received from the H&FW. As time passed, the quantity of the same increased and also exceeded the requirement of the Covid designated hospitals and Covid care centres. Due to slowing down of the demand of the hospitals (Indent) and lack of space in the Central Store, DGHS had to take a decision to transfer the medicines to the site of utilisations i.e the Covid designated hospitals.

C. The cold storage

The cold store became a big issue this year as some of the supplied medicines are required to be kept in a 2-8° C temp. The cold store is not enough to receive all the supplies.

In order to manage storage of these temperature sensitive medicines, the following measures had been adopted;

- Rapid transfer of such medicines to Covid designated hospitals and covid care centres.
- Informed the competent authority for intervention in the further supply.
- Later, temporary arrangement of cold store was made with the cooperation of DSAC in the Dr. Baba Saheb Ambedkar hospital campus.

- For expansion of the cold storage area, request for additional A.C was also made to the concerned.
- Exploration of space for cold store in the hospitals was also made.

2. DONATION CELL

This year S&P branch had further extended the activities as Donation cell, to receive the items donated by philanthropic organisation for Covid 19.

In addition, the central store had received few medicines (confiscated) from the Delhi Police (Crime Branch) such as inj. remdesivir.

3. Coordination and Communications activities

The activity of the Central Store also involved a lot of information, communication and co-ordination in r/o items availability mentioned above in the store, with the CDMO's, Hospitals to enable Healthcare Community to maintain the continuity of the various activities quarantine, testing etc.

S&P branch had to maintain an effective co-ordination network with the CDMOs, District Stores and Stores of many hospitals for the Coordination and Communications activities required for the efficient supply chain management. These are done through mails, telephone, messages, Whatsapp etc. Due to inadequate storage capacity of the central store, the covid related items need to be transferred to the concerned rapidly in order to receive further supplies.

In addition, the Central Store has to maintain coordination with CPA and DGHS, regarding stock availability in the store.

4. Data compilation

S&P branch has also a section maintaining data of the items received by the Central Store which are provided to IDSP on regular basis. Data of few items are also provided to GOI.

Requirement of the hospitals/ districts for PPE Kit, N-95, Mask and Surgical Mask was also obtained and compiled by the branch. Then the compiled data collected was further submitted to DG for further transmission to CPA for procurement.

5. Portal for covid

GOI has developed portal for the updation of data of essential medicines, equipments in preparation of the third wave. The stock position of medicines as available are updated. The Branch had also participated in meetings in r/o of Oxygen related equipments and its portal.

Overall, adequate quantity of Personal Protective Equipment(PPE), medicines, basic equipments had been provided to all the Health Institutions, under GNCTD and the Central Store continued to extend support CATS, MCD Hospitals and to the temporary Covid Care Centres in Delhi.

II. The purchasing activity of the branch

District Health System under CDMO's has been the backbone in the management and control of COVID-19 Pandemic. Various activities taken up by districts for COVID -19 Pandemic such as quarantine, testing centres, surveillance, and home isolation are supported by the items provided by S&P branch. In this regard, the activities of branch is as under:-

- Availability of General & Stationery items for DGDs, Seed PUHCs, DGHS (HQ) and its subordinate offices through GeM for which reporting of the activity to the important part of the activity.
- Availability of Lab items and Surgical Items for the testing centers DGDs & Seed PUCHs for preventive measures of COVID-19.
- Availability of BMW Management items for preventive measures of COVID-19 for testing centers.
- Procurement of Medical Equipments and consumables i.e., Digital Blood Pressure Machine, Digital Thermometer, Stethoscope, Sanitiser, Gloves, Tape, etc. for preventive measures and requirement of the testing items.

During COVID-19 Pandemic, OPD in the dispensaries was almost closed however Purchase Section continued to provide all supplementary and relevant items mentioned above, for the management and functioning of the Covid -19 activities under CDMO's.

6.10 BIO MEDICAL WASTE MANAGEMENT CELL

Ministry of Environment and Forest, Govt. of India notified the Biomedical Waste (Management & Handling) Rules, 1998 in exercise of power conferred under Sections 6, 8 and 25 of the Environment (Protection) Act 1986. However, Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Govt. of India notified the new Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 on 28th March, 2016 as amended 2018, 2019. The Delhi Pollution Control Committee has been designated as Prescribed Authority to implement these rules in the National Capital Territory of Delhi. The Lt. Governor of Delhi has constituted an Advisory Committee which has 10 members with Pr. Secretary (H&FW), Govt. of NCT of Delhi as Chairman and Director (Health Services) as Member Secretary /Convenor.

In order to facilitate the proper treatment of the biomedical waste generated from Hospitals, dispensaries, smaller Nursing Home/Clinics, Blood Bank/Diagnostic Laboratories etc. The Government has taken initiatives to establish centralized waste treatment facilities.

The Delhi Government has allowed establishment of Centralized Biomedical Waste

Treatment facilities by the name M/s SMS Water Grace BMW Pvt. Ltd. at STP, DJB, Nilothi, New Delhi and M/s Biotic Waste Solutions Pvt. Ltd. at G.T.Karnal Road, Delhi is functioning as per the authorization of Delhi Pollution Control Committee. Biomedical Waste is collected from Health Care Facilities in Delhi, transported and treated in this Common Bio-medical Waste Treatment Facilities (CBWTF) as per Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 in accordance with DPCC order dated 15/05/2015.

In order to implement the BMW Management Rules, Bio Medical Waste Management Cell was formed in the Directorate of Health Services, Govt. of NCT of Delhi, for promoting facilitation of Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 in the health care facilities in the state of Delhi.

Budget allocated to all the Districts of DGHS from BMW Mgmt. Cell, DGHS @ 43,000/- (Forty three thousand only) for each District for conducting Training Programme of Bio Medical Waste Management during the year 2021-22. The Cell has been functioning actively and has gained momentum since 1997, beginning of the IX Plan & has continued to improve till date.

6.18 DISASTER MANAGEMENT CELL

Disasters are known to strike without warning. The government, local bodies, voluntary bodies have to work in coordination & cooperation to prevent or control disasters, wherever the need arises. Being a mega-city and capital of India, eventualities in the form of floods and outbreaks like cholera and dengue, terrorist attacks have been witnessed in the past. Delhi is located in a high seismic Zone of the country and the possibility of major earthquakes is very real. Disaster Management Cell works within the confines of mandated functions under Disaster Management Act 2005. The cell is focussing on the lead function “Medical Response & Trauma Care” and support function “Search / rescue and evacuation of victims under expert care in emergencies.

Activities under the scheme

Directorate of Health Services is implementing the plan scheme on Disaster Management as part of State Disaster Management Plan.

The existing guideline for provision of care in Medical Response & Trauma Care at three levels (Pre-Hospital Care, Transit Care, and Hospital Care) is in place.

Achievements during 2021-22

1. Additional responsibilities assigned during Covid-19 Pandemic for screening & Triage of stranded abroad Passengers coming from International flights.
2. Screening & triage of of passengers under Vande Bharat Mission.
3. Set-up of helpline numbers in Covid-19 Control Room under DGHS HQ & timely resolution of telephonic queries related to Covid-19 & resolution of covid-19 related grievances of citizen.

6.19 NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES CONTROL PROGRAMME (NPCDCS)

Govt of India has launched flagship programme under National Health Mission is focusing on Prevent and control common NCDs through behaviour and life style changes, to provide early diagnosis and management of common NCDs, To build capacity at various levels of health care for prevention, diagnosis and treatment of common NCDs, To train human resource within the public health setup via doctors, paramedics and nursing staff to cope with

6.22 HEALTH MELA

The benefit and purpose of Govt. Schemes and Achievements falls short if it is not communicated properly to the intended beneficiaries which in this case is the population. Beneficial schemes will lie unutilised, the intent and work of the Govt. remains uncommunicated and the population fails to realise the potential of health care system of the State in place. Therefore, propagation of the right, transparent information to the population is the key to successful Govt. Schemes. Also important health related messages are conveyed to the population through IEC activities.

The Health Mela wing is one such branch of the DGHS, GNCTDelhi which deals with the above concern. Every year there is representation of the Health Department in key Govt. Fairs, expos and such for display of beneficial information. The perfect Health mela which was a regular activity was not organised by Heartcare Foundation of India during 2021-22.

During 2021-22, this directorate participated in an exhibition-Delhi Govt. Achievements & Schemes Expo which was organised w.e.f., 25th to 27th February, 2022 at Pitampura Dilli Haat, New Delhi.

6.23 STATE AWARD SCHEME

State Awards to Service Doctors working in Delhi was first started in the year 1997-98. Under this scheme 20 Service doctors from Allopathy, Homeopathy and Indian System of Medicine who are working under Govt. of NCT of Delhi for the last 15 years or more with excellent services to the people of Delhi are conferred with the State award, every year.

The purpose of state award is to motivate the medical and paramedical staff for better quality service to the population of Delhi. In the award function held on 29th August 2006, Hon'ble Chief Minister announced that this award should also be given to Paramedical staff. Each awardee is given a memento, Citation certificate and cash award.

The award seeks to recognize work of any distinction and is given for distinguished and exceptional achievements/service in all fields of activities/disciplines, such as Medicine, Social Work, medical research, Public health, etc.

There ought to be an element of public service in the achievements of the person to be selected. It should not be merely excellence in a particular field but it should be excellence plus.

All Government Doctors and paramedical staff who fulfil the criteria without distinction of race, occupation, position or sex are eligible for these awards.

The award is normally not conferred to retired Doctors/Officials. However, in highly deserving cases, the Government could consider giving an award to Retired doctor/official if the retirement of the person proposed to be honoured has been recent, say within a period of one year preceding the Award function.

It was proposed that the award may be given to 20 Doctors and 31 Paramedical & Nursing staff during current Year. Hon'ble Chief Minister confers these awards to the meritorious candidates. At present each Doctor is given a cash award of Rs.100000/- and each Nurse/Paramedical staff is given Rs.50000/-.

The criteria of selection to the award were as under:

1. Meritorious/extraordinary work in the field of healthcare/ health promotion/ social service/ health research/ public health.

2. 15 years or more regular service under GNCT Delhi, MCD or NDMC.
3. Vigilance Clearance and Annual confidential report/Work & Conduct report of the candidate.
4. Recommendations from Head of the department.
5. Vigilance Clearance and Annual confidential report/Work & Conduct report of the candidate.
6. Representation to different institutions, weaker sections.
7. Representation to different streams like Allopathy, ISM&H, Local bodies (Municipal Corporations & NDMC).

The HODs / Directors / Medical Superintendents will invite application from deserving candidate working in their institutions and scrutinise them. The recommended applications of the most deserving candidate will be forwarded to Director Health Services. The state award/search committee will decide the final list of candidates to be awarded.

The award /search committee on the advice of Government may relax the criteria of 15 years experience in Delhi government to the extra ordinary deserving candidates.

6.24 SILICOSIS CONTROL PROGRAMME

Silicon Dioxide or Crystallized Silica causes fine levels of dust to be deposited in the lungs. The lungs react in several ways. They get inflamed, create lesions, and then form nodules and fibroids. There are no perceivable symptoms for a numbers of years. Silicosis is difficult to diagnose at its onset. Silicosis symptoms in varying degrees of severity begin to occur. Those affected may experience shortness of breath, fever, chest pain, exhaustion and dry cough.

Since silicosis affects the lungs, it can also affect the vessels leading to the heart. So heart disease and enlargement are common. In the 1990s silicon dioxide was classified as a known carcinogen, and as such. Silica exposure is now linked to the development of lung cancer.

Additionally, those affected are advised to avoid exposures to smoking, to any further silica and to other lung irritants. Special filters for drilling equipment have been developed and dry mining is infrequent. Anything that can reduce the silica dust content in the air, particularly the use of water, is employed to make working conditions safer. Precautions developed because of the liabilities for employers, as well as the risk to workers silica exposure lawsuits abound.

Objectives:

1. Reduction of new cases of Silicosis in Delhi.
2. Capacity building of health care personnel
3. Strengthening of diagnostic facilities in health care institutions
4. Awareness generation in the community through IEC/BCC activities specially silicosis prone area.
5. Clinical care and rehabilitation of silicosis affected people in collaboration with social welfare and urban development department

Strategies:

1. Reduction of new cases of Silicosis in Delhi adopting engineering measures specially PPE and keeping fly dust wet.

2. Capacity building of health care personnel through trainings, seminars, workshop and advocacy meetings
3. Strengthening of diagnostic facilities in health care institutions
4. Awareness generation in the community through IEC/BCC activities specially silicosis prone area.
5. Clinical care of people affected with silicosis
6. Rehabilitation of silicosis affected people in collaboration with social welfare, urban development department and involvement of NGOs

Lal Kuan and Govt. Effort for Silicosis Control in Lal Kuan Area:

Lal Kuan is a small urban village near the Mehrauli-Badarpur Road. It was an active mining and quarrying area with a large numbers of stone crushers that have helped in building of Delhi. All the crushing and mining operations came to a halt in 1992 by Supreme Court Order. This judgment, though reduced the pollution level of Delhi, its ambiguous position on the issue of occupational health hazards made the lives of the poor workers more vulnerable. When mining crushing activities were on, everything in Lal Kuan used to be covered by a thick layer of dust. Most of the victims are migrant workers. Both husband and wife are suffering from silicosis/others respiratory problems in majority of households.

Today, Lal Kuan is the home of former mine workers and stone crushers ailing from silicosis. PRASAR (An NGO) claims that at least 3, 000 residents have died in the last 15 years from silicosis tuberculosis and other breathing ailments in Lal Kuan area. It is sensitive to the problem of silicosis in poor population.

Achievement: Recently the draft Rehabilitation Policy for Silicosis patients was approved and is expected to be notified after approval of Cabinet.

Awareness Activities: Directorate of health services has conducted outdoor awareness activities involving metro trains and metro railings keeping in view widely distributed construction workers engaged all over Delhi.

Rehabilitation Strategies of Health Department: A medical team consisting of occupational health experts' conducted clinical survey of the affected person in Lal Kuan area.

1. A multipurpose Community Health Centre (CHC) for the treatment of the occupational disease has been established at the Tajpur near Lal Kuan.
2. A seed PUHC opened at Lal Kuan to cater the needs of Lal Kuan people.
3. Next of kin of fifteen deceased person's due to silicosis have been compensated @Rs. Four lakh by revenue department.
4. CDMO South east is providing free medical treatment through PUHC, Lalkuan and MO I/c is coordinating for the referral for further management and diagnosis to National Institute of TB and Respiratory Diseases (NITRD), New Delhi through CATS Ambulance.
5. A Workshop on Silicosis was conducted for health care personnel of GNCTD in 2019-20. During 2022-22 could not be organised due to Covid 19.
6. A committee under the chairmanship of Dr J.K. Saini, (MD TB and Chest Disease, NITRD) was constituted for establishing the diagnosis of suspected Silicosis cases. An arrangement has been arrived at with Senior Chest Physician Dr. J. K. Saini of National Institute of Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease for a special weekly OPD for Silicosis cases and suspected cases of Silicosis from Lal Kuan.
7. As majority of old and suspected silicosis patients reside in Lal Kuan, ASHA workers of Lal Kuan Dispensary under CDMO (South East) were sensitised regarding silicosis with

reference to their occupational history and clinical symptoms so that they recognize these patients and bring them in silicosis OPD to ensure free treatment and rehabilitation. These link workers are continuously visiting the area where silicosis affected patients are residing.

8. Further all patients in this area are being screened under RNTCP Programme and provided free treatment at DOTS centre for tuberculosis
9. Reporting of new cases of Silicosis from Hospitals and districts has been started for further follow up and treatment.

The Corona second wave and third wave has affected the activities of NPPCD in Delhi. Nevertheless, we still managed to do significant program activities this year. These are as under

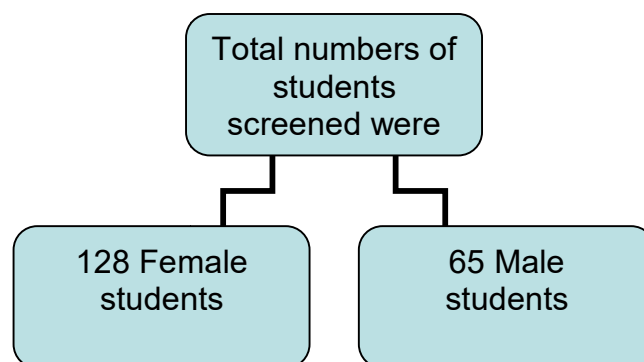

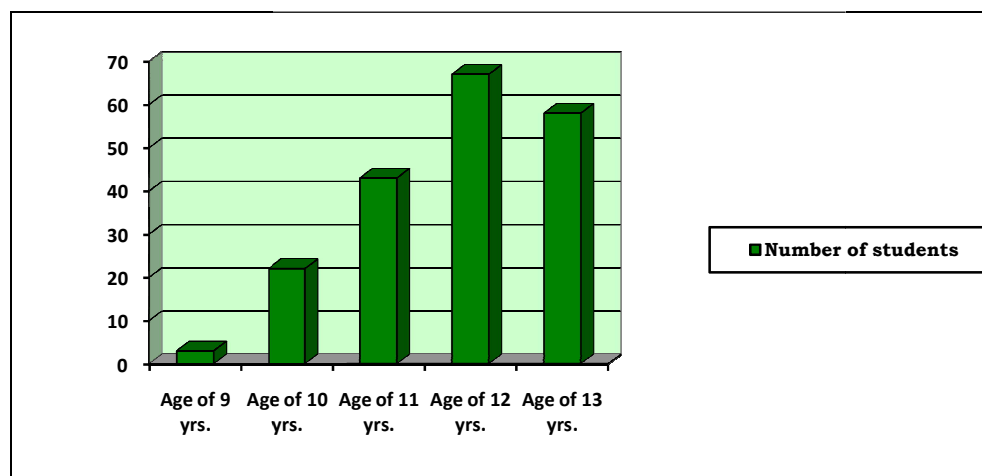
a. Ear Screening camp under School Health Scheme

On 2nd March, 2022 a school screening camp was organised under the school health scheme. Dr. Ravi Meher, Dr. Alok Gupta and Dr A K Agarwal attended it. A screening camp was organised in SKV School No. 2, Shakarpur, Delhi on 2nd March 2022 in collaboration with Medtronic. Medtronic provided technical equipment for ear testing in the school health scheme of East Delhi. Dr. Alok Gupta, ENT Specialist, School Health Scheme coordinated with the school in regard to screening of school children.

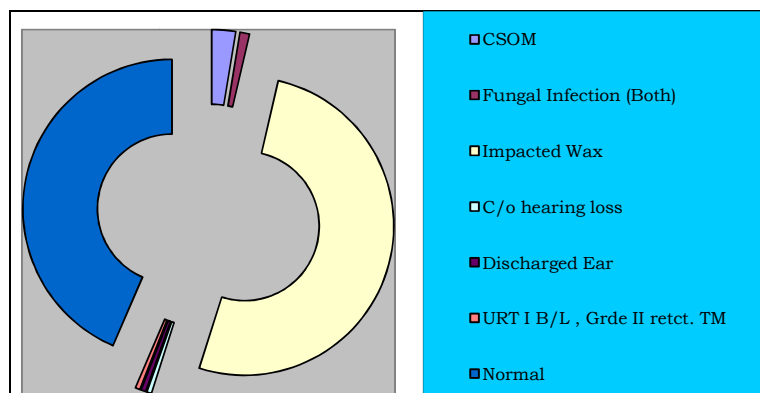
193 students from the 5th and 6th classes were screened of which 128 were female and 65 were male.



These students were from the 9-13 years age group. 3 students were aged 9 years, 22 students were the age of 10 years, 42 students were the age of 11 years, 66 students were the age of 12 years and 57 students were the age of 13 years.



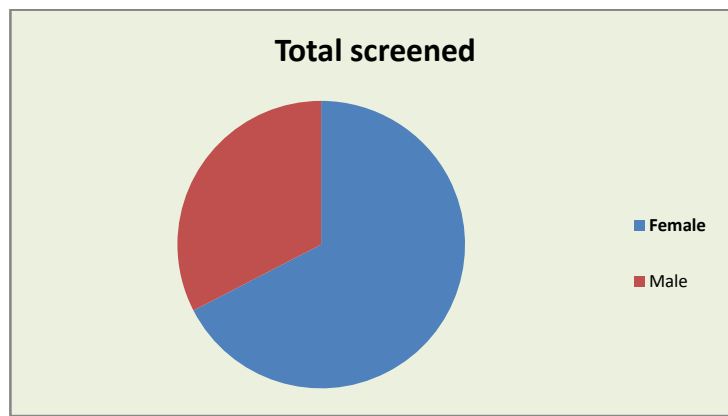
Total of 109 children were diagnosed with ear pathology. It was noticed that a large number of children were suffering from impacted wax in the ears.



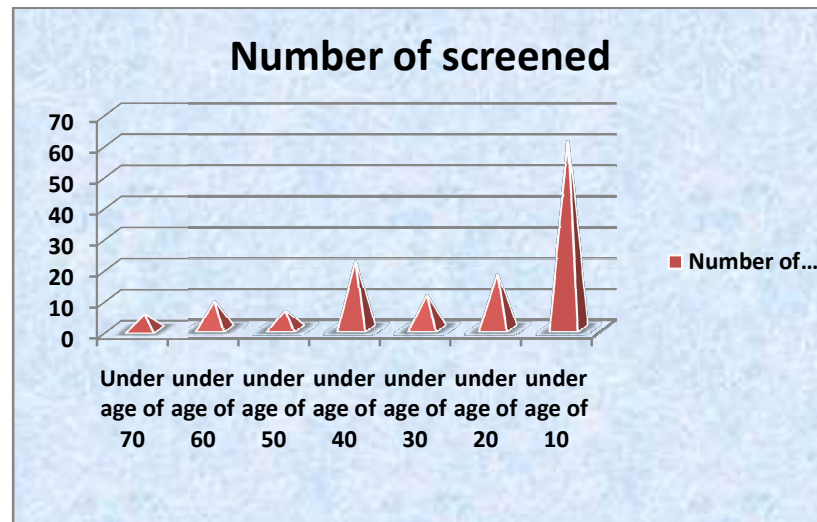
- b. **A press briefing** was also organised by the team of Medtronic and Dr. Ravi Meher which was led by Dr. A.K. Agarwal. He spoke about the importance of creating awareness of Ear and Hearing Care among the people in this digital world. He also focused on the youth for awareness regarding the harm of noise-producing gadgets. Dr. Ravi Meher suggested making screening programs more creative and getting people more aware of ear problems. All government schemes should benefit the community. Dr. Alok Gupta, School Health Scheme talked about the ear care program for school-going children.
- c. **On World Hearing Day**, sensitization program, Screening program, Health talks, quiz, and nukkadnatak were organised and IEC material was displayed at various places including OPDs, Medical Colleges, Offices etc. **“To hear for life, listen with care”** was the theme of World Hearing day this year.
- d. **On 3rd March 2022** a workshop “Tele-otology and Universal Hearing Screening” was conducted by the Department of ENT and PSM, Maulana Azad Medical College was done under NPPCD. The Dean, MAMC and Medical Director also attended the program. The workshop **of ENT Specialists of Delhi State on Tele-otology and Universal Hearing Screening** Program was organised under the aegis of the National Program for Prevention and Control of Deafness (NPPCD) along with Delhi Association of Otolaryngologists and Sound Hearing 2030. State medical officers, ENT doctors of Delhi Govt. hospital of Delhi’s 11 districts, and invited guests have taken part in this seminar. It was attended by more than 180 participants.
- e. **Poster competition** and **Slogan writing competition** was also organised on the theme of **“To hear for life, listen with care”**. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd winners in each category were awarded certificates and prizes. Participation certificates were distributed among the participants of the poster competition. A total of 43 posters were received from many states’ medical and health care institutes. All posters were on the theme of Ear and Hearing Care to guide people in regards to the effects of loud noise, unhygienic practices, and myths. It was also planned to organise a poster exhibition of these posters to review by experts before printing.
- f. All the 11 districts celebrated World Hearing Day by organising Health talks on Ear Care, Ear Screening Camps and awareness activities for general public and school children.
- g. **On 4th March 2022** an IEC material exhibition was displayed in the department of Community Medicine and in front of the reception area of the Dean’s Office. This IEC material was displayed to make new students of the college, staff of medical college, and general visiting people aware of ear and hearing care.
- h. **Ear Screening program under NPPCD-** On 5th March, 2022 another screening camp was successfully organised with the help of Ms. Janki Mehta (Admin. Officer-Sound Hearing 2030). Senior Resident Dr. Raman Sharma and Post Graduate Dr. Abhinav of ENT, MAMC, Ms. Indu Arora (Technical officer), intern Dr. Madhusudan and Dr. Pujan, Ms. Manya Arora (Volunteer) and Ms. Kashish Negi (Volunteer) with school staff organised the camp.

This screening camp was organised for the Barahpulla slum area community at a temple hall in Jungpura.

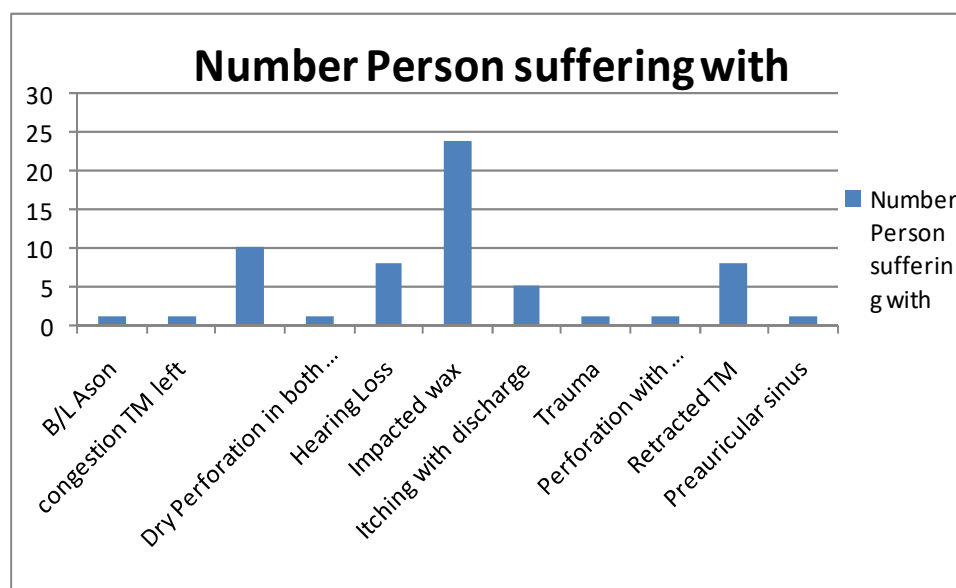
132 students along with their parents were screened. Out of 132, there were 89 females and 43 were males.



- i. **In Nav Abhiyan school children were screened** along with parents in different age groups. Out of 132 people screened, 61 children were of less than 10 years of age, 18 were of age 11-20 and 11 were of 21-30 age group, 22 people were of age group 31-40 and 6 belonged to the age of 41-50. 14 were more than 50 years old.



- j. **Out of 132 people screened,** 24 were suffering from impacted wax, 1 from bilateral ASOM, 1 from Congestion TM, 10 were having hearing loss due to discharged ear, 1 was suffering from the dry perforation in both ears, 8 came with complaint of hearing loss, 5 of them had shown itching ear with discharge, 1 was complaining of trauma and 8 were suffering from tympanic membrane retraction.



k. On 8th March, 2022- 11th March, 2022: Health Talk on Ear and Hearing Care, IEC material display, video- clips, short movies displayed and NukkadNatak performed in Community of Gokul Puri, Balmiki Bast, Barwla, and Delhi Gate Health Care Centers of Maulana Azad Medical College, New Delhi. These activities were organised with the support of Senior Resident Dr. Gurmeet Singh, Dr. Chetana, Dr. Warisha, Dr. Sahdev and Dr. Madan. Post Graduates students along with the ASTRA team supported Sound Hearing 2030 staff to perform NukkadNatak in the community to make awareness regarding the theme of World Hearing Day **“To hear for life, listen with care”**.

1. IEC Material: All 4 health centres displayed IEC material inside and outside for people to create awareness.

m. Audio-Visual display: Community screening camps and health care centres organised audio-video displays to make the theme very clear. The importance of listening and safe listening is promoted through audiovisual displays. IEC material was also shown and explained to the community.

n. Health Talk: Medical officers and Senior Resident doctors had given health talks on Early Identification and Ear and Hearing Care in their health care centres OPD area and made the gathering sensitise about ear and hearing care.

o. A quiz program was performed by Senior Residents and prizes were distributed to the answering persons. In the quiz program the community and general public was very enthusiastic and they participated in large numbers to win prizes also.

p. NukkadNatak: Sound Hearing 2030 with ASTRA project staff organised nukkadnatak on hearing loss due to loud noise of headphones. The Resident Doctor had given a talk on the effects of loud noise on the ear and how to protect our ears from loud noise. The nukkadnatak was focused on the youth and discussed how they can avoid loud noise and protect their ears from developing hearing loss.

Manpower training of Capacity Building under NPPCD Programme: Training of medical officers under NPPCD program in 5 District of Delhi were organised in the month of March, 2022 in which 150 Medical officers participated. Dr, A.K. Agarwal, Dr, Suneela Garg, Dr. Ravi Meher, Dr Suarabh Jain, Dr Geetanji Bugnait and Dr. Rishi Anand were the state level trainers of medical officers. Total 7 training programs for medical officers were organised. It was a full-day training program. The training of medical officers was done under the following program.

1. Orientation
2. Pre-Test
3. Structure of the Ear, Examination of Diseases of Outer Ear, Examination of Diseases of Middle Ear
4. Prevention of Hearing Loss and Deafness under NPPCD
5. Community outreach activities for hearing screening
6. Assessing Hearing, Hearing Aids and Counselling
7. Management of common ear disorders
8. Roles & Responsibility of Medical Officers
9. Post-Test

6.27 FLUOROSIS MITIGATION PROGRAMME

Fluorosis is a disease caused by excess intake of fluoride through drinking water/food products/emission over a long period. It affects multiple systems and results in three major manifestations:-

1. Dental Fluorosis
2. Skeletal Fluorosis
3. Non skeletal fluorosis

It is a public health problem as the late stages of Dental and Skeletal fluorosis have permanent and irreversible effects on the health and wellbeing of an individual and is detrimental to the growth, development and economy of the population.

There is no definitive cure for Fluorosis and treatment is usually by giving supplementary medicines. Deformity is corrected by surgery where possible and rehabilitation by physiotherapy. Prevention is the best way to tackle the problem.

The desirable limits of fluoride as per BIS standard should not exceed 1 ppm or 1 mgmpmper litre but because of its harmful effects it is best be kept as low as possible.

Fluorosis endemic area refers to a habitation/village/ town having fluoride level more than 1.5 ppm in drinking water. It is also possible that the drinking water fluoride may be safe with Fluoride <1.5 mg/l; but have all health complaints of Fluorosis. Fluoride entry to the body may be due to food / beverages / snacks / street food with Black Rock Salt consumption which has 157ppm Fluoride.

It affects men, women and children of all ages.

Symptoms of Fluorosis:-

- a. Dental changes – chalky white tooth with mottled appearance
- b. Pain & stiffness of major joints (not the joints in toes and fingers)
- c. Deformities of lower limb in children.
- d. Most importantly history of complaints – with focus on Non-skeletal Fluorosis

Diagnosis

A diagnosis of Fluorosis is to be suspected if a person reports with the characteristic symptoms of Fluorosis from an endemic area.

Any suspected case can be confirmed after retrieval of a clinical history, by the following tests

- Any suspected case with high level of fluoride in urine ($>1\text{mg/L}$).
- Any suspected case with interosseous membranecalcification in the forearm confirmed by X-ray Radiograph.
- Any suspected case, if kidney ailment is prevailing, serum fluoride need to be tested, besides urine fluoride.

The identified cases shall be confirmed by

- i. Physical examination i.e., dental changes, pain and stiffness of peripheral joints, skeletal deformities.
- ii. Laboratory tests i.e. urine and drinking water analysis for fluoride level and where possible.
- iii. Radiological examination i.e. X-ray of forearm, X-ray of most affected part.

National Program for Prevention and Control of Fluorosis:

After a survey high levels of Fluoride were reported in 230 districts of 20 States of India. The population at risk as per population in habitations with high fluoride is 11.7 million as on 1.4.2014. Rajasthan, Gujarat and Andhra Pradesh are worst affected states. Punjab, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra are moderately affected states while Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and Assam are mildly affected states.

The Rajiv Gandhi National Drinking Water Mission worked for Fluorosis Control between the years 1987- 1993.

In 2008-2009, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India launched a National Programme for Prevention and Control of Fluorosis.

In Delhi, the Fluorosis Mitigation Program works for the prevention and control of Fluorosis.

The Objectives of the Fluorosis Mitigation Program, Delhi are:

1. To collect and assess data of Fluorosis cases and report onwards.
2. Monitoring areas where there is a suspicion of fluorosis.
3. Capacity building for prevention, diagnosis and management of Fluorosis cases.

Strategy:

1. Capacity building (Human Resource) by training, manpower support.
2. Surveillance in the community especially in school children and coordinating for water surveys on suspicion.
3. Management of fluorosis cases including treatment, surgery, rehabilitation by the means of early detection, health detection and creation of awareness and medical management.

ACTIVITIES PLANNED

- Awareness-cum-Training Programme for Medical Officers of PHC and District Hospitals about general symptoms of fluorosis and preventive management and also for paramedical workers, ICDS workers, PRI functionaries, teachers in the community.
- Community surveillance by organizing diagnostic health camps.

- Awareness of the general public by IEC and other activities.

Role of NGOs

A collaboration of forces with a common goal is always considered more effective in achieving its objective and with more ease. Hence collaboration with NGOs dedicated to the cause of prevention of Fluorosis can never be ruled out. With a mutual understanding and clear definition of roles, a healthy partnership can be created.

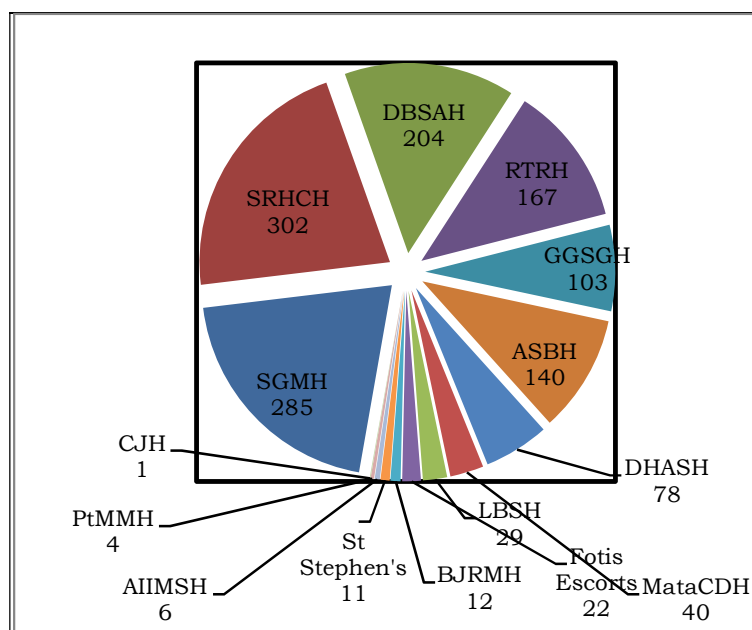
Fluorosis Reporting and Status of Fluorosis in Delhi:

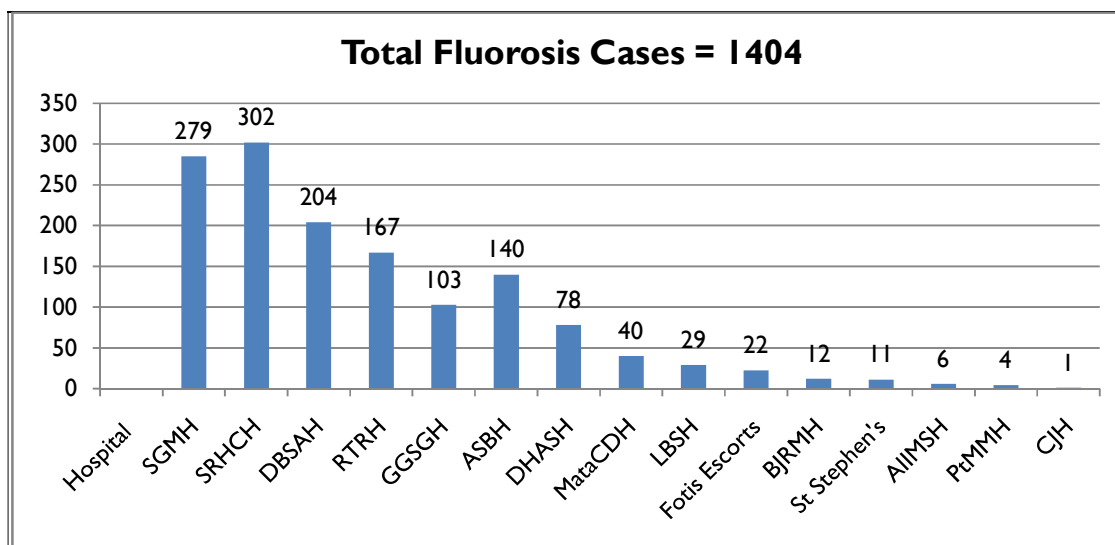
Data of new fluorosis cases from hospitals are collected and compiled for onward submission.

Fortunately Delhi does not come under the designated endemic areas of Fluorosis. However, the data collected from Hospitals in last five years indicate that Northwest, North, South-West and west districts are still reporting significant number of Dental Fluorosis cases.

6.28 TOBACCO CONTROL PROGRAMME

- There are two tobacco related laws for Delhi.
- First law called **“Delhi Prohibition of Smoking and Non-Smokers Health Protection Act 1996”**.
- Second law is **Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act (COTPA) 2003** enacted by MoHFW GoI.
- For the implementation of COTPA 2003, NTCP launched in 2008.
- Delhi is among the first few states which implemented COTPA 2003.
- Strict enforcement of these acts is the main objective and Purpose of tobacco control Programme.

Since, Education Dept. is one of the main stakeholder departments under the National Tobacco Control Programme, sensitization of students and training of teachers is widely being advocated. During the COVID-19 pandemic, regular continuous webinars are being conducted by STCC for school teachers and students.

C. MAJOR ACTIVITY GOING ON UNDER TOBACCO CONTROL PROGRAMME IN DELHI:

1. DRY DAY FOR TOBACCO ON LAST DAY OF EVERY MONTH:

Government of Delhi is observing DRY DAY for TOBACCO on last day of every month. On this particular day we appeal to all Tobacco Vendors for not to sell any Tobacco Products and also to Public for not to consume any Tobacco Products on that day. This is on voluntary mode only. We publicized this concept to Government / Private Offices/Departments and various social Medias. Apart from this, Intensive Awareness & Enforcement Drives are being conducted throughout Delhi on this day. Every month a different theme is used and particular population is targeted for awareness cum enforcement drive under various sections of COTPA, 2003. This year **12 DRY DAY for Tobacco were observed.**

TOBACCO FREE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE GUIDELINES

Regular online trainings/webinars are being conducted in various schools of Delhi. Students are sensitized regarding harmful effects of tobacco along with tobacco industry manipulations to target young children and teachers are sensitized regarding revised TOFEI guidelines and Cigarettes and other tobacco products act 2003. Till date Self Evaluation Scorecard under TOFEI has been collected from nearly **2500 schools in Delhi.**

2. TOBACCO FREE DELHI INITIATIVE:

A campaign to Make Delhi Tobacco Free has been initiated with the aim to make Delhi, Tobacco Free Capital of India in phase manner. **The main focus stakeholder departments are Delhi Police, Transport, Education and Health.** Other departments will also be included gradually. The following activities has been focused under this initiative-

- Display **‘Tobacco Free Zone’** board at the entrance of boundary wall in Hindi & English languages.
- Display of **‘No – Smoking Signage’** along with the name and contact detail of Nodal Officer within the building at entrance, reception, prominent places of every floor, staircase, lift and other important places.
- **Banning selling of tobacco products in all building under the departments by issuing self administrative order.**
- IEC programme / awareness generation programme. Maximum utilization of departmental display board for dissemination of anti – tobacco messages.
- Ensure No-Smoking / Tobacco Free status within the premises.
- Instruction also sent for fine / challan procedure in case of non compliance of Tobacco Control Legislations & presence of direct evidence of smoking / use of gutkha like tobacco products within the premises.
- Ensuring ban on direct / indirect advertisement of Tobacco Products on State / Interstate Bus Services / Taxies / Autos / Trucks / Tempos /Others.
- Display of Anti – Tobacco messages on Transport Department Properties, public service vehicles and bus / train / flight tickets etc.
- Ensuring Smoke free / Gutkha like Tobacco free status in all public service vehicles – Buses, Taxis, Autos etc.
- Apart from that regular inspection / monitoring is being conducted through State as well District Units.

3. DLCC

- State cell has done lot of efforts in getting the District Level Coordination Committee constituted in all 11 districts in this year. Thereby, the programme implementation has further strengthened at district level.

- Three state level review Meeting-Cum Workshop conducted during 2021-22.
- Districts have also conducted appx. 15 sensitization trainings in Schools, Health, DTC DEPO and with Delhi Police.

6. SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAMME

TOBACCO FREE SCHOOL / Educational institute INITIATIVE- Tobacco Free School Initiative has been started under the umbrella of Tobacco Free Delhi Initiative and In the FY 2021-22, 2500 Educational Institutes have submitted Self Evaluation Scorecards under TOFEI.

7. IEC

- Many Govt. offices in various districts were provided Tobacco Free Zone Boards and No Smoking Signages.
- IEC material in the form of banner, poster has been placed in all the vaccination centres, dispensaries, hospitals etc. regarding how tobacco use increases the severity and transmission of COVID-19.
- IEC material was circulated through the Director Education to all the schools on the theme of WHO for World No Tobacco Day 2021-Protecting Youth from Tobacco Industry Manipulation and preventing them from tobacco and nicotine use.
- IEC advertisement through newspaper was also done to make public aware regarding the harmful effects of tobacco in general public and how tobacco use increases the transmission and severity of COVID-19 on the eve of WNTD 2021.
- IEC advertisement through various radio channels in the form of radio jingle was done to make the public aware of effects of tobacco use; on increase in vulnerability of COVID-19, tobacco spitting on increase in transmission of SARS-CoV2 how children should not fall prey to the tactics of tobacco companies.

8. WORLD NO TOBACCO DAY 2021

- World No Tobacco Day is being celebrated every year on 31st May.
- Various IEC activities were done during WNTD last year in 2021.

9. WNTD DURING THIS YEAR

- Fortnight campaign on the occasion of WNTD 2022 observed.

- For prevention and control of COVID-19, with the efforts of STCC Delhi, use of hookah (with and without tobacco i.e herbal hookah, water pipes & other hookah like devices) was prohibited in all public places including hotels, restaurants, eatery houses, bars, pubs, discotheques etc. of the NCT of Delhi on 03/08/2020.
- Many districts with help of SDM, Delhi Police have Challaned many hotels for violating the above order.
- Total number of Challans issued in section 4 of COTPA, 2003 in the above period is 2623 & amount Challaned- Rs. 261940.
- Permission was taken from Hon'ble Minister of Health GNCTD for testing of many brands of Pan Masala in collaboration with Food Safety Dept. GNCTD. The testing was successfully done for 8 brands of Pan Masala.
- All types of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS) were banned pan India. Letters have been written to Delhi Police for implementing the same.
- All the schools were sensitized regarding the harmful effects of ENDS Devices and were informed regarding their ban.
- Self Evaluation Score card for Tobacco Free Educational Institution has been circulated to all the schools of Delhi and the forms have been collected from 2500 schools and compiled for analysis.

- Refreshment was provided to all participating students and lunch was given to all the faculty members from LNH and Bhaskaracharya College and to NSS volunteers from Bhaskaracharya college.
- Students who screened positive underwent posttest counselling regarding need for confirmation by HPLC/capillary electrophoresis which was performed in the genetic lab, Lok Nayak Hospital on the same stored blood sample.
- Record keeping was done both in excel sheet and in register.
- After the camp concluded, the biomedical waste was transported back to LN Hospital for proper disposal.

Follow-up at the Genetic lab:

- Six screened positive samples were subjected to capillary electrophoresis at the genetic lab, LNH. Of these two were found to have raised HbA2 fraction, suggestive of Beta Thalassemia minor.
- The above students were telephonically contacted for post-test counselling and were offered genetic testing. Molecular confirmation for the same is pending.

All the camp activities were carried out with due social distancing as per COVID appropriate behavior.

Workflow of activities at the camp:

- Banners, hoardings and standies were installed at the screening site.
- An awareness talk was given by Dr Sunita Jetly and Dr. Ranjana Mishra and Dr. Kanika Singh.
- A pretest counselling of all the participating students was done by Dr Ranjana and Dr Kanika.
- After an informed written consent, 3-4 ml blood sample was withdrawn and subjected to coulter machine for calculation of CBC and RBC indices. Mentzer Index (MCV/RBC) was calculated for each student and a value below cut off of 13 was taken as screen positive. The printed reports were handed over to students within 15-20 minutes.
- Refreshment was provided to all participating students and lunch was given to all the faculty members from LNH and ANDC
- Students who screened positive underwent posttest counselling regarding need for confirmation by HPLC/capillary electrophoresis which was performed in the genetic lab, Lok Nayak Hospital on the same stored blood sample.
- Record keeping was done both in excel sheet and in register.
- After the camp concluded, the biomedical waste was transported back to LN Hospital for proper disposal.

Follow-up at the Genetic lab:

- Ten screened positive samples were subjected to capillary electrophoresis at the genetic lab, LNH. Of these one was found to have raised HbD fraction, suggestive of HbD Punjab carrier status.
- The above students were telephonically contacted for post-test counselling and were offered genetic testing. Molecular confirmation for the same is pending.

All the camp activities were carried out with due social distancing as per COVID appropriate behavior.

C. Prenatal diagnosis: Screening of antenatal mothers coming to the antenatal OPD for confirmation of carrier status using HPLC/capillary Electrophoresis Hb and RBC indices. Pre-test counselling in the antenatal clinic regarding need for RBC indices and need for HPLC as well as recalling the spouse for screening in case the antenatal mother is found positive ion screening. After screening by Hb and RBC indices and further confirmation by HPLC, tests are

carried based on DNA testing of both the parents. Once the variation in the DNA is identified in both the partners, the same variation (mutation) is then identified in the fetus by a fetal medicine specialist. The process of obtaining the sample from the fetus is carried out under strict ultrasound monitoring to identify the location of placenta and continuous monitoring is required for the next 3 hours for the patient. Post-test counselling regarding the possibility of the fetus being affected, needs to be delivered gently and sensitively to the family present at the time of procedure.

Along with screening for Thalassemia & Hemoglobinopathies, screening for Aneuploidies like Down syndrome and Edward syndrome is also advocated. Other tests like HbsAg, HIV & Anti HCV testing are essential prior to invasive testing which involves chorionic villus sampling (CVS) or Amniocentesis. For patients coming after 18 weeks the procedure is called Cordocentesis. In the process of Thalassemia or Hemoglobinopathy screening, if both the partners are identified to be carriers, DNA testing is required. DNA extraction has to be carried out from the blood obtained from both partners after due informed test and pre-test counselling. After initial DNA testing screening of the both the parents and DNA. The procedure of DNA extraction from the Chorionic Villi sample (CVS) is handled properly to avoid any maternal cell contamination. Mutation screening and sequencing analysis is then performed.

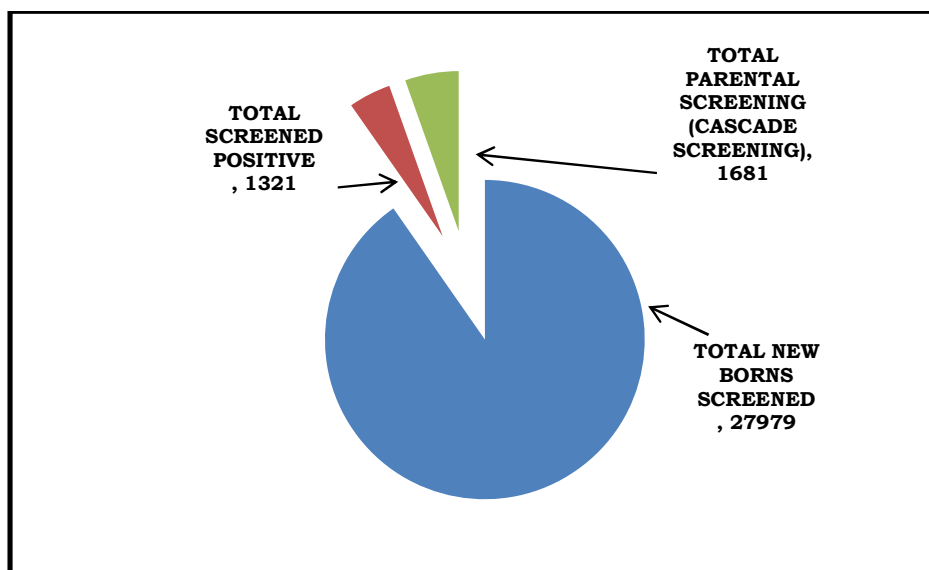
D. Postgraduate theses related to hemoglobinopathy/thalassemia screening in newborns:

1. *“Prevalence of Beta Globin gene mutations in newborns using cut-off of less than or equal to 15% of HbA”* - The study's objective was to find the prevalence of beta globin gene mutation in newborns using a cutoff of less than or equal to 15%. A total of 2600 newborns were screened out of which preterms and babies having other hemoglobin variants were excluded. A total of 276 newborns were found to be screen positive. Out of which 91 consented to participate in the study, their parents were tested with HPLC. Newborns who had either parent as carriers were further confirmed by ARMS PCR, 12 newborns were found to be having common mutations out of which one was heterozygous for IVS 1-5 mutations. 2 did not have any common mutations. The prevalence of beta globin gene mutation below this cut-off was 15.4%. AROC curve was plotted to analyse the performance of HbA% as a screening test. It was found that a cut off less than or equal to 12.4% had a sensitivity of 93% and a specificity of 56%
2. *“Identification of Hemoglobin variants by Newborn screening”*. The study's objective was to find the prevalence of hemoglobin variants in newborns and co inherited variants in family members of the index cases. A total of 2600 newborns were screened out of which preterms and babies having other hemoglobin variants were removed. A total of 67 newborns were found to be screen positive parents of babies found to be positive were tested with HPLC. Thirty patients had HbD, 11 had Hb bart, 17 had HBS, and 9 had HbE and only 1 case of HbC was detected. Newborns who had either parent as carriers were further confirmed by ARMS PCR. Six out of 30 HbD, 7 of HbS were found to be homozygous, 1 case of HbE beta thal was found. The prevalence of hemoglobin variants was found to be 3.1% with max prevalence of HbD to be 1.4%. A ROC curve was plotted to analyse the performance of HbA% as a screening test for HbD and HbS hemoglobinopathy. A cut of 17.6% HbD was predicted for homozygosity in HbD and 57.4 of HbS was predicted for HbS hemoglobinopathy. With a sensitivity of 100% in both and specificity of 96% and 91.7% respectively.

E. Newborn screening for Thalassemia/Hemoglobinopathy- Done via heel prick and blood sample collected on filter paper.

F. Initiation of procurement of 3/5 compartment autoanalyzer:

The process of procurement of 3/5 compartment autoanalyzer has been initiated. The specifications for the same have been collated and technical committee for the same has been constituted. These autoanalyzers are planned to be installed in Pathology dept or Gynae side labs depending upon the ANC OPD burden.

G. Purchase of Capillary Sequencer:

A capillary sequencer (ABI 3500) has been procured which will enable sequencing of the HBB gene, responsible for the thalassemia disorder. This step is needed when testing for the common Indian thalassemia mutations is negative and previously this could not be done at this lab.

H. Purchase of USG machine:

An Ultrasound machine has been purchased for fetal medicine unit, which will assist in a high-quality real-time ultrasound guided prenatal diagnostic procedures like chorionic villus sampling, amniocentesis and cordocentesis. These latest and technologically advanced equipment are installed in the already existing space within the lab and the fetal medicine unit respectively and they form the cornerstones of the Thalassemia screening program.

“Timely Screening Prevents Each Thalassaemia Birth”.

6.30 PPP DIALYSIS

This branch is looking after dialysis services being provided on Public Private Partnership mode in GNCTD hospitals. The dialysis facility on PPP mode is being provided under the following Project and Programme:-

I. PPP Dialysis Project, GNCT Delhi: The objective is to provide high quality haemodialysis services at low price to the entire populace of Delhi and free of cost to poor & identified patients. Under this project, the Dialysis Centres are functioning in three Delhi Govt. Hospitals on PPP mode with following number of dialysis machines:-

1. Lok Nayak Hospital – 10 machines.
2. Rajiv Gandhi Super Speciality Hospital – 30 machines.
3. Dr. Hedgewar Arogya Sansthan – 20 machines.

Achievements under PPP Dialysis Project, GNCT Delhi (2021-22):

6.31 PROJECT DIVISION

1. Free Non-Radiological Diagnostics:

DGHS being the Intra-Nodal Coordinating agency for all health related activities for the Health Department floated an e-Tender for outsourcing of laboratory services (Non Radiological) for AAMCs, Polyclinics and Mobile Health Camps of Delhi Government bearing Tender Ref. No. AAMC_DGHS_LAB vide Tender ID: 2019_DGHS_178837, inviting bids from probable vendors /agencies/diagnostic laboratories, desirous of participating in the said tender.

Cabinet Approval vide Cabinet Decision No. 2527 Dated: 15.12.2017 was accorded by the Council of Ministers.

The tender is Sample Based, wherein samples have been categorized into three groups i.e Sample Group “A”, “B” and “C”. The grouping is based on the frequency of the tests prescribed by the clinicians. This grouping has been made whereby the most commonly prescribed test has been placed under Sample Group “A” and the rarely prescribed and costly test under group “C”.

Outsourcing of the OPD Laboratory Diagnostics (Non Radiological) from the Mohalla Clinics, Polyclinics and Mobile Health Camps is under implementation w.e.f. 01-01-2020.

There has been a declining trend during the year due to lockdown and various containments measure taken for COVID-19 pandemic.

*The tender is under extension w.e.f. 01.01.2022 onwards as a new tender is under processing.

2. Good Samaritan:

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India has issued guidelines for the protection of Good Samaritans in the WRIT PETITION (C) No. 235 of 2012 (Save life Foundation and Others Versus Union of India and Others).

In this regard, the implementation of the scheme of "Good Samaritan" by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi has been approved vide Cabinet Decision No. 2456 dated: 06-01-2017 on pilot basis and thereafter, as a regular scheme vide Cabinet Decision No. 2752 dated: 03-10-2019.

The Scheme provides for incentivization of Good Samaritans / Bystanders for the humanitarian act of transporting road traffic accident victims to hospitals for immediate medical attention within golden hour. Financial incentive of Rs. 2000/- (Rupees Two Thousand) only, per victim and an Appreciation Certificate is being given to the Good Samaritans / Bystanders.

The scheme is under implementation w.e.f. April 2018-19 by all health care service providers, both public and private within the territorial jurisdiction of GNCTD.

The achievements under the Scheme are tabled below:

The performance under this scheme has been affected by the Covid -19 pandemic due to lockdown and most of the health institutes being declared as Covid dedicated facilities.

3. Tele-radiology:

A feasibility study of the existing manpower and equipment status / availability and future procurements was undertaken with respect to the proposal for Tele-radiology in Delhi Government Hospitals. Many of the health institutions failed to provide their information sought by the Projects Division, DGHS.

Data inputs pertaining to the details of Equipment, HR and work output still awaited from hospitals which is required to facilitate the tendering process.

A bid document for Health Information Management System (HIMS) is also under consideration in the Projects Branch wherein, provision for inclusion of PACS has been mooted. However, now PACS has been excluded in the HIMS tender.

Draft tender is under consideration for outsourcing of the X-ray services from the hospitals on Tele-radiology mode.

All non essential and non emergency activities were on hold as all infrastructure and manpower was diverted for COVID-19 activities.

4. Training of Auto-Rickshaw Drivers on Adult First Aid:

The Directorate General of Health Services, GNCTD proposes to motivate, encourage and capacitate the auto-rickshaw drivers in Delhi on adult First-Aid to facilitate the initiative of Good Samaritan Scheme.

The auto drivers have been identified to popularize the Good Samaritan Scheme due to their presence in every nook and corner of Delhi. The auto-rickshaws are also one of the common modes of public transport. Further the auto-rickshaws are available and operational round the clock. They are also conversant with the geographical locations of various hospitals in the locality where they operate. The training of auto-rickshaw drivers would facilitate the presence of trained cadre of Good Samaritans under the Good Samaritan incentive scheme so that road Traffic victims are reached to hospitals for immediate medical attention and within the golden hour.

Due to COVID-19 appropriate behavior / restrictions the training proposal was put on hold as the Training on Adult First Aid is a Hands on Training requiring physical presence of the trainees.

All non essential and non emergency activities were on hold as all infrastructure and manpower was diverted for COVID-19 activities.

5. Health Helpline:

The Government intends setting up an inbound and an outbound Medical Helpline for the convenience of the general public.

The Health Helpline envisages to provide the following services:

- i. Information Directory for tracking health services providers / institutions diagnostic services, hospitals etc.
- ii. Complaint Registration about person/ institution relating to deficiency of services, negligence corruption, etc. in government healthcare institutions.
- iii. Advice on long term ill conditions like diabetes, heart issues etc.
- iv. Response to health scares and other localized epidemics.
- v. Counseling and advice (stress, depression, anxiety, post-trauma recovery, HIV AIDS / RTI, STI).
- vi. Health and symptoms checker (initial assessment, flu advice, pregnancy related information etc).
- viii. First aid information/advice.
- ix. Any other health related services.

This call center will function as a public 24X7 Toll- free helpline.

RFP has been finalized and has been published on the e-procurement site of the Govt. of NCTD of Delhi in January 2022. Tender related activities are in progress.

6. Installation of Mobile Towers in institutions under H & FW, GNCT of Delhi:

The proposal for infrastructure development by installation of mobile towers in Delhi Government institutions for improving cellular communication services has been put up. However, due to the remodeling of the dispensaries and the hospital the proposal has been kept on hold.

7. Aam Aadmi Dental Clinics:

A High Level Dental Committee has been constituted for providing a roadmap for the implementation of dental health in Delhi. The report of the committee is awaited.

A Dental Cell has been established for the implementation of Dental Health in Delhi.

8. Pradhan Mantri Bharatiya Jan Aushadi Pariyojna (PMBJP):

The Government of India has rolled out the establishment of Generic Pharmacies under the banner of Pradhan Mantri Bharatiya Jan Aushadi Pariyojna (PMBJP).

The project has been kept in abeyance in view of the policy of the commitment of the Delhi Government to ensure 100% availability of all essential drugs free of cost to the patients visiting Delhi Government Health Facilities for treatment.

9. Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar:

Under the EWS Scheme of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi all private hospitals which have been provided land free of cost are required to provide 25% OPD and 10% IPD services.

Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar has a large no. of beds under the EWS Scheme. However, the optimal utilization of the IPD beds required to be strengthened as the EWS patients have to bear out of pocket expenses on drugs and consumable at Apollo Hospital.

Therefore DGHS has mooted a proposal for establishing a Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital to facilitate the availability of free generic medicines to EWS patients being treated and managed in IPD and OPD of Apollo Hospital.

A Porta-cabin has been constructed in front of Apollo Hospital for this purpose.

The modality for procurement/distribution of generic drug is yet to be finalized.

10. Hospital Information Management System (HIMS):

The Govt. of NCT of Delhi has envisaged leveraging the advances in the IT sector to implement a state of the art Hospital Information Management System (HIMS) in all the health facilities of Delhi Govt.

The vendor has been finalized and work on the development of the software is under process.

11. Academic Programmes abroad for the in service Medical Professionals / Paramedical / Nursing Staff of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi.

The Govt. of NCT of Delhi has proposed to facilitate and enable Academic Programmes abroad for the in service Medical Professionals/Paramedical/Nursing Staff of the health department.

A multidimensional committee of experts has been constituted for deliberating and submission of proposal for encompassing all aspects of the proposed scheme.

Proposal for Short Term Courses for MOs/ Specialists/ Nurses has been received from BAPIO. Draft MoU is under consideration and identification of courses/institutions is under process. Proposal could not be finalized in view of various containment measures and travel restrictions taken for COVID-19 pandemic. All non essential and non emergency activities were on hold as all infrastructure and manpower was diverted for COVID-19 activities.

12. Other Activities

All other works like tendering activities, inquiry of vigilance cases, processing of condemnation of DGHS (HQ) are being performed as delegated by Competent Authority.

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Chapter 7

NATIONAL HEALTH PROGRAMMES

7.1 DELHI STATE HEALTH MISSION

National Rural Health Mission was launched on 13/04/2005 across the country. However, in line with National Rural Health Mission, Delhi State Health Mission was notified in October 2006.

On 15/05/2013 National Urban Health Mission was launched as a sub mission of National Health Mission with National Rural Health Mission being the other sub mission.

The implementation is done through State Health Society (Delhi) at the State level under the Chairmanship of Secretary Health and Family Welfare, GNCTD and 11 Integrated District Health Societies at the district level under the Chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner (Revenue).

State Program Management Unit and 11 District Program Management Units have been setup to implement these programs as per approval of the State Program Implementation Plan received from Govt. of India.

Various programs implemented under Delhi State Health Mission are as per following details:-

REPRODUCTIVE, MATERNAL, NEWBORN, CHILD AND ADOLESCENT HEALTH:

Some Key Initiatives under RCH are as follows:

MATERNAL HEALTH:-

Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY):-

The scheme aims to promote institutional delivery amongst BPL / SC / ST families. The pregnant women belonging to SC / ST / BPL category are incentivized for undergoing institutional delivery in urban and rural area with Rs. 600/- and 700/- respectively and BPL women is also incentivized with Rs. 500/- in case of home delivery.

Janani Shisu Suraksha Karyakram (JSSK):-

The scheme was launched in Delhi State w.e.f. September 2011. The scheme aims to provide free and cashless service to all pregnant women irrespective of any caste or economical status including normal deliveries and caesarean operations, for antenatal & postnatal complications and to sick infants (from birth to 1 year of age) in all Government health institutions. The scheme aims to mitigate the burden of out of pocket expenses incurred by families of pregnant women and sick infants.

Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matritva Abhiyan (PMSMA):-

Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matritva Abhiyan envisages to improve the quality and coverage of Antenatal Care (ANC), Diagnostics and Counselling services as part of the Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn Child and Adolescent Health (RMNCH+A) Strategy.

Family Planning Activities:-

The State of Delhi has a population of over 20 million as per Census 2011. The salient achievements in terms of Family Planning services are a drop in the growth rate in last 10 years and achievement of **Total Fertility Rate of 1.5 (SRS 2018)**. The national goal of 2.1 was achieved in the year 2005.

Routine Immunization:-

Including Mission Indradhanush to improve immunization coverage in Delhi.

Mission Flexi-pool

Operationalization of Ambulances:-

Centralized Accident Trauma Services is being supported for operationalization of basic life support ambulance and Patient Transport Ambulances procured through DSHM as per National Health Mission norms.

As on date, 215 ambulances are functional.

National Iodine Deficiency Disorder Control Programme:-

This involves surveillance of Iodization status in the community and Iodization of salt in Delhi.

National Urban Health Mission

Coverage of unserved / underserved areas:-

Almost all the unserved / underserved areas have been identified across the State. 60 Seed PUHCs have been set up under this initiative.

Health Management Information System (HMIS):-

Dedicated web portal for capturing all Public health / indicator based information from the end source and generate reports / trends to assist in planning and monitoring activities. Data generated at facility level is captured on this web based portal on monthly basis. At present Delhi Govt., MCD, CGHS & ESI, NDMC, Autonomous societies, NGOs & other health facilities (dispensaries & hospitals) are reporting on HMIS on monthly basis. Excluding these facilities, some Private hospitals and nursing homes are also reporting on HMIS Portal. The performance of health care services is being utilized by various departments of State and GOI for monitoring and planning health policies and strategies.

ASHA:-

The health care delivery system is linked to the community with the help of Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs). At present, State has 6036 ASHAs (approx.) in place. These ASHAs have been trained in knowledge and skills required for mobilizing and facilitating the community members to avail health care services. They also provide the home based care for mothers and newborns, identify and help the sick individuals for prompt access of the available health services. They also help in field level implementation of National Health Programs, facilitate checkup of senior citizens. Certain State specific incentives have been added to the National list to provide better services and a sustainable package for ASHAs. ASHAs are also actively engaged in survey of containment zones, follow-up of Home isolation cases and community awareness activities under COVID-19.

Mobile Dental Clinics:-

Operationalization of 2 Mobile Dental Clinics & 4 Mobile Dental IEC Vans is being done by MAIDS to provide dental care in Primary Health Care facilities of vulnerable area with support of Delhi State Health Mission.

Rogi Kalyan Samitis:-

Rogi Kalyan Samiti (Hospital) is a simple, effective management structure registered under the Society Registration Act. It is facilitating and supporting structure for supplementing the management at hospital / dispensary.

At present, 26 hospitals in Delhi have a registered Rogi Kalyan Samiti of which 26 are Delhi Govt. Hospitals. Besides these, Rogi Kalyan Samiti are registered in 8 Maternity Homes of East Delhi Municipal Corporation

Quality Assurance: Hospitals have been accredited at the National level as per compliance with **National Quality Assurance Standards (NQAS) including LaQshya.. KAYAKALP** assessment has been completed for all 41 Hospitals.

Communicable Disease Flexible Pool

Integrated disease Surveillance program (IDSP):-

IDSP is a decentralized program intended to detect Early Warning Signals (EWS) of impending outbreak of epidemic prone diseases and help to initiate an effective response in a timely manner with State Surveillance Unit (SSU) at DHS and 11 District Surveillance Units (DSUs) at present.

22 epidemic prone diseases and 5 state specific diseases are covered under IDSP and data is collected from various reporting units (DGDs/SPUHC/MCD dispensaries and Hospitals / ESIC / Railway / CGHS / Medical colleges / Private hospitals) in S, P & L formats and compiled & entered in IDSP portal on weekly basis.

National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme (NVBDCP):-

NVBDCP is for the prevention and control of vector borne diseases i.e. Malaria, Dengue, Chikungunya, Kala-Azar, Japanese Encephalitis and Lymphatic Filariasis in

India. Sentinel surveillance hospitals, blood banks and mother labs are strengthened to control VBDs

National Leprosy Eradication Programme (NLEP):-

There is a strong political commitment to further reduce the burden of leprosy. NLEP is ensuring availability of MDT Drugs through districts to all health care institutions Disability Care and Medical Rehabilitation including reconstructive surgeries (RCS)

National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP):-

(Er. Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme); Delhi has been implementing the NTEP with DOTS strategy since 1997. Delhi State NTEP was been merged with NRHM (DSHM) w.e.f. 01.04.2013. The Delhi State NTEP is being implemented through a decentralized flexible mode through 25 Chest Clinics equivalent to District TB Centre (DTC). Out of 25 Chest Clinics, MCD are running 12, GNCTD-10, NDMC -1, GoI-1 and NGO-1 chest clinics respectively.

A Vision for TB Free Nation by 2025 with the goal of zero death and end of the Global TB Epidemic.

Non Communicable Disease Flexible Pool

National Program for Control of Blindness (NPCB):-

The main objective of the program:

- Prevention of blindness by cataract surgery.
- Free spectacles for school going children and
- Prevention of diabetic retinopathy
- Creation of Eye Banks

National Program for Healthcare of Elderly (NPHCE):-

Under National Programme for Health care of elderly it is planned to open eleven Geriatric Clinics and Wards for Senior Citizens in eleven district hospitals to prioritize the preferential health care to elderly people

National Tobacco Control Program (NTCP):-

Under the mission the program is being implemented in two districts i.e. New Delhi & East only. The main objectives are awareness / sensitization / training and enforcement of Tobacco Control Acts-COTPA 2003 and Delhi Act 1996. The other activities are implementing Tobacco control in coordination with various dept like police, transport, food safety, education, industry and excise / VAT Dept. etc to make Delhi tobacco free capital of India.

National Mental Health Program (NMHP):-

District mental health program is being implemented in 5 districts of Delhi by Institute of Human Behaviour and Allied Services (IHBAS).

National Viral Hepatitis Control Program (NVHCP):-

The program is being implemented since 2019-20. A model treatment Centre has been set up at Lok Nayak Hospital and set up of other Centers is underway.

Pradhan Mantri National Dialysis Programme (PMNDP):-

60 machines have been operationalized on PPP mode. All BPL are provided free service.

COVID:-

Delhi State Health Mission was supported by NHM with financial resources under India COVID 19 Emergency Response and Health System Preparedness Package in the F.Y 2020-21.

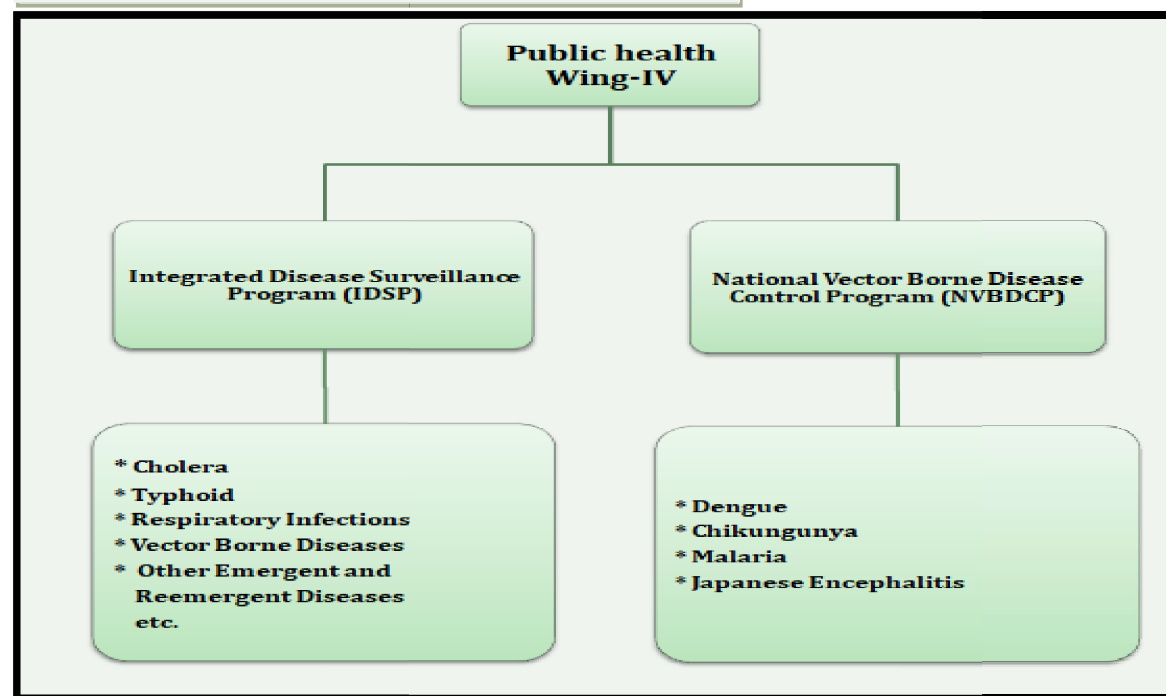
Funds were provided to hospitals, districts and other agencies to undertake critical activities for containment and surveillance of pandemic, ramping up testing and treatment facilities, procurement of essential supplies, mobility, IEC activities and engagement of critical Human Resource.

7.2 INTEGRATED DISEASE SURVEILLANCE PROJECT

Introduction

Public Health is the science and art of preventing disease, prolonging life, and promoting health and efficiency through organized community effort for the sanitation of the environment, the control of communicable infections, the education of the individual in personal hygiene, the organization of medical and nursing services for the early these benefits as to diagnosis and preventive treatment of disease, and for the development of the social machinery to insure everyone a standard of living adequate for the maintenance of health, so organizing enable every citizen to realize his birthright to health and longevity.

ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE



OBJECTIVE

- Prevents epidemics and the spread of disease
- Promotes and encourages healthy behaviors
- Assures the quality and accessibility of health services
- Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
- Monitor health status to identify community health problems
- Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community
- Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues
- Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems

There are following programmes under Public Health Wing-IV-

1. National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme (NVBDP)-

NVBDCP looking after the Vector Borne Diseases control related activities in Delhi with the coordination of Local Bodies. There are three common Vector Borne Diseases in Delhi-

- Dengue
- Malaria
- Chikungunya

2. Integrated Disease Surveillance Program (IDSP)-

- IDSP units are established in all 11 districts of Delhi including State Surveillance Unit at HQ.
- This program is looking after more than 40 diseases at District level.
- District and State team takes action on any unusual hike in cases reported from District with the coordination of other agencies i.e. Delhi Jal Board, PWD, Animal Husbandry, Local Bodies etc.

3. Integrated Health Information Platform (IHIP)

The Integrated Health Information Platform (IHIP) is a web-enabled near-real-time electronic information system, to provide state-of-the-art single operating picture with geospatial information for managing disease outbreaks and related resources.

IDSP module of IHIP launched on 1st April 2021 across the country. The Central Surveillance Unit of IDSP at National Centre for diseases Control (NCDC), Delhi is the Nodal Agency for the implementation of IDSP-IHIP under the Public Health division of Ministry of Health & family Welfare, Govt. of India.

Key features of Integrated Health Information Platform (IHIP)

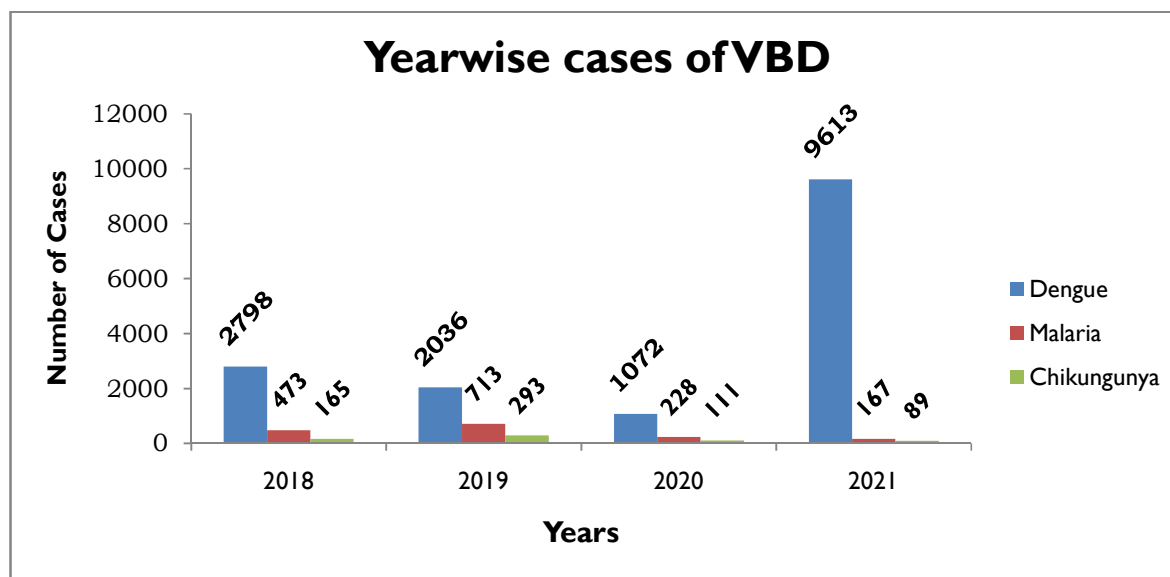
- Real time data reporting (along through mobile application); accessible at all levels (from district, states and central level)
- Advanced data modeling & analytical tools
- GIS enabled Graphical representation of data into integrated dashboard
- Role & hierarchy-based feedback & alert mechanisms

Achievements

1. One training of trainers on IHIP, held at State level in Feb 2021
2. Further cascade trainings of Medical Officers, ANMs, Pharmacists, Data entry operators has been conducted.
3. Districts have identified their reporting units under P and L form and user IDs and Passwords have been shared with all reporting units.
4. Till date 213 Reporting Units (Health Facilities) have started to report on IHIP portal.
5. MIS experts and data manager at state and districts are directed to manage the master data, user creation, troubleshooting etc and also monitor the implementation and resolution of issues.

DENGUE:

- Dengue is most rapidly spreading mosquito- borne viral disease; all 36 States/Uts endemic in India.
- Dengue virus (DENV) has four serotypes (DENI,DENII,DENIII,DENIV)
- Cases upsurge during July–November every year.
- No specific drug/vaccine till date. Prevention and control is the only strategy.
- Effective vector control measures and community involvement can prevent disease.

CHIKUNGUNYA

- Chikungunya is a viral illness that is spread by the bite of infected mosquitoes (Aedes).
- The disease resembles dengue fever.
- Characterized by severe joint pain (arthritis), as well as fever and rash.
- There is no specific treatment for chikungunya.
- Prevention involves avoiding mosquito bites.
- Symptomatic Treatment

MALARIA

- Malaria transmitted through the bite of an infected *Anopheles* mosquito, infected mosquitoes carry the *Plasmodium* parasite
- *Plasmodium vivax*, *P. ovale*, *P. malariae*, and *P. falciparum*.
- *P. falciparum* causes severe form, having higher risk of death.
- An infected mother can transmit disease to her baby at birth.

Action undertaken for Vector Borne Disease in Delhi in 2021

After sudden upsurge in the Dengue case in Delhi, Hon'ble HFM taken review on dengue situation in Delhi with Addl. Chief Secretary, Principal Secretary and DHS, Delhi alongwith Senior Officers of GOI. Hon'ble HFM had instructed to identify hot spots and take preventive measures to contain the disease transmission. In this regard, a Central Team visited DHS office, GNCT to review the dengue situation and provide technical guidance to the State. Various activities were held with the coordination of local bodies:

- Hot spot areas were identified on the basis of reporting of high number of dengue cases in the locality, District Surveillance officers along with respective DHO and ASHAs/DBC's workers were carried special drive for 3 days for vector surveillance, Source reduction and antilarval activities.
- Advisory on preparedness, management and prevention of Dengue in Hospitals sent to all SSHs and Health facilities.
- Coordinated with the all SSHs to provide the status of NS1 kits & MAC ELISA (IgM) in hospitals.
- Communication to Central Govt. SSHs, not reporting the VBD data on portal.

- Updated the list of Nodal officer designated in SSHs and Pvt. Hospitals.

Achievements

- ▶ Notification of Dengue, Malaria and Chikungunya and other vector borne diseases as notifiable diseases published in Part-IV of the Delhi Gazette Extra Ordinary
- ▶ Constitution of State Level Task force under the Chairmanship of Secretary (H&FW) to implement various strategies for prevention and control of vector borne diseases
- ▶ Maulana Azad Medical College identified as State Malaria Lab for cross verification of Malaria Slides received from Malaria Clinics

IEC & BCC ACTIVITIES (District level)

- Health talk on VBDs with ASHA's/ANM's/Staff.
- Awareness session held at the level of health care facilities.
- Patients in the OPD, ASHA, ANM & RWA members were sensitized
- Handbills/Pamphlets regarding DO's & Don't regarding prevention and control of Vector Borne diseases were distributed.
- Community sensitized to adopt personal protection measures, to ensure mosquito breeding free status in their houses and near periphery.
- Health care facilities and its premises were checked for mosquito breeding and water stagnation.
- Proper social distancing was maintained for all activities.





ACTIVITIES DONE BY SCHOOLS

- Due to shut down of schools, online awareness conducted for students
- Online competitions were organized to create awareness among students.
- School premises are regularly being checked to prevent water logging.
- Students were given assignments and activities to check the stagnant water in and around their houses. They were also instructed to wear full sleeve clothes
- In the school premises special drive conducted for the removal of stagnant water around overhead tanks, flower pots, empty utensils and ground.
- Students also participated in drawing activity
- Do's and Don'ts for vector borne diseases were also discussed in their online classes

• **World Mosquito Day** has been observed on **20.08.2021**, various sensitization and awareness activities have been carried out at State and District levels. School students have also been sensitized through online classes.

INTERSECTORAL COORDINATION

NCDC and AIIMS

- **Coordination with NCDC and AIIMS** regarding circulating strain in 2020, so that strategies could be implemented for this year accordingly for prevention and control of vector borne diseases.

D.O.Lettes

- **Letters** regarding measures to be taken by various agencies, offices, departments, institutes for prevention and control of Dengue, Chikungunya and other VBDs, were issued by ADGHS, PH-IV. Letters has been sent to **Local Bodies, Sentinel Hospitals, DMRC, DDA, PWD, Railway, ISBT, RWA, Delhi Tourism, Education, DUSIB, Universities, CDMOs etc.**
- **11 D.O. letters sent by ADGHS, PH-IV, GNCTD to all Divisional Commissioners, Revenue Department** regarding prevention and control of vector borne diseases (Dengue, Chikungunya and other VBDs).
- Communication done with all the stake holders to designate Nodal officers in all department, offices, hospitals, institutes of all concern stakeholders (**DJB, DDA, DMRC, Delhi Police, PWD, School health scheme etc**), Hospitals (**35 Sentinel Surveillance Hospitals**) and districts (**11 Districts and respective DGDs**).

Sentinel Surveillance Hospitals

- **Coordination with Sentinel Surveillance Hospitals** to notify and upload each confirm case of Dengue, Chikungunya and Malaria on MCD portal with complete information (Name/Age/Sex/Contact detail/Address/diagnosis) of the patients on daily basis in transmission period for timely preventive measures by MCD on affected areas.
- **Coordination with all SSHs and Districts Surveillance Officers** to sensitize the Nodal officers/ Link Officers/Medical officer of the hospitals/dispensaries of their respective districts regarding prevention and control of vector borne diseases, who will further sensitize the community at peripheral level.

Education Department

- Directorate of Education is being actively involved in awareness creation measures, as students act as Ambassadors to effectively spread the information for prevention and control of vector borne diseases. **D.O letter has been sent to all Schools** to carry out various activities with respect to prevention and control of vector borne diseases.
- **All Schools are directed to designate Nodal officers** for vector control related activities in the School premises. All Schools are participating with great enthusiasm in the awareness of vector borne diseases
- Awareness by means of Morning assembly talks, sensitization sessions, School rally, Marathons ,quiz competitions, drawing competitions, slogan writing competitions etc, by teams working under school health scheme is a continuous activity throughout the year
- **Coordination with School Health Scheme** for conducting sensitization workshops of school teachers, regarding preventive aspect of Mosquito borne diseases. Regular awareness meetings may be conducted for nodal teachers at zonal level through District. All the medical and paramedical staff of school health scheme should be involved in conducting trainings and awareness sessions for teachers and students at schools.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has been spreading throughout the country from two years. The Health & Family Welfare Department is continuously doing various activities for prevention and control of disease including tracking, testing and treatment of patients including intensive IEC/BCC campaigns to make the people aware about the Novel Corona Virus (SARS-CoV-2) infection, how it spreads, who needs to be tested, when should anyone be tested, where are the testing centers, what precautions are required to prevent the spread of the virus etc.

For the prevention and control of the Novel Corona Virus and thus COVID-19 disease, various activities are being carried out across the entire Nation, including Delhi. The various steps taken include increasing the infrastructural facilities for treating the COVID-19 patients, regular monitoring of Home isolation of COVID-19 patient, contact tracing, surveillance, intensified lab testing for early diagnosis and thus ensuring early treatment with effective IEC/BCC activities.

Containment of COVID-19

Delhi has reported a cumulative of 12,02,540 cases during the period of 01.04.2021 to 31.03.2022 with 15125 cumulative deaths. The Case Fatality Rate (CFR) for Delhi during the year 2021-2022 comes out 1.26% which is lower than the CFR during the year 2020-21.

• Home Isolation-COVID-19

Stringent enforcement of home isolation as per extant guidelines is in place. All the mild and asymptomatic patients who have been assigned home isolation are being provided Pulse oximeter, thermometer, medicines. Regular monitoring of patients kept in home isolation is being done through home visits and daily tele calling.

• Hospital infrastructure-COVID-19

During the peak of COVID 19 in April-May 2021, 25106 beds were reserved in Govt and Pvt. Hospitals for COVID patients (21986 oxygenated beds, 6868 ICU beds and 2578 Ventilator beds). 6257 beds in COVID Care Centres and 606 beds in COVID Health Centres were also made available for COVID patients in order to provide timely and better management.

COVID-19 testing

Laboratory testing plays a crucial role in the early detection, diagnosis and treatment of disease in patients. Testing-Tracking- Tracing, isolation and home based treatment of positive patients is the key measure to curb transmission of SARS-CoV-2, the causative agent of Covid-19.

Over the course of the Covid-19 crisis, the importance of reliable, accessible testing to screen for the disease has become increasingly apparent. Tests for Covid-19 can be divided into antigen or antibody tests, both of which use different kinds of samples to search for different hallmarks of the SARS-CoV-2 virus. At present total 154 labs (118 Pvt. and 36 Govt.) have been ICMR approved for Covid-19 testing in Delhi.

Contact Tracing activities in Delhi

As SARS CoV-2 is a highly contagious virus so timely detection of contacts of a positive case was the key to break the chain of transmission in the community. A dedicated unit for contact tracing and follow-up were established at each District level, with an identified district contact tracing Nodal Officer along with supportive staff.

Purpose of Contact Tracing activities were as follows:

- To identify and classify contacts as early as possible for preventing spread of disease
- Risk assessment of contacts identified and their classification into high risk and low risk contacts and based on risk assessment process considering factors like –proximity, duration, nature of exposure as well as other factors.

Contacts were defined as per guidelines of MoH&FW (GOI)

In Delhi Each District was shared the Number of Confirmed positive COVID-19 cases on daily basis for their district, based on address provided by the patient at the time of testing and available at ICMR portal. After receiving information, Each District contact tracing nodal officer further analysed the addresses of positive cases and earmarked them to field teams of respective DGD facility to which address belong. Contacts were categorized on the basis of guidelines (GOI) into High Risk and Low Risk Contacts. Emphasis was on identification and institution of surveillance activities within 72 hours for contacts of positive cases. All Symptomatic Contacts of Covid-19 positive cases were tested.

As per information till 31.03.2022 for a total positive case 1864970 identified by districts a total of 22915402 contacts were tracked.

IEC Activities done

Various steps were taken by the Government for the prevention and control of this pandemic. IEC/BCC strategy was also adopted as one of the strategy to make people aware about the Novel Corona Virus infection spread, its prevention, sign and symptoms of the infection, COVID Appropriate behavior, need of early medical care, vaccination importance, home isolation strategy etc.

To make the IEC/BCC strategy more focussed, need of involvement of various other key stake holders was also felt for prevention and control of COVID-19 as it is complex web of socio- cultural issues which cannot be addressed by Public Health Department alone.

Social Distancing, wearing of Masks and sanitization of hands are the three key COVID appropriate behaviors which were used as non negotiable options for controlling outbreaks and preventing the spread of this contagion and these needs to be ingrained into the psyche of the citizens of Delhi to win the war over COVID- 19.

There are multiple awareness-raising strategies, methods and tools that can be used to convey and spread messages, and to gather the support necessary to influence public opinion. The Mass media platforms available with the Department are Electronic, Print Media, Outdoor Media, T.V. Campaign, Radio Campaign and Digital platform.

In order to make sure that the people are well informed to prevent and contain the

spread of COVID -19 sustained awareness campaign through Electronic, Print Media, Outdoor Media, T.V. Campaign, Radio Campaign and Digital platform were used to aware the general public on various aspects of COVID-19 prevention and control strategy.

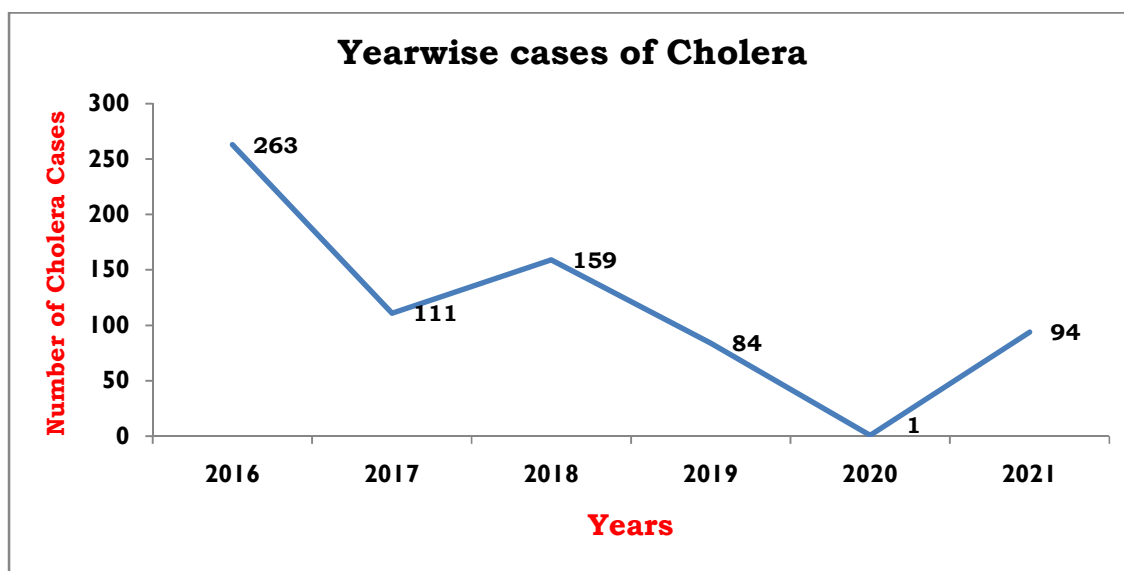
CHOLERA

Cholera is an acute diarrhoeal infection caused by ingestion of food or water contaminated with the bacterium *Vibrio cholerae*. Cholera remains a global threat to public health and an indicator of inequity and lack of social development. Researchers have estimated that every year, there are roughly 1.3 to 4.0 million cases, and 21000 to 143000 deaths worldwide due to cholera.

The worst affected areas include unauthorised resettlement colonies with poor sanitation facilities and lack of safe drinking water. A multifaceted approach is key to control cholera, and to reduce deaths. A combination of surveillance, access to safe water, adequate sanitation and basic hygiene, social mobilisation and treatment is essential.

**SEASONAL INFLUENZA (H1N1):**

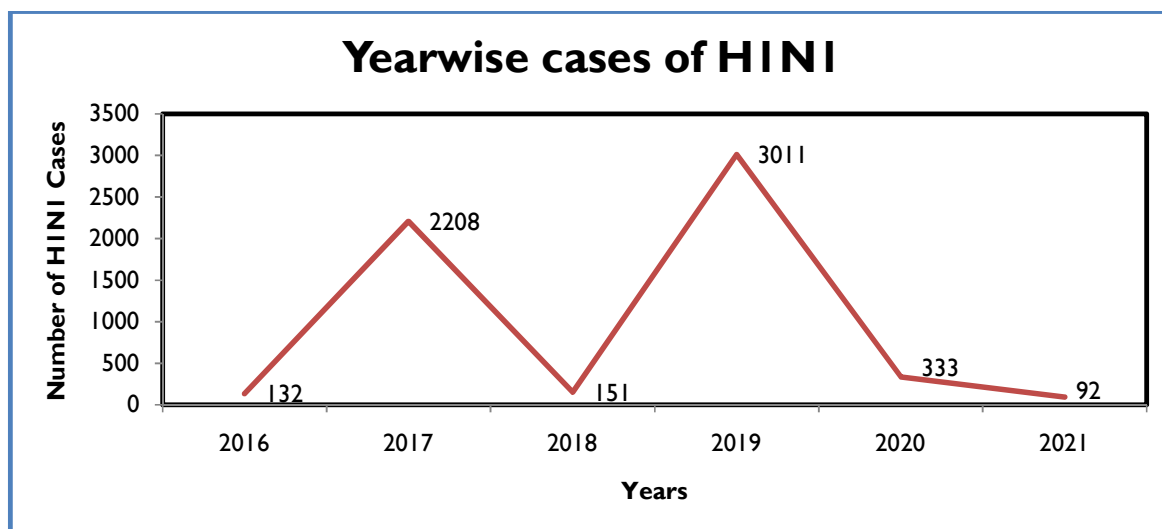
H1N1 virus has now taken on the behaviour of a seasonal influenza virus, hence H1N1 influenza episode and seasonal influenza are to be treated on similar lines. Such cases occur round the year with peaks occurring generally during autumn and winters. Since there is no antigenic drift (mutation) of the virus from the one found during pandemic 2009-10, hence, the community has acquired herd immunity against this virus and the present influenza is behaving like seasonal influenza.

CLINICAL PRESENTATION:

The course of illness may vary. Severity varies from a febrile symptoms mimicking common cold to severe prostration without major respiratory signs and symptoms, especially in the elderly. Fever and systemic symptoms typically last 3 days, occasionally 5-8 days, which gradually diminish. Cough may persist for more than 2 weeks. Second fever spikes are rare. Full recovery may occasionally take several weeks longer, especially in the elderly. Usually symptoms are body ache, cough, running nose, head ache. Less commonly symptoms like diarrhoea, abdominal pain etc. may occur.

MUCORMYCOSIS

A new challenge in the form of a fungal infection namely MUCORMYCOSIS had emerged and reported amongst COVID-19 patients. Total 2158 cases of Mucormycosis have been reported in 2021 till 31.03.2022 in Delhi. Following action undertaken in this regard:

- Made Mucormycosis a notifiable disease under Epidemic Act 1897
- Advisory received from GoI had been shared with all Govt. and Pvt. Health facilities regarding screening, diagnosis, management of Mucormycosis.
- Reporting format had been prepared and shared with all health facilities and make it mandatory to report all suspected and confirmed case to Health Department through district level CMO and subsequently to IDSP surveillance system.
- Further updation the data of Mucormycosis on S3 portal on daily basis along with requirement of Amphotericin B.
- Coordinated with all DSOs regarding cases of Mucormycosis reporting, constitution of committee at district level.

7.3 NATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS ELIMINATION PROGRAMME



Performance of Delhi State RNTCP/NTEP

- Tuberculosis is the most pressing health problem in our country as it traps people in a vicious cycle of poverty and disease, inhibiting the economic and social growth of the community at large. Tuberculosis still remains a major public health problem in Delhi. 40% of our population in Delhi is infected with TB germs and is vulnerable to the disease in case their body resistance is weakened.
- Delhi has been implementing the Revised National TB Control Programme with DOTS strategy since 1997. Delhi State RNTCP has been merged with NRHM (DSHM) w.e.f. 01.04.2013. The Delhi State RNTCP is being implemented through a decentralized flexible mode through 25 Chest Clinics equivalent to DTC. Out of 25 Chest Clinics, MCD are running 12, GNCTD-10, NDMC -1, GoI-1 and NGO-1 chest clinics respectively. Delhi is the only state in the country where one NGO – Ramakrishna Mission, has been entrusted the responsibility to run the RNTCP in a district. The NGOs and Private Medical Practitioners are participating in the implementation of the RNTCP in a big way.
- RNTCP Delhi integration with Urban Health Mission involving multiple stakeholders (NDMC, MCD, NGO, GOI and Delhi. Govt.). Delhi Government dispensary DEO, MOs/ESIC MOs & ASHA workers have been trained in RNTCP at State level.
- The RNTCP has 192 diagnostic centres and 551 treatment centres located all over Delhi. LPA, Liquid Culture & Solid Culture facilities are available at 3 C&DST Labs to diagnose Drug Resistance TB. Implementation of DOTS Plus services for DRTB Patients is done through 4 Nodal DRTB Centres & 25 District DRTB Centres. 32 CBNAAT labs (GenXpert) in 25 Chest Clinics/Medical Colleges for Rapid TB Diagnosis are in place. The Rapid TB Diagnostic Services through CBNAAT are available free to all the patients (Specially for paediatric group, HIV Positive patients & to diagnose Drug Resistance TB) besides Universal DST for all TB patients for initiation of therapy.
- Roll out of daily regimen across the State w.e.f. 1st Nov. 2017. Delhi has been the first State in the country to have full coverage with DOTS (WHO recommended treatment strategy for TB) since 1997 and with DOTS-PLUS (treatment schedule for Drug resistant TB) since 2008. Roll out of Baseline SLDST across the State w.e.f. Q2 2014. Expanded DST for 2nd Line drugs across the State w.e.f April, 2016. Pan State Roll out of Bedaquiline -new drug in MDR TB treatment in 2016. Revised PMDT Guidelines GoI 2019 implemented across the State. Revised PMDT Guidelines GoI 2021 implemented w.e.f Aug 2021.
- Framework of integration of RNTCP services with Mohalla Committees in the State is in place.
- The diagnosis and treatment for drug sensitive TB & drug resistance TB is provided free to the patients by all the partners under the RNTCP.
- TB Control Services for the homeless population in 200 Night Shelters. The night shelters staff are trained as Community DOT Provider, and for collection and transportation of sputum samples.
- Mobile TB Clinic for pavement dwellers/ homeless by NGO DTBA.
- Diabetic screening for all TB patients initiated at all the Chest Clinics in Delhi from January 2015.
- Counselling services by NGO's to promote adherence to MDR-TB.
- Quality TB diagnosis for paediatric cases by upfront testing of presumptive TB cases among the homeless in 'Asha kiran'.
- RNTCP Services in Tihar Jail is being initiated by posting TBHV and LT's.
- Intensified TB screening among the floating population – Truck Drivers, slums/unauthorized colonies along with night shelters, pavement dwellers, prisons.
- Nutrition support & Counselling services to MDR TB patients by NGOs like UNION, RK Mission, DFIT, TB Alert, GLRA.

- Govt of India has changed the name of the programme from Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme (RNTCP) to National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP) w.e.f 1st Jan. 2020
- NIKSHAY is an online web based system for live reporting of TB patients for surveillance and monitoring under public & private sector.
- TB Harega Desh Jeetega campaign launched w.e.f 25th Sep 2019
- A Vision for TB Free Nation by 2025 with the goal of zero death and end the Global TB Epidemic.

7.4 NATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR CONTROL OF BLINDNESS AND VISUAL IMPAIRMENT (NPCBVI).

The “State Health Society Delhi” is implementing NPCB program in Delhi on district pattern through respective “Integrated District Health Society”. Various approved activities were under taken **during theyear 2020-21 and 2021-22** as per Prog. Guidelines.

The detail of activities under taken during this period is given here under: -

1. Campaign cataract countdown

NGOs are motivated to hold the screening camps all over Delhi in collaboration with Integrated District Health Societies, especially in the under privileged areas of city and in NCR and the cases detected with cataract are transported and operated in fixed facilities managed by NGOs. The cataract surgeries are also under taken by Govt. Hospitals. The Program used to give support to these hospitals on procuring the consumables and some equipment through State / District Health Societies. During the reporting period; fund have been made available to IDHS to support on this front but amount was not utilized as the govt. hospitals had fulfilled their demands from regular sources. The details of the cataract surgeries performed are as under:

The eye banks are also given the financial assistance for collection of tissues @ Rs. 2000/- per eye ball collected. Eye Donation Counselors were recruited in previous years through IDHSs, deployed in various Govt./Pvt. Eye Banks of Delhi and are helping in motivating the family members for eye donation of diseased.

4. Grant-in-Aid to various IDHSs

Under the program, some of components like grant-in-aid to NGOs for Cataract Surgery, "School Eye Screening Project", collection of Eye Balls, Salary to Eye Donation Counselors working in eye banks and Para Medical Ophthalmic Asstt in Vision Centers, procuring and maintenance of equipment for hospitals, opening and strengthening of vision centers and for

IEC activity are being implemented at the level of District Health Societies.

5. Training of Eye Surgeons

The GOI is providing training to in service Eye Surgeons in identified institutes in following areas: - ECCE / IOL Implantation Surgery, Small Incision Cataract surgery, Phacoemulsification, Low Vision Services, Glaucoma, Pediatric Ophthalmology, Indirect Ophthalmology & Laser Techniques, Vitreoretinal Surgery, Eye Banking & Corneal Transplantation Surgery etc.

6. Celebration of National Fortnight on Eye Donation (NFED):

There are about 0.12 million corneal blind persons in India and many other with visual impairment due to corneal disease. About 20,000 new cases are added every year in this pool. Majority of such blind persons are young and their sight can be restored only by a corneal transplantation. Presently about 50,000 to 57,000 eyes are collected every year by the Eye Banks working in Govt. NGO sector in various parts of India but there is still a backlog of corneal blind persons waiting for transplantation. We need around 75,000 to 1,00,000 cornea per year for transplant purposes. In order to bridge this gap in demand and supply of corneal tissue and to further increase collection of corneas, a joint campaign of IEC was organized for eye donation during 30th National Fortnight on Eye Donation (NFED) with the help of eye banks functioning in Delhi State under the directive of GOI. The activities of NFED were organized by health centers, district level secondary hospitals, medical college hospitals, autonomous organization, NGO Hospitals and private partners during which the cause of eye donation was highlighted with intensified educational and motivational efforts to increase the collection of donor tissue and to create awareness among the general public about preventive aspect of corneal blindness. The main activity was held in eye banks, where eye banks faculty and staff of various eye banks of Delhi has organized the orientation sessions for the health staff of other departments in hospital and also of various linked hospitals about their role in eye donation being the first contact health staff with family members of deceased and how to counsel and motivate family members for donating the eyes of the deceased. Because the hospital staff, under the Hospital Cornea Retrieval Prog. (HCRP), is expected to inform death to the eye donation counselor if available in hospital or to the linked Eye Bank well in time and also motivate relatives of deceased for eye donation. The Eye Bank Staff will further motivate the relatives for eye donation and if they agree, tissue may be harvested. The felicitation of family members who have donated the eyes of their deceased members along with the recipient of cornea and their family members have been held in Eye banks, particularly notable were National Eye Bank Dr. R. P. Centre AIIMS, Guru Nanak Eye Centre, Shroff's Eye Center and others.

7. World Sight Day Campaign:

The World Sight Day (WSD) is being celebrated globally on second Thursday of October every year with different theme since 2000. During this period **World Sight Day 2021** was celebrated on 14th Oct. 2021. The theme for WSD 2021 was '**love your eyes**'. The key intervention of WSD is to promote universal eye health coverage and reduce levels of avoidable blindness due to Cataract, Refractive Error and Corneal Blindness & Diabetic Retinopathy etc. Various approved IEC & Screening activities were successfully organized in Delhi State by State Unit of NPCB Delhi under State Health Society, Delhi through respective Integrated District Health Societies (IDHSs) of Delhi Districts for creating mass awareness for eye care & prevention of blindness and to improve Eye Care in Delhi. The activities were held at health center, hospitals. IEC material like display of banners, distribution of pamphlets, holding painting and poster making & slogan writing competition were held and prizes were given to best performers. Health talks were organized for health staff, patients and visitors. The Group Discussions were held, documentary film show was also arranged in hospitals and health centers. Rallies by school students were held in surrounding area of school, NukkadNataks were also held. The IEC activities were under taken in health centers, hospital, AHA Units & health Centers. The children have participated in various activities held in Schools.

8. Trachomatous Trichiasis Only Survey:

The Ministry of Health and family welfare, Government of India is conducting

Trachomatous Trichiasis Only survey in 15 years and above age group population in 200 districts across India. The survey will be conducted by team of Community Ophthalmology, Dr.R.P.Centre, AIIMS, New Delhi. In Delhi, Survey will be conducted in all the 11 District/ Evaluation unit in next two Years. All the patients identified with operable condition will referred to R.P.Centre for treatment.

9. Workshop on Gonioscopy and Perimetry (Gap) on 5th March 2022:

NPCB-VI conducted a Glaucoma Skill training workshop on Gonioscopy and Perimetry (Gap) on 5th March 2022, from 2-4 pm as part of World Glaucoma Week Celebration. This interactive and hands-on session was an initiative by Glaucoma services of GNEC, to train ophthalmology, PMOA and Optometrist different institutes and hospitals of NCR Delhi in Gonioscopy & Perimetry for early detection of glaucoma under Agis of NPCB-VI Delhi Chapter and Glaucoma Society of India. GaP workshop attend by 31 participants

10. World Glaucoma Week Activities (6th to 12th March 2022), Delhi State (NPCB):

World Glaucoma week was celebrated worldwide in the first week of March, with the purpose of creating awareness about eye diseases causing blindness and available eye health care services in the community. Every year NPCB&VI participates in World Glaucoma Week, to reaffirm Indian government commitment to maintain ocular health of its citizens. Flurry activities for this World Glaucoma Week spanned from **6th March 2022 to 12th March 2022**. The activity organized by Delhi State Programme division kept in mind the global World Glaucoma week theme of 2022 ***“World is bright, save your sight”*** with special emphasis on preventable glaucoma like Steroid induced and angle closure disease.

CHAPTER 8

DIRECTORATE OF AYUSH

To encourage use of alternative systems of medicines in healthcare delivery and to ensure propagation of healthcare research and education in these systems, a separate Department of Indian System of Medicine was established by Delhi Government as a part of Health and Family Welfare Department in May, 1996. In 2013, it was renamed as Directorate of AYUSH where AYUSH stands for Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and SOWA- Rigpa and Homoeopathy systems of medicines.

Presently, Directorate of AYUSH is located at Ayurvedic and Unani Tibia College Campus, Karol Bagh, New Delhi. Homoeopathic Wing of directorate of AYUSH functions from CSC-III, I Floor, B Block Preet vihar, Delhi.

Functioning of the Directorate

Directorate of AYUSH with its dedicated manpower, robust infrastructure, four educational institutes and a network of 179 dispensaries / hospital units across Delhi is committed to provide better healthcare facilities, value based education and propagate research oriented development of AYUSH systems of medicine.

Under the cafeteria approach to Health Care Services AYUSH dispensaries are opened in existing and upcoming hospital / dispensaries running under Delhi Health Services for ease of patients and to promote cross-referral.

Directorate of AYUSH is headed by Director (AYUSH) and is assisted by administrative officers and technical officers viz. Deputy Directors, Assistant Directors, Licensing Authority of Ayurveda and Unani drugs.

The Directorate conducts re-orientation training programmes for AYUSH Medical Officers and AYUSH registered practitioners. It also gives Grants-in-aid to Board of Homeopathy System of Medicine, Chaudhary Brahm Prakash Aurvedic Charak Sansthan and Examining Body for Paramedical Training in Bharatiya Chikitsa which is autonomous bodies under the Government of NCT of Delhi. The Drugs Control Cell of this Department grants manufacturing licenses for Ayurveda & Unani medicines and is responsible for enforcement of provisions of Drugs & Cosmetics Act, 1940 and provisions of DMR Act 1954.

Mission:

To excel in delivery of AYUSH healthcare by establishing ever improving standards of individual care, education and research.

Vision:

To strive to be treatment of choice for communities by educating and enabling access of AYUSH treatment for acute as well as chronic diseases.

Services:

- Provides best Healthcare facilities through a network of 179 dispensaries spread across Delhi providing Ayurveda, Unani and Homoeopathy treatment.
- Quality and value based education in Ayurveda, Unani and Homoeopathy through undergraduate and postgraduate courses at four educational institutes.
- Licensing and regulation under Drugs & Cosmetics Act and Drugs & Magic Remedies (Objectionable advertisement) Act of Ayurveda and Unani Medicines.
- Registration of practitioners of Ayurveda, Unani and Homoeopathy.
- To create awareness among masses about strengths of AYUSH systems through school education programmes, media campaigns and participation in various health programmes.

CHAPTER 9

HOSPITALS OF GOVT. OF NATIONAL CAPITAL TERRITORY OF DELHI

The Hospitals are integral part of Health Care Delivery System of any State. Hospitals are expected to be the partners and supporters of Health Care Delivery System rather than limiting their role to medical care only. In the present scenario, the role of Hospitals range from providing Primary Level Medical Care to Hospital Care (Secondary / Tertiary Level).

The Planning / Establishment of new Hospitals are taken care of by Hospital Cell / Planning Branch of the Directorate of Health Services. The broad functions of Hospital Cell involve planning and commissioning of Hospitals which include site inspection, monitoring and co-ordination with different Govt. Semi Govt. / Autonomous / Pvt. Agencies etc. related to establishment of Hospitals. The financial aspect of these upcoming hospitals such as preparation of SFC Memo for cost estimates of hospital which include estimates of manpower, equipments and other vital components required for establishment of hospital are also being taken care of by Hospital Cell. Presently 38 Hospitals are functioning independently under overall administrative control of Department of Health & Family Welfare.

With the naming of the Hospital after the Jain Muni Acharya Shree Bhikshu on 15.01.2005, this Moti Nagar Colony Hospital is now known as Acharaya Shree Bhikshu Government Hospital. The hospital functioned with a sanctioned strength of 150 beds during the year.

After completion of the OPD Block, OPD services from new OPD Block were inaugurated by the Hon'ble Health Minister on 13.09.2003.

4. AYURVEDIC & UNANI TIBBIA COLLEGE HOSPITAL

Tibbia was re-established into the new building at Karol Bagh by Masih-Ul-Mulk Hakim Ajmal Khan Saheb. The foundation stone of the Institute was laid by H.E. Lord Hardinge (the then Viceroy of India) on 29th March, 1916. This institution was inaugurated by Father of the Nation Mahatma Gandhi on 13th February 1921. Previously this college and allied units were managed by a board established under Tibbia College Act, 1952. This Act now has been repealed by a new Act known as Delhi Tibbia College (Take Over) Act, 1998 and enforced by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi w.e.f. 1st May, 1998.

The college is affiliated to the University of Delhi since 1973. It provides 4 ½ years regular course of study followed by one year internship leading to the award of the degree of Bachelor-of-Ayurvedic Medicine & Surgery (BAMS) and Bachelor-of-Unani Medicine & Surgery (BUMS). There are 28 Departments (14 Departments for each system) and a Hospital with 240 beds (functional) attached to the College to give practical training to the students.

The admission in BAMS & BUMS / M.D. (Ay.) & M.D. (Unani) are dealt by Faculty of Ayurveda & Unani Medicines, University of Delhi. The Post Graduate Course (M.D) in the subject of Kriya Sharir & Kaya Chikittsha of Ayurved Medicine and in the subject of Moalejat of Unani Medicine has been started from Academic Session 2002 with intake capacity of 3 students in each discipline.

Number of pharmacy counters increased from 3 to 5 counters. Establishment of Fever Clinic waiting Area close to OPD & Labour Room, OPD Registration counters increased to 13, provision of separate Registration Counter & pharmacy counter for Children & Senior Citizens & Hospt. Staff, Establishment of separate Medical & Surgical Store.

Provisions of EWS patient to get treatment as well as necessary investigation for the Govt. empanelled private hospital is also established & operational from Room No. 101. OS-I counters for de-addiction of patients is also running.

The hospital provides Accidents & Emergency Services, Flu Clinic OPD services, special clinic services. Diagnostic services (Path Lab, Micro Biology Lab, X-Ray). 8. CENTRAL JAIL HOSPITAL

Central Jail Hospital located in Tihar Jail Complex provides the medical care to the inmates of Tihar Jail in New Delhi, which is one of the largest prison complexes in the world. The complex comprises of seven prisons in the Tihar Complex with sanction capacity of 4000 prisoners and accommodates over twelve thousand prisoners. The hospital is having 270 beds, 150 in main hospital and 120 in De-addiction Centre (DAC). DAC is ISO 9001-2008 certified unit.

The hospital has separate medical, surgical, Tuberculosis and psychiatric wards. The hospital has an Integrated Counselling and Testing Centre (ICTC) for HIV, functioning in Central Jail Hospital functioning since June 10, 2008, a DOTS Centre for Tuberculosis treatment and also a Dental Unit. The hospital provides round the clock casualty services for the inmates. Pulse Polio Immunization Programmes are carried out regularly as per kept separately. Various NGO's are also working with Tihar Prison and contributing towards medical services.

9. CHACHA NEHRU BAL CHIKITSALAYA

Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya (CNBC) is a 221 bedded Pediatric Super Speciality hospital, situated in Geeta Colony, Delhi-110031, in existence since 2003, initially functional under direct administrative control of Delhi Govt. and thereafter converted into autonomous institute under Delhi Govt. since 03.10.2013.

Earlier, CNBC was an Associate Hospital of Maulana Azad Medical College (MAMC) and remained affiliated with MAMC up to 02.10.2013.

Since 03.10.2013, Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya became an autonomous institute under GNCT of Delhi and was registered under Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860, with Reg. No. District East/Society/730/2013.

After getting converted to an autonomous institute since October 2013, this hospital is being governed by a Governing Council, whose Chairman is the Chief Secretary of the Government of NCT of Delhi and Member Secretary is the Director of the hospital.

Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya was established in September 2003 and is now fully functional 221 bedded paediatric Super Speciality hospital to provide preventive & curative services to children up to age of 12 years. CNBC caters patients not only from Delhi but also from U.P., Bihar, Haryana, and Punjab. Almost 30% patients visiting CNBC are from outside Delhi.

The institute is spread over 95 Acres of Eco-friendly & Huge Campus with total built up area of 47,150 Sq. Mtr. and 4 storied building with basement in Hospital Complex. The institute has five lecture theatres and one seminar hall equipped with audio visual facility. Other amenities are separate boys and girls' hostel, Doctors Hostel, Central Library, Sports Ground, Canteen and Housing Complex.

The admission capacity of institute for Ayurved Acharya Degree (Graduate course-B.A.M.S.) is 100.

Emergency Lab provides 24 hours services throughout the year for all emergency investigations. The hospital has two Panchakarma Units one for male and another for female which are providing Special Ayurvedic Treatment to the Chronic Patients of Paralysis, Joint Disorders, Disc. Related Ailments, Migraine, Skin Disorders like Psoriasis, Eczema, Acne, Chronic Sinusitis etc. Kshar Sutra Unit is providing specialty treatment to the patients of Anorectal Disorders like Hemorrhoids, Fistula & Fissures. Leech application unit is providing specialty treatment to the patients of DVT, Psoriasis, Diabetic Ulcers / Foot, Varicose Ulcers etc. Ambulance Facility with BLS and AC is available to transfer patients to other hospitals or meet any Exigency / Disaster Situation.

D.D.U. Hospital is the biggest and the only tertiary care hospital in West Delhi providing services to the people living in West Delhi and adjoining rural areas of Delhi and other adjoining states. In its continuous journey of improvement, the following are initiatives or salient features of the important projects and schemes of the previous year in respect of this Hospital.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Deen Dayal Upadhaya Hospital has received award for public health facilities; Kayakalp Scheme consecutively for the two years 2017-2018 & 2018-19 in more than 500 beds District Hospital Categories under KAYAKALP Scheme. Team NABH & Kayakalp trained all the nurses and paramedical staff in major health practices. Peer Group Round of Kayakalp was cleared with a good scoring. The hospital has received first position under KAYAKALP Scheme for more than 500 beds category. The Certificate was awarded by the Hon'ble Health Minister for the SOPs prepared for the Deptt. of Medicine, Blood Bank, Pathology and Radiology, of Delhi govt. hospitals. Concrete measures have been taken to improve management of critical patients:

Twenty two+Thirty Eight (for COVID-19) new ventilators have been received in ICU, ICCU, NICU and Medicine ward during the year 2020. Medical gas points have been increased in all the wards. Now all 640 beds have oxygen points. Hospital has actively participated in implementation of all National programmes and SWACHH BHARAT ABHIYAN. Targets were achieved successfully.

Radiology department has extended Ultrasound and Colour Doppler Services upto 9.00 pm. and a state of the art facility of CT Scan has been started on 22nd July, 2021 with inauguration by Hon'ble Health Minister. Special Radiology Investigations are being conducted on daily basis. CT one new machine and new Ultrasound machine has also been procured for management of patients admitted in the hospital. Department of Obstt. & Gynae is developing High Dependency Unit which is likely to get functional in near future.

Process of expansion of hospital and setting up of maternal and child blocks is likely to get finalised. An additional adjacent plot of land (3.5 acres) was acquired for expansion of the hospital.

Flu Clinic and Covid-19 sampling center was started to manage the Covid-19 pandemic. Isolation ward with 200 beds was started for treatment of Covid-19 positive patients. Our Hospital has provided logistics to Sardar Patel COVID CARE CENTRE, Delhi and manpower including doctors, nurses and technical staff to various Covid Care Centres to other hospital and even to Airport Authority for Covid duty.

Since 16.01.2021, DDU Hospital has been running two Covid Vaccination Centres and till date thousands of Health Care Workers and Front Line workers have been vaccinated in addition to the several people from public.

DDU Hospital has thus contributed towards prevention and treatment of Covid-19, in addition to many other diseases and medical issues.

12. DELHI STATE CANCER INSTITUTE

Delhi State Cancer Institute, a Cancer Hospital with 100 sanctioned beds is situated in UCMS-GTBH Complex at Dilshad Garden in East Delhi Started on 5/04/2006 and 50 sanctioned beds in West C2/B, Janakpuri started on 13.03.2013.

First phase facilities at this Institute with OPD services, Chemotherapy and Linear Accelerator based Radiotherapy facility were formally inaugurated by the Hon' ble Chief Minister of Delhi on the 26th August 2006. The Institute has been making consistent progress in all its activities ever since its establishment. One hundred bedded in-patients facility consisting of General Wards, Semi-Private Wards, Private Wards and Deluxe Suites have been commissioned during FY 2010-11 alongwith the existing thirty-two bedded day care set up. All facilities including medicines are provided free to all the patients. While the OPD and all support services for all the patients are available from 7.00 AM to 5.00 PM on all working days the emergency services are available on round-the-clock basis.

The hospital has the latest technology Radiodiagnosis facilities with 128- slice CT-Scanner with RT-Simulation, Digital X-ray, Digital-Mammography, High-end Ultrasound with Breast-Elastography and RFA. All these equipments are on PACS and LAN for online reporting and access. Ultra-modern, fully automated Lab equipments for Hematology, Biochemistry, Immunoassay and Microbiology all connected through LAN for instant online reporting and access are available to provide necessary laboratory support.

13. DR. B.R. SUR HOMOEOPATHIC MEDICAL COLLEGE, HOSPITAL & RESEARCH CENTRE

Dr. B.R Sur Homoeopathic Medical College, Hospital and Research Centre is a pioneer homoeopathic institution situated in Nanak Pura, Moti Bagh, New Delhi with a vision to heal and cure the suffering humanity with compassion & care and to be recognized as premier homoeopathic institution in medical education and research and with a mission to be center of excellence in homoeopathic health care services, medical education, and research.

It was established in November 1985 by Dr. B.R. Sur, who was a great philanthropist and a leading Homoeopath of Delhi. The hospital started functioning in the year 1986 with its diagnostic facilities like X-Ray, Ultrasound, ECG and Pathology

Laboratory. Dr. B.R. Sur donated the institution to the Govt. of NCT of Delhi on 2nd October 1998. The Indoor Patient Department was started on 12th September 2000. At present, the hospital is running with the capacity of 50 indoor patient beds and all basic medical facilities. All services, including medicines are provided to the public free of cost. The OPD and IPD facilities are also utilized for the clinical training of interns. The annual patient turn over in OPD is of about 70 thousand patients. It is providing health care through General OPDs and special clinics in pediatrics, geriatrics, gynaecology and family planning, lifestyle disorders, thyroid disorders, psychiatry, arthritis, respiratory disorders, skin diseases, renal stones, eye, ENT, and physiotherapy.

This institute has been entrusted with the responsibility of providing and promoting homoeopathic education and training and setting up the standards in the fields of research and community health care. Significant progress has been achieved since the inception of the institution in the Directorate of AYUSH, Govt. of NCT of Delhi. The first batch of BHMS students was admitted in August 1999. This is a co-educational institution and prepares the students for the award on Degree of Bachelor of Homoeopathic System of Medicine and Surgery of Five & half year duration (including one year compulsory internship). The college is affiliated to Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University and is recognized by The Central Council of Homoeopathy (Now National commission for Homoeopathy). The annual sanctioned intake for the BHMS course is 63 students. The institution has 12 teaching departments, and a Library with more than 5500 books. The departments are being strengthened as per the regulations laid down by the Central Council of Homoeopathy. The institute is under MOU with Deendayal Upadhyay Hospital, Hari Nagar, Maternity centre, R.K. Puram and peripheral PHCs for training of students in Surgery, Gynaecology and Obstetrics, Accident and Emergency and Post-mortem examination etc. Various CMEs, research projects and skill development programmes are also being conducted. Students, Interns and staff of the Institute actively participate in all the National and State level programmes for the public benefit like Pulse Polio, Family Planning Programme, World Population Day, Rogi Suraksha Saptah, World Heart Day, International Day of Geriatric People, World Diabetes Day, Vigilance Awareness Week, National Newborn Week, NSV fortnight, voter's day, World hearing week etc and World Health Day etc. Institute is regularly updating its website and social media accounts-Facebook, Instagram and twitter.

Apart from imparting quality medical education and patient care various, public health initiatives have been taken by the students, staff members and faculty of B.R. Sur College. Under the programme of Kayakalp and Swachhta drives numerous public awareness programmes, swachhta rallies, plantation drives, cleanliness programmes, hand hygiene trainings for school children and community at large in collaboration with various RWAs are being conducted. In collaboration with NGOs like Roshni free sanitary pad vending machines and incinerators are recently installed for student's and patients and Institute is working on 'say no to single use plastics' to make dream of 'Clean Delhi', a reality.

During COVID-19 pandemic, our interns, doctors, nursing and lab staff were posted at various CTCs and hospitals and they worked relentlessly day and night. Institute played an important role in health promotion and prevention of COVID-19. Various programmes were organized from September 2020-February 2022, like "Swachhta ko apnaana hai, Corona ko door bhagana

hai”, a door to door campaign on hand hygiene, sanitization, and importance of social distancing and distribution of mask and prophylactic medicines at various places like Moti Bagh, Shastri Market, J.J. Clusters, Mochi Gaon, Satya Niketan etc. It was given responsibility for undertaking public health program of Directorate of AYUSH and was designated as centre for distribution of homoeopathic preventive and prophylactic medicines to all zones and district in-charges and at hot spots for COVID-19 at Delhi. Institute distributed it to more than 25000 people in and around the hospital. It was also designated as the centre for coordinating randomization and blinding of medicines, and one of the centres for data collection and documentation for the research study conducted by Directorate of AYUSH, GNCT of Delhi. Doctors at the hospital also took care of non-COVID patient both online through telemedicine and offline at the hospital.

Institute emphasise that the objectives of medical education can only be achieved if underlying goal is to improve the public health, and this involves addressing all components that influence health directly or indirectly.

Now this is a 758 bedded hospital. The hospital is a nationally recognized tertiary care institution for Cardiac, Neurological and Gastrointestinal Disorders. It offers specialized medical and surgical treatment.

It is one of the reputed centers for post-doctoral teaching and training and recognized for many path breaking researches. The Institution is recognized by Medical Council of India and University Grants Commission as an independent post graduate college affiliated to University of Delhi. The institution offers Post- Doctoral D.M. degrees in Cardiology, Neurology and Gastroenterology and M.Ch. degrees in Cardio thoracic Surgery, Neuro Surgery and Gastrointestinal Surgery. Students are also admitted in M.D. courses in the fields of Microbiology, Pathology, Psychiatry and Radio-Diagnosis-in-association with dental Azad Medical College-a

sister institution. In addition, many departments are recognized for Ph. D. Courses.

17. GURU GOBIND SINGH GOVT. HOSPITAL

Guru Gobind Singh Govt. Hospital is a 100-bedded hospital established in the resettlement colony of Raghbir Nagar, West Delhi under "Special Component Plan" with a view to provide secondary level health care to low socio economic group of people of Raghbir Nagar and adjacent areas. The scheme was approved at an estimated cost of Rs.16.96 crores. Construction of the hospital building began in 1993 in a plot of land measuring approximately 14 acres. On completion of the OPD block, OPD services were commissioned on 31st December 1995. Hospital is providing following patient care facilities round the Clock along with routine OPD services of Medicine, Surgery. Ortho, Eye, ENT, Paeds. 18. GURU NANAK EYE CENTRE

Guru Nanak Eye Centre was conceived in 1971 with a view to provide best eye centre to residents of Delhi. The name of institution was adopted as GNEC with a view to maintain the teaching of Guru Nanak & initial support was provided by Gurudawara Prabandhak Committee Delhi. The Outpatient Department Block started functioning in 1977 and the Indoor Patients were kept in eye ward of LNJP Hospital. GNEC became administratively independent on 14th March 1986 with complete indoor facility. 184 bedded hospitals started functioning in small building.

Guru Nanak Eye Centre, presently a 212 bedded eye hospital is part of MAMC-LNH-GBPH-GNEC Complex. The hospital is attached to Maulana Azad Medical College. The Eye Centre, each year, imparts comprehensive training in Ophthalmology to post-graduates and undergraduates (as part of MBBS course) of Maulana Azad Medical College. The postgraduate training includes clinical, research and other academic activities. Besides, the centre also trains faculty members from other institutions coming for specialized training. A number of Ophthalmologists are trained under national programme for prevention of Cataract Blindness and the Centre gets a number of observers from all over the country and visitors from different parts of the world.

It provides comprehensive eye health care services to the public. The Eye Centre started functioning independently in 1985. The various services provided by the Centre includes OPD services, Indoor Services, Operation Theatre (24 hours) facilities, Emergency Services (24 hours), Speciality Clinics, Eye Banks, Community Eye

Services through peripheral health center at Narela, Delhi and by being a referral centre of the Motia-Mukti-Bind Abhiyan Programme of Government of NCT of Delhi.

The hospital provides round the clock Emergency Service in common clinical disciplines including Neurosurgery Facilities for road side accident and other Trauma victims, Burn Care Facilities, Thalassemia Day Care Center, CT-Scan, Hemo-dialysis and Peritoneal Dialysis besides OPD / IPD services in broad basic specialties.

G.T.B. Hospital runs a fully equipped regional Blood Bank Centre which apart from fulfilling the needs of this area as a Blood Bank also has facilities for providing various fractionated blood components. OPD and IPD registration, Blood Sample Collection Centres, Admission and Enquiry, Lab. investigation Services and Medical Record Data have already been computerized and integrated through LAN.

20. INSTITUTE OF HUMAN BEHAVIOUR AND ALLIED SCIENCE

The Hospital for Mental Diseases (HMD), Shahdara, was established in 1966 in the Eastern outskirts of Delhi across the Yamuna River at a time when custodial care of mentally ill was order of the day. During this era, the society had lost hopes for recovery of such patients and kept them far away. It was a virtual dumping ground for society's unwanted people. There used to be inadequate facilities, paucity of trained staff and often ill-treatment to patients. The hospital was converted into a multidisciplinary institute under the Societies Act and registered as a Society by Supreme Court order in response to public interest litigation. Since its inception in 1993, it has served as a good example of how judicial intervention can bring about changes for the benefit of the patients. At present, it is functioning as an autonomous body with support from Central and Delhi Governments for its maintenance and developmental activities.

Institute of Human Behaviour & Allied Sciences (IHBAS) is a tertiary level Medical Institute deals in patient care, teaching and research activities in the field of Psychiatry and Neurological Sciences. The Institute is an autonomous body registered under the Societies Act 1860, funded jointly by Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India and Government of NCT of Delhi. This institute has hospital with 500 sanctioned beds with 336 functioning beds.

The foundation stone of ILBS was laid in 2003. The first phase of ILBS was completed in 2009. The hospital was started functioning in the year 2009 for providing special treatment of liver related problem with latest medical facilities. The formal inauguration of the hospital took place on January 14, 2010 by the Chief Minister of Delhi, Mrs. Sheila Dixit. ILBS envisions becoming an International Centre of Excellence for the prevention and cure, advance competency-based training and cutting edge research in Liver, Biliary and Allied Sciences.

New Initiatives Scheme/Programmes

1. Genome sequencing at ILBS

The department has been nominated as a satellite laboratory for INSACOG (Indian SARS-CoV-2 Genomics Consortium) and the sentinel whole genome sequencing surveillance site by the Delhi state our state-of-the-art Genome sequencing laboratory was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Delhi on August 2021 and can sequence over 300 samples a week and provide results in five to seven days. To date, we had sequenced over 1200 samples and the results are helping in classification of new strains or variants circulating in Delhi-NCR 2.

2. Delhi Advanced Mycology Diagnosis and Research Centre at ILBS

In view of the ongoing SARS COV 2 pandemic, Govt. of India and various State Governments along with ICMR and various medical health & research institutions, both in public as well as private, are finding ways and means including innovative strategies for prevention, control, and treatment of COVID-19. For this purpose, clinical trials for drugs, medicines, and vaccines, etc. are also being undertaken on a war footing. Recently, India is battling with a new challenge i.e., mucormycosis, a rare fungal disease with a high mortality rate commonly referred to as 'black fungus' in COVID patients.

In this regard, the present proposal is being submitted for kind consideration of the higher Authorities under GNCT of Delhi for setting up of **"Delhi Advanced Mycology Diagnosis and Research Centre"** at ILBS under Government of NCT of Delhi in order to cater facility for fungal testing for Covid 19 patients in particular. This new Advanced Mycology diagnosis and research centre will be state of art facility where World class Fungal diagnostic testing, antifungal drug sensitivity (susceptibility) testing, research and training will be done, proving beneficial for policy making related to infectious diseases, making Delhi the epicentre of advanced mycology diagnosis and research. It can cater to all patients in the NCT of Delhi, for fungal testing in COVID patients. Such a dedicated facility in the NCR would be immense help and keep the city ready for any emergent situation.

3. Institute has opened four (4) new beds for Renal Transplant Patients.

4. Institutes have further added ten (10) more dialysis beds state of art unit facility equipped with latest technology Double stage hot feed RO Plant on 10 March 2022 on World Kidney Day.

22. JAG PARVESH CHANDRA HOSPITAL

The hospital is situated in Shastri Park area of North-East District of Delhi covering about a million population residing in Ghonda, Seelampur, Yamuna Vihar and Babarpur Assembly constituencies of Trans-Yamuna area. This hospital provides secondary health care services to the people of the above Assembly Constituencies and adjoining areas in addition to primary health care services, laboratory services, MCH, family welfare services and other emergency services. Keeping in view of the above objective O.P.D. services at 200 bedded Shastri Park Hospital under Directorate of Health Services, Govt. of Delhi were inaugurated by Hon' ble Health Minister on 3rd Oct. 2003 through a part of OPD Block which was still under construction. Complete OPD Block was handed over by PWD during 2nd quarter of 2005.

DEPARTMENT OF OPD: Under HIMS, complete digitalization of OPD services is required for further streamline of OPD. More streamlining of IT service required for better coordination and projection of data related work & activities.

DEPARTMENT OF CLINICAL PATHOLOGY: Automation in urine section for urine & semen samples.

DEPARTMENT OF ACCIDENT & EMERGENCY: 25 bedded ICU to be set up in casualty to increase the bed space & triage area in casualty.

DEPARTMENT OF BLOOD BANK: Department is planning to start Component Preparation with automatic component extractor (Leucocytes deficient) for thalassaemia patients and multi transfusion cases.

DEPARTMENT OF PEDIATRIC: Creation of Neonatal surgical ICU and paediatric surgical ICU adjacent to ward 5A & 5B in Lok Nayak Hospital, New Delhi. Departmental library is being planned to be made in fourth floor, B.L. Taneja block, M.A.M.C, New Delhi. Modular O.T., C-ARM guided surgery e.g. PNCL, Robotic surgery & Endotrainer laboratory is being planned to be made by Department in Lok Nayak Hospital, New Delhi.

DEPARTMENT OF MICROBIOLOGY: Demand has been put up for fully automated blood culture system for rapid delivery of results & reports to people. Proposal for Automated Microbial Identification system is underway. Plans for expansion of the tests available in the immuno analysis. Requisition has been placed for anti-Hbs kits, Procalcitonin etc. Automated blood culture system procurement is under process.

DEPARTMENT OF GENETIC LAB: A Composite proposal of genome testing not only of pandemics but also of other disorder like drug resistant tuberculosis. Integration of Next generation sequencing panel for multiple disorders like male and female infertility, epilepsy, autism, deafness, critical congenital heart disease is envisaged. We also plan to start whole exome sequencing for the different cases we encounter.

DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE: Proposal for dedicated physiotherapist to improve the quality of life for patients with Haemophilia by providing focused care for Musculo Skeletal problems. To provide self infusion training to haemophilic patients so that their confidence can be boosted along with making them independent. To increase awareness regarding its proper care and home management and also to sanitize towards the disease condition.

DEPARTMENT OF LAUNDRY: There is requesting of 2 “bed sheet press “Machine namely FLAT BED PRESS Machine and 2 calendaring Machine.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE PERIOD 2020-21 & ANY OTHER RELEVANT INFORMATION:

DEPARTMENT OF DERMATOLOGY: Successful training programs were conducted for Medical officers (HIV and STD), PGDGM (Geriatric Dermatology), IGNOU and for PG students for MAIDS. Departments has tried to create awareness amongst the healthcare workers regarding PPE kit related adverse reactions in order to identify and provide early care to our Covid warriors during the ongoing pandemic .

DEPARTMENT OF ANAESTHESIA: Provided anaesthesia services to all emergency & elective operative cases in COVID-19 & non COVID patients. Managed 3 major COVID ICUs, non covid ICU (37 beds) running at full occupancy and managed ICUs like SICU & ZCU3 (covid ZCU). All OTs have started in full swing. OPD (PAC) has started. We get almost 150 patients every day. Special services like Dental OT, MRI, CT Scan, sedation have also been started. Dedicated OMICRON ICUs were receiving disruptive third wave. Setting up of Emergency Casualty ICU & protocols for the same.

DEPARTMENT OF OPD: Token system started at the OPD Registration Counter for smooth and hassle free functioning of OPD services. Lab dedicated to Obs. & Gyn. Department was inaugurated and made functional in 2nd floor main OPD, Gyn. & Obs. Department. NQAS related work & activities are projected on war footing and various sectors have been actively involved & participating till date. Hand sanitizer machine installed and functional at various floor & covid appropriate behaviour for both staff & patients is a prime importance, IFC activities done. New Uro-dynamic lab has been inaugurated in paediatric Surgery OPD on 23.03.2022. New Paediatric Dermatology clinic has been opened on 25.03.2022 at 7th floor OPD block. Minor OT room no. 418 has been renovated & equipped with latest requisite equipments.

DEPARTMENT OF ACCIDENT & EMERGENCY: LNH being the covid dedicated Hospital with 1500 beds and casualty having 40 beds. During 2nd wave of covid, casualty department did exceptionally well and admitted all patients. No refusal policy was followed throughout. 6 ICU beds also remained functional.

DEPARTMENT OF BLOOD BANK: Blood Bank organized two blood donation camps.

DEPARTMENT OF OBSTETRICS & GYNAECOLOGY: Care of Covid positive pregnant & non- pregnant women requiring oxygen (NIV).

DEPARTMENT OF DIETARY: Covid-19 world pandemic imposed a new set of challenges to maintain healthy immune system to conquer / combat the pandemic. Intensive repeated regular training & counseling of food handlers regarding hygiene & safety measures in view of covid-19. Individual preferences and needs were taken care by the interactive session with patients by our dietitians on whatsapp group created by treating doctors. Fox nuts / Roasted Makhana started for all COVID-19 patients except renal and liquid diet patients

along with evening tea. Main kitchen extended its services to Ramleela Ground Covid facility and Rouse Avenue School Covid health Centre LNH annex only for patients. Modified special diet to all Black Fungus / Mucor admitted patients.

Dietary/M.K department is taking care of COVID-19 patient till onset of COVID-19 and relevant adaptive measures accordingly. Intensive repeated regular training & counselling of food handlers regarding hygiene, social distancing. Main kitchen extended its services to One Stop Centre (Sakhi). Served international COVID (Omicron) patients admitted in Nursing Home. Fostac training of food handler & other staff by FSSAI official. Now, all the Main Kitchen staff is trained and certified. Steamed salad started for all Covid-19 patients except soft, renal and liquid diet patients along with lunch. No. of persons counseled during the period: OPD Patients: - 3943, IPD patient: - 2532.

DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRIC: Best paper award of Neonatal surgery session in IAPSCON-2021. All Faculties were involved in IAPSCON 2021 as moderator and Author & Co-author of paper presentation. Advanced laparoscopic & thoracoscopic surgery was performed by the faculty of the department. Plasma sterilizer, variety of energy sources like ligature & harmonic scalped in O.T. & A.B.G Machine, Defibrillator & multipart monitors on every bed had been installed. Intramural project entitled “Serum MMP-7 as a diagnostic & Prognostic biomarker for Extra hepatic biliary artresia” had been started. Gender Dysphora in children with DSD the crux of current management organised on 13th November 2021, Pediatric Surgery, MAMC, New Delhi. Ongoing intramural project on oncology going on. New project on ‘Birth registry’ submitted. Uro-dynamic study laboratory was established by department of Paediatric Surgery. “Occurrence of mutation of 1p and p53 chromosome in solid tumour in children.”

DAPARTMENT OF MICROBIOLOGY: The Laboratory has installed an Automated Immuno analysis in the Laboratory. The dengue NS1 testing commenced in this period and the laboratory has handled nearly 100 samples per day for NS1. The reports were made available within one day of receiving the samples. We have got new auto clave and a Hot Air Oven installed in Lab. The Laboratory has functioned 24*7 & testing samples during this period and has undertaken tests like Covid-19 Ig G levels, Denge NJ1etc. NQAS activities are being undertaken efficiently.

32. SANJAY GANDHI MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

33. SARDAR VALLABH BHAI PATEL HOSPITAL

Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel Hospital, a 50 sanctioned bedded Secondary Level Hospital is located in thickly populated colony of Patel Nagar (Part of West Delhi), surrounded by adjoining colonies of Baba Farid Puri, Rajasthan Colony, Prem Nagar, Baljeet Nagar, Ranjeet Nagar, Shadi Pur, Kathputli Colony, Regarpura etc inhabited by large population of people belonging to Low and Middle Socio-Economic Status. About 7–8 lakhs of people fall in the catchment area of the hospital and are dependent on this hospital for their day-to-day health needs. Earlier this was an MCW Centre with MCD, which was taken over from MCD by Govt. of NCT of Delhi on 01.10.1996 by a special act passed through assembly.

The prime aim of the takeover was to upgrade this hospital to 50 bedded capacities so that it acts as a Secondary Level Health Care Delivery Outlet in the area. Its main objective is to provide minimum free basic health care services. This hospital is spread over 1.37 Acres of Land. The Hospital is three-storey building divided into two wings spread on an area of 5339 Sq m with built up area of 2334 sqm.

OPD services has been started wef 06/04/2022 with Non-COVID services with Orthopedics, Medicine, Pediatrics, Dermatology, Surgery, OBG, Ophthalmology, ENT departments.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS DRUING THE PERIOD 2020-21.

1. Treated 18202 numbers of COVID -19 Outpatients and 1088 inpatients during this COVID -19 pandemic. Burari Hospital has attended total 36139 of Confirmed and COVID Suspected patients since the advent of the COVID-19 Pandemic.
2. Daily reporting of COVID-19 census at various government portals including Line Listing of Patients, Mortality data and HIMS Portal is being done on regular basis
3. We made the provision for testing inflammatory markers for COVID-19 like CRP, D- dimer, IL6, LDH, S. Ferritin. We also made provision for Digital Chest X-ray and HRCT Chest for early identification of COVID-19 Pneumonia.
4. We also made provision of timely and adequate supply of good quality drugs for COVID-19 management including Inj. Remdesivir, Inj. Enoxaparen, Inj. Methylprednisolone, and newer drugs like 2 DG, Monoclonal Antibody Cocktail, Amphotericin B etc.
5. Started video conferencing facility for attendants of COVID patients for patients admitted in hospital in order to ease the distress of patients and attendants during their stay in the hospital.
6. The Hospital has setup 24X7 Help desk facility for the attendants of COVID patients where real time information about the patients was given to the attendants through Whatsapp group and Patients Health Bulletin.
7. CCTV cameras were installed in every ward of the Burari Hospital.
8. ICU and HDU are well equipped with equipments like HFNO, BIPAP and Ventilators.

9. Upgraded infrastructure as per requirements and increased bed capacity from 320 to 800 gradually over the period of one year and increased oxygen availability by providing piped oxygen supply on all beds.
10. Successfully installed and function three PSA Oxygen Generator plants in Burari Hospital to meet the demand of oxygen. Burari Hospital was the first in Delhi Government to establish and function PSA plant before 2nd wave of COVID. LMO installation is working.
11. We timely assess the hospital staff acquiring COVID-19 infection by mandatory testing after red zone duties and provided them necessary Isolation/Quarantine through Hospital Infection Control Committee.
12. Burari Hospital is always prepared for the COVID-19 wave and has imparted regular training with latest National guidelines regarding COVID management and related complications to all 500 medical staff including doctors, nurses and paramedical staff.

39. AMBEDKAR NAGAR HOSPITAL

Ambedkar Nagar Hospital was started on 9th August 2020 under Disaster Management Act, 2005 as a 200 bedded dedicated COVID hospital to cater to the needs of residents of Delhi. The hospital is located in the South Delhi's Ambedkar Nagar Constituency and has benefited not just residents of Ambedkar Nagar but also those in nearby areas such as Sangam Vihar, Deoli, Khanpur, Madangir and Dakshinpuri as there was no big hospital in the area till now. When the hospital was started, most of the admitted patients were mild to moderate COVID-19 patients and initially 200 beds were operational which was later upgraded to 600 beds in view of the second wave of COVID in April 2021. Hospital aims to upgrade its infrastructure and facilities so that severe cases can also be admitted to this hospital and are provided quality care. In view of the anticipated third COVID wave, 50 pediatric level beds is being planned to be set up along with 10 pediatric intensive care unit (PICU) / intensive care unit (ICU) beds. There are 600 beds including 30 ICU beds for adults and 50 high-dependency unit (HDU) beds is being planned to be set up.

The following facilities are provided to the patients:-

- a) Emergency & Casualty (24X7).
- b) Registration Counters.
- c) Flu Clinic & Pharmacy.
- d) IPD Services (24X7) with separate male & female wards for patients.
- e) Video calling facility for attendants of admitted patients.
- f) X-ray unit having two portable X-ray machine.

Infrastructure of the hospital:

The hospital building consists of two basement floors, Ground Floor and seven floors. A brief of the infrastructure of the hospital is detailed below:-

- **Emergency and Casualty:** Emergency and Casualty is a fully integrated complex and has a well equipped 10 bedded casualty with Multipara Monitors, Oxygen Concentrators, Oxygen Cylinders, Nebulizers, BiPAP alongside each bed. Suction Machine, Defibrillator, Transport Ventilator (for transport of sick patients), ECG & X-ray facility is available round the clock. The department has a dedicated team of Resident Doctors, Nursing Officers,

X-ray technician, other paramedical and Group 'D' staff who work under the overall supervision of CMO on duty.

• **Oxygen Storage and In-House Oxygen generation capacity:** Oxygen is the primary requirement in treatment of COVID-19 patients. Besides availability of B-Type & D-Type Oxygen Cylinders, BiPAP, High Flow Nasal Oxygen (HFNO), NRBMs, Oxygen Flow Meters and Pulse Oximeter, two Oxygen plants-Pressure Swing Adsorption (PSAs) having oxygen generation capacity of 330 liter/minute and 600 liter/ minute respectively are functional. Manifold and central oxygen /gas pipelines are under process of completion. Further, request has also been made to DDA to provide land for installing Liquid Medical Oxygen (LMO) plant in order to ensure round the clock uninterrupted oxygen supply to 600 bedded hospital.

• **Flu Clinic & Pharmacy:** The flu clinic is situated on the ground floor of the hospital and facility for RAT, RT-PCR and laboratory tests for COVID is available.

• **Medical Record Department (MRD):** The MRD is functioning for the long term comprehensive record keeping of all indoor patients containing the patient's information, health history and medical examination findings. It also records death registration of event occurring in the hospital and updation of COVID-19 Data Management Portal, GNCTD.

• **Parking:** There is sufficient space for parking of the vehicles for the staff and separate parking area for Ambulance visiting the hospital. Further, request has also been made to DDA to provide additional parking area for patients and patient's attendants visiting the hospital for treatment.

• **Horticulture:** The allotted space for greenery has been fully utilized with plants and trees.

• **Store:** The store of the Hospital for medical, general, surgical, consumable & nonconsumable items, equipments, linen items and stationery are maintained on the 1st and 4th floor of the hospital.

• **Kitchen:** Kitchen is functional on outsourced basis. Morning tea, breakfast, lunch, evening tea and dinner is provided to all indoor patient

• **COVID Vaccination Centre:** Doses of approved Covishield Vaccine by Government of India were administered free of cost since inception of Vaccination Programme on 16th January 2021 in Ambedkar Nagar Hospital.

• **Biomedical Waste Management System:** Biomedical waste generated in the hospital is managed according to guidelines for handling, treatment and disposal of waste generated during treatment / diagnosis / quarantine of COVID-19 patients-“Revision-4” issued by Central Pollution Control Board.

• **Video-calling facility for attendants of admitted patients:** Provision of video calling facility is available 24X7 for attendants of patients who are admitted in various wards etc. of the hospital. A porta cabin of 10X10 feet is made near the reception area of the hospital where a video caller is available 24X7 in rotational shift duties. The video caller is provided with a tablet with functional SIM card and the attendant of the patient is assisted in making a video call to his patient admitted in the ward.

• **Mortuary:** The hospital Mortuary has six cabinets of blue star for storing dead bodies of COVID-19 +ve / COVID-19 suspected cases till their further disposal. This facility is available with effect from 14th August, 2020 the temperature is maintained at 2°C and maintenance is done quarterly. Provision of hearse van is also available through Nodal Officer (Ambulance), Office of District Magistrate (South Delhi). Further, a request for procurement and installation of two more mortuary body cabinet units having storage capacity of four dead bodies each was sent to CEO, NBCC/NSL on 29th April

2021 thereby increasing the total capacity from current six to fourteen dead bodies storage.

ANY OTHER FUTURE PROPOSALS / RELEVANT INFORMATION OF THE HOSPITAL.

Ambedkar Nagar Hospital was started on 09.08.2020 under Disaster Management Act, 2005 as a 200 bedded dedicated COVID hospital. When the hospital was started, most of the admitted patients were mild to moderate COVID-19 patients and initially 200 beds were operational. The hospital aims to upgrade its infrastructure and facilities so that severe cases can also be admitted to this hospital and are provided quality care. The hospital aims to escalate the beds to 600 beds which would include 100 intensive care unit (ICU) beds, 50 pediatric covid beds with 10 pediatric intensive care unit (ICU) beds. Oxygen is the primary requirement in treatment of covid patients. Two oxygen plants-Pressure Swing Adsorption (PSAs) having oxygen generation capacity of 330 liter/minute and 600 liter/minute respectively are functional. These PSA plants are connected to Medical Gas Pipeline System (MGPS) of the hospital. One KL Liquid Medical Oxygen (LMO) Plant has been commissioned on 30.03.2022 and connected to MGPS of the hospital. Separate Covered facility has been created for storage of Medical gas Cylinders adjacent to PSA Plant. A request has also been made to DDA to provide land for installing Liquid Medical Oxygen (LMO) plant in order to ensure round the clock uninterrupted oxygen supply to 600 bedded hospital.

MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE PERIOD 2021-22.

Ambedkar Nagar Hospital is providing Emergency & Casualty (24X7), Flu Clinic & Pharmacy, IPD Services (24X7) with separate male & female wards for patients. As per directions of Government of India, till date, doses of approved Covishield are being administered free of cost in the hospital since inception of the vaccination programme in January 2021. Doses of Corbevax vaccine for children (12-14 years) has been started with effect from 16.03.2022 Vaccination Site-3 for Covaxin is to be started soon in the hospital. Covid 19 RAT & RT-PCR testing is being done in the Flu Clinic from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and 24X7 radiology services (X-Ray) are also being provided to the patients.

40. INDIRA GANDHI HOSPITAL

Indira Gandhi Hospital, Delhi Government is planned as a 1725 bedded Teaching Hospital and Medical College to be made operational in two phases. **The hospital was planned initially for 500 beds, thereafter it was scaled up to 700 bedded Teaching Hospital**, which was further, scaled up to 1725 beds teaching hospital with multi-specialty and super specialty services and a medical college. At present, Indira Gandhi Hospital has capacity of 1241 beds. In the second phase, hospital will add 484 bedded MCH block and a medical college with 150 MBBS students' intake and different post-graduate programmes including MD / MS / DNB / DM / MCH / Diploma etc. Within 54 months.

The Hospital is planned as a facility with state-of-the-art technology in its

construction and operations. It is a certified green building with all its bed being oxygen beds. It has been envisaged as a Super speciality hospital which will also have a Medical College in its next phase of construction.

Indira Gandhi Hospital was made operational in the second wave COVID Pandemic in Delhi since 10-5-2021 in which it had to achieve a target for operationalising 1241 beds and 330 ICU beds for COVID management.

The target for operationalisation of 1241 beds with 330 ICU beds has been achieved in time i.e 20th October 2021. All 1241 beds are oxygen supported beds with MGPS and manifold gas system.

It also started its OPD services with effect from 22nd November 2021 and IPD services were started from 31st January 2022. The IPD services were declared open on 31st December 2021 however it had to be halted due to rising cases of COVID 3rd Wave pandemic. Emergency services was started on 11/04/2022 and Major OT/Emergency OT services on 6/7/2022.

Current Infrastructure Status of the Hospital are as under: -

1. BED STRENGTH STATUS

a. ICU Services–Present Status

At present there are 24x7, total 330 fully functional ICU beds for COVID management that includes 200 beds for non-invasive ventilation (with BiPAP and HFNO) and 130 beds for critical ICU with invasive-ventilation(with Ventilator) when-ever needed. It also includes 50 bedded Paediatric ICU. The ICU has also started admitting Non COVID patients.

b. Non ICU COVID WARDS with Oxygen facility

At present, there are 911 functional beds in the ward block, the OPD Block and GF, 1st floor, and 2nd floor, Emergency Block with Oxygen facility.

2. OXYGEN AVAILABILITY, PRESENT STATUS AND FUTURE PLAN

- a. 50 MT LMO storage tank** has been installed The tank will serve as a buffer storage for linked Hospitals.
- b. One20 KL LMO Distribution Tank**– has been installed for Hospital use.
- c. Gas Pipeline System** has been laid down and connected to all 1241 beds for Oxygen Supply which has been connected to the manifold systems
- d. Six PSA plants of 500 LPM** 6 PSA plants of total capacity 3300 LPM has been installed and are operational for 1241 beds.
- e.** Additionally, Hospital has 1340 D type Cylinders, 100 B Type Cylinders and 1247 Oxygen Concentrators.

3. EQUIPMENT & FURNITURE

The hospital wards are well equipped with motorised, semi motorised and semi fowler beds, bedside furniture, monitors and utilities. Essential equipment for Hospital functioning has also been procured and further procurement is in process. Support services as in Group D staff, Sanitation services, Kitchen and dietary, Laundry and Security services have been taken on outsource basis. The diagnostic services are functional.

II. CLINICAL SERVICES

In pursuance of the directions of Hon'ble High Court of Delhi, the target to start Covid facilities for 1241 beds was 20, October, 2021 and that was successfully achieved in terms of infrastructure, beds and equipment. Further, the hospital has started OPD services for

various specialties with effect from 22nd November, 2021. IPD Services were started from 31st December, 2021 and which was halted in view of hospital being designated as Covid Hospital due to rising number of Covid patients (Third Wave). Thereafter, on the decline of the number of Covid patients, the IPD services for routine and regular services has re-started with effect from 31.01.2022.

CHAPTER 10

CENTRALISED ACCIDENT & TRAUMA SERVICES (CATS)

Centralized Accident & Trauma Services (CATS), an Autonomous Body of Govt. of NCT of Delhi is providing 24x7x 365 free of cost ambulance service through toll free number “102” for all kind of medical emergencies including on board deliveries.

Achievements 1st April 2021 to 31 March 2022

1. Total 559731 calls (included 41188 Covid calls) service calls have been received in CATS Control Room and same were attended by CATS ambulances.
2. Total 397067 patients have been shifted by CATS ambulances.
3. CATS successfully handled the increased requirement of ambulances during emergent situation of IIIrd wave of COVID-19 (OMICRON) and was able to maintain average response time of ambulances up to 15 to 16 minutes by hiring additional ambulances / Cab Taxi for transportation of Non COVID / non-critical patients as well as for deployment at the COVID-19 vaccination centers.
4. From 22.03.2022, three new Basic Support Ambulances (BLS) have been inducted in CATS ambulance fleet under CSR funds.
5. During the period 01.04.2021 to 31.03.2022, CATS has operated 305 no's ambulances (CATS own ambulances 240 Nos. & additional hired 65 no's ambulances) of ambulances & 320 no's of Cab Taxi.

Future plan

A proposal for outsourcing 400 ambulances & modern CATS Control Room is under submission.

CHAPTER 11

DIRECTORATE OF FAMILY WELFARE

Directorate of Family Welfare (DFW) is responsible for planning, co-coordinating, supervising the implementation, monitoring and evaluating following programs / initiatives related to Maternal, adolescent, newborn and child health along with implementation of certain statutory Acts like MTP Act and PNDT Act.

1. Provision of Antenatal, Natal and Post Natal services to pregnant women with an aim to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality.
2. Implementation of maternal health programs i.e. Janani Suraksha Yojana, Janani Sishu Suraksha Karyakram, PMSMA, Laqshya.
3. Provision of Essential new born care (at every 'delivery' point at time of birth).
4. Operationalization of Facility based sick newborn care (at FRUs & District Hospitals) through Special Newborn Care Units.
5. Provision of Home Based Newborn Care (HBNC) & Home Based Young Child Care (HBYC) Programmes.
6. Promotion of Infant and Young Child Feeding Practices (IYCF) under Mother's Absolute Affection (MAA) Programme.
7. Management of Childhood Diarrhoeal Diseases.
8. Prevention and management of Acute Respiratory Infections & Social Awareness and Action to Neutralize Pneumonia Successfully (SAANS) Programme.
9. Provision of Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) at Delivery Points.
10. Setting up of District Early Interventions Centre (DEIC): To counter 4Ds (Defects, Deficiencies, Diseases, Developmental Delays & Disabilities).
11. Nutritional Rehabilitation Centre (NRC): Establishment & Strengthening of NRC to take care of severely malnourished children (SAM).
12. Establishing Early Intervention Centre (EIC) / Centre of Excellence (CoE) at Medical College Hospital of Delhi.
13. Provision of family planning services (Basket of Contraceptives, female / male sterilization, Counseling, follow-up, support & referral etc.).
14. Support ASHA in providing support to eligible couples through scheme like Home Delivery of Contraceptive (HDC).
15. Implementation of UIP (Universal Immunization Program).
16. COVID Vaccination of the entire eligible population of 18 plus age group.
17. Surveillance of VPD (Vaccine Preventable Diseases) Services.
18. Bi-annual rounds of National De-worming Day (NDD) are held in the state as part of Anemia prevention and control strategy among children and Adolescents.
19. Operationalization of "UDAAN" scheme with an aim to improve accessibility of Sanitary napkins for adolescent girls (non-school going) and also to increase their awareness of Menstrual Hygiene Management.
20. Weekly Iron & Folic Acid Supplement (WIFS) program to ensure provision of a weekly prophylactic dose of IFA tablet to adolescents to prevent Anemia.
21. IFA Supplementation program for under-5 children.
22. Operationalization of IFA supplementation initiative for children in 6-10 years' age group.
23. Health & Wellness programs in schools by training of teachers who then work as Health & Wellness Ambassadors with focus on adolescent centric issues with school children.
24. Prevention and control of the growing menace of Anemia, as public health problem especially among Adolescents, Organization of Test-Treat-Talk (T3) Anemia camps across schools & colleges of Delhi, under Anemia Mukta Bharat Scheme, and also as a part of POSHAN Maah.
25. Implementation of PC & PNDT & MTP (Medical Termination of Pregnancy) Act.

26. Co-ordination and execution of IEC activities, campaigns through Mass Education Media.
27. Procurement of vaccines (through CPA), stocking, maintaining cold chain, disbursing vaccines and family welfare logistics to all health providing agencies in the state.
28. Capacity Building to update knowledge & skills of various categories of health functionaries by providing RMNCHA+N trainings by the H&FW Training Centre.

1. Essential Immunization Program:

Directorate of Family Welfare under its RCH Program Unit is engaged in delivery of immunization services through more than 600 health delivery points. The immunization program aims to protect the children against more than 12 diseases namely Tuberculosis, Poliomyelitis, Hepatitis-B, Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus, Hib related diseases (Meningitis, Pneumonia and Septicemia), Measles, Mumps, Rubella and Typhoid as reported on HMIS portal by all public health facilities & some private facilities.

During 2019-20, Rota Virus Vaccine was introduced in the State in the month of July. **About.749389 (all three) doses of Rota Virus Vaccine were administered during the year 2021-22.** During 2021-22, PCV Vaccine was introduced in the State in the month of August 2021, wherein, three doses of PCV need to be administered at the age of 1.5 months, 3.5 months and 9 months (1st dose, 2nd dose and booster dose respectively). State Level VPD Surveillance Workshop was conducted for Surveillance of Vaccine Preventable Diseases followed by roll out of VPD surveillance in the State. IMI 4.0 was implemented for three months i.e. March, April & May 2022 in all the districts of Delhi.

During the Same year, Electronic Vaccine Intelligence Network (eVIN) was implemented successfully in the State. eVIN offers innovative use of technology for temperature monitoring, system strengthening, improving program Governance and real time visibility of vaccine data.

Cold Chain Augmentation: The cold chain space has been enhanced through addition of cold chain equipment received from GOI. Further new dedicated State vaccine store has been created at Rajeev Gandhi Super Specialty Hospital (RGSSH).

Strengthening of AEFI Surveillance-The State & District AEFI Committees have been expanded with addition of medical specialists including Cardiologist, Neurologist, Respiratory Specialist & Gynecologist. AEFI Surveillance network has been expanded through addition of AEFI Management centers and designated AEFI Nodal Officers.

New Initiatives- In order to get real time information about temperatures in various equipments of cold chain, temperature loggers are being installed in all electrical cold chain equipments which will help to manage the cold chain with better efficiency.

Routine Immunization is being incorporated on the successful model of COVID Vaccination by using a uniform pan India portal (currently named as u-VIN). Pilot projects in two districts of Delhi i.e., North-West and South District is being conducted which will later include all 11 districts of Delhi.

3. Child Health

Child Health is one of the important components of RCH Programme. The State is making concerted efforts to reduce Mortality and Morbidity among children.

Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) of Delhi has shown decline from 24 (SRS 2013) to 12 (SRS 2020).

The aim of the State is to reduce Neonatal Mortality Rate (NMR), Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) and Under 5 Mortality Rate (U5-MR) to single digit. To reduce Neonatal Mortality Rate, State has improved Newborn Care Facilities by establishing Special Newborn Care Units

(SNCUs) and Kangaroo Mother Care also New Born Care Corners (NBCCs). The Key Strategies to decrease the LBW prevalence through Optimum Antenatal care and maternal nutrition and to ensure Essential Newborn Care, State has mapped NBCCs with trained care providers for all 61 delivery points. To ensure prompt identification, stabilization and management of sick Newborns, strengthening of well-equipped and staffed NBSUs, SNCUs and NICUs is being carried out. Furthermore, for prompt and seamless referrals of sick neonates requiring higher level of neonatal care, well defined Referral Linkages are also being created.

Comprehensive Screening of the Newborns for Developmental Anomalies is being done in the hospitals. Screening for early intervention through Field Workers under Home Based New born Care (HBNC) & Home Based Care for Young Children (HBYC) is also being carried out. Early recognition of 4Ds (Defects, Deficiencies, Diseases, Developmental Delays & Disabilities) to facilitate Intervention at DEICs and referral hospitals is being undertaken. An effective system of Child Death Review is also being operationalized as a key strategy to reduce the delay in delivery of Health Care to sick children.

Delhi has 33 public hospitals providing intensive & resuscitative care to the new born babies who are sick. 30 hospitals are Special Newborn Care Units (SNCU) providing level-II and above care. 3 public health facilities are Stabilizing units for Newborn.

New Born Care Corners (NBCCs) are functional at all 61 delivery points within the labour room and OTs in the State ensuring essential New born care at all the delivery points.

Nutritional Rehabilitation Center (NRC)

Strengthening of existing Nutritional Rehabilitation Centre (NRC) in 02 hospitals at KSCH & HRH and establishment of 4 new NRCs to take care of severely malnourished children (SAM). NRCs are facility based units providing medical and nutritional care to SAM Children under 5 years who have medical complications. Also skills of mother on child care and feeding practices are improved so that child receives care at home.

Intensified Diarrhoea Control Fortnight (IDCF)

Intensified Diarrhoea Control Fortnight (IDCF) was implemented in 2014, with an aim of achieving improved coverage of essential life-saving commodity of ORS, ZINC dispersible tablets and practice of appropriate child feeding practices during diarrhoea. Delhi observed IDCF from **13th June, 2022 to 27th June, 2022** across the State to sensitize and bring awareness among the masses. Delhi also carried out the following activities like ORS preparation Demonstration in UHNDs and focused group discussions in all districts. Munadi and other IEC activities were done to create awareness on IDCF. ASHAs & AWW meetings were done. Health Talks were given in the facilities and communities during this fortnight.

Mother Absolute Affection Programme (MAA)

MAA focuses on awareness campaign to improve the breastfeeding indicators, at all 60 delivery points and to impart trainings & to improve skills of Health Care worker involved in Child care at their institutes and also sensitization of ASHAs & AWW for motivating mothers and pregnant women for Early initiation of breastfeeding& Exclusive Breast Feeding.

Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC): -Kangaroo mother care has been started in 33 Newborn care units for improving survival of premature and LBW babies.

SAANS programme aimed to reduce child morbidity and mortality due to pneumonia has been rolled out. Sensitization on SAANS has also been done for all district officers. SAANS was implemented successfully for treatment and timely referral of Pneumonia cases to health care facilities along with IEC done at District / facility / community level. Guidelines of treatment algorithm disseminated to all health facilities for Display and implementation and Basic equipment are available with all facilities.

Child Death Review (CDR)

CDR has been launched in Delhi in all Districts to find out the gaps in child health delivery mechanisms and taking corrective actions. Delhi has a relatively low Child mortality which has been decreasing steadily. The aim is to decrease it further to minimum possible. District level Task Force for Child Death Review has been notified and meetings are being held. State level task force has also been notified.

New Activities

Newborn Screening- Mission NEEV Project: Comprehensive Newborn Screening Programme (Mission NEEV) is aimed at holistic evaluation of all newborns at various institutions in the Delhi State. The aim is to cover at least 1.5 lakhs births. Currently, 24 Public Health Birthing Facilities (5 Medical colleges and 19 District Hospitals) are reporting and carrying out activities under Mission NEEV.

Center of Excellence- Early Intervention Center- Lok Nayak Hospital (COE-EIC-LNH): - COE-EIC at LN Hospital is operational since October 2021, taking care of children identified to be suffering from 4Ds (Defects, Deficiencies, Diseases, Developmental Delays & Disabilities) to facilitate intervention at DEIC.

Strengthening of Public Sector Nurseries: In order to strengthen reporting on the FBNC portal by existing SNCUs/NICUs, State is providing Human Resource and capacity building activities to the existing SNCUs/NICUs.

Establishment of 5 LMUs: 5 District Hospitals have been identified to start Lactation Management Units in the current Financial Year.

MusQan: To ensure child-friendly services in public Health Facilities, MoHFW has launched MusQan for pediatric age group within the existing framework of NQAS to ensure timely, effective, efficient, safe, personcentered, equitable & integrated quality services in public health facilities. Delhi has a target of 6 hospitals to be MusQan certified in the current financial year.

4. Family Planning:

FP services are provided through primary, secondary and tertiary care facilities.

A. Permanent or Limiting methods of Contraception:

Delhi Provides high quality sterilization services through hospitals of different agencies

(Delhi Govt., MCD, NDMC, CGHS, ESI, NGOs and accredited private facilities). The Revised compensation scheme is followed for incentivizing the beneficiaries through PFMS portal. Adverse events following sterilization services are covered through Family Planning Indemnity Scheme (FPIS). In the year 2021-22, 15 sterilization failures were compensated.

B. Temporary methods:

Condoms, Oral pills (3 types), IUCD (2 types) and Injectable contraception services are provided at all health facilities and are available to the masses at nearest dispensaries. Besides, pills for emergency use in contraceptive accidents (ECP) are also available. Special emphasis is laid to fulfill contraceptive needs of Postpartum and Post abortion women.

7. Adolescent Health:

Delhi has an adolescent Population of nearly 35.0 Lac which is nearly 21% of its entire population. This represents a huge opportunity that can transform the social and economic fortunes of the State if substantial investments in their education, health and development are made.

As a part of strategy to address the Health & Development needs of adolescents a strategy in the form of RashtriyaKishorSwasthyaKaryakram (RKSK) has been adopted in Delhi. RKSK is a strategy based on a continuum of care for adolescent health & development needs, including the provision of information, commodities and services through various Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics (AFHCs) and also at the community level. It aims to provide an amalgamation of Preventive, Promotive, Curative, Counseling & Referral services to the

adolescents.

Weekly Iron & Folic Acid Supplementation (WIFS) Program < WIFS Program is being implemented through Govt. / Govt. aided Schools under the Directorate of Education as well as through AnganwadiCentres under the Department of Women & Child Development in Delhi wherein IFA supplement in the form of “BLUE” tablet is administered to adolescent girls & boys on each Wednesday throughout the year with alternative day of administration as Thursday. **Schools remained closed for the most part of F.Y. 2021-22 due to COVID-19 pandemic. Department however ensured distribution of IFA tablets to parents through schools to be administered to adolescents once a week (on Wednesday) at home. Distribution of IFA among out of schools adolescent girls through AWCs was affected as well however, the services were restored with ebbing of COVID-19 Pandemic with reported compliance (of ICDS based component) for the F.Y. 2021-22 being 20 %.**

National De-worming Day Campaign

A total of 27.71 lakh children were covered during the last round held in August, 2021 (Against a target of 31.16 lakh i.e. coverage of 88.94%).

Celebration of Adolescent Health Day: Activities to increase awareness about adolescent health & development issues and to dispel various myths and misconceptions regarding various issues particularly related to Nutrition, Mental Health, Sexual & Reproductive Health and Menstruation etc. apart from various important adolescent issues plaguing the State in particular Menstrual Hygiene, Substance, Misuse, Teenage Pregnancy besides the increasingly relevant issue of Anemia and malnutrition were undertaken. The activity was conducted at 45 venues across Delhi.

Menstrual Hygiene Scheme: “UDAAN” scheme has been rolled out with an aim to improve accessibility of adolescent girls (non-school going) to sanitary napkins and also make them more aware of Menstrual Hygiene Management. A revised scheme that provisions for a pack of 10 sanitary napkins (against a pack of six earlier) every month completely “Free of Cost” (against at a subsidized cost of Rs.6/- per pack earlier) has been approved and is expected to be rolled out during the 3rd quarter of C.F.Y. 2022-23.

A study to understand the menstrual hygiene practices among adolescent girls in rural and urban resettlement areas of Delhi was conducted by Maulana Azad Medical College (supported under National Health Mission). The report has been disseminated and the recommendations have been adopted by the State.

Anemia Mukht Bharat: As a part of prevention and control of the growing menace of Anemia as public health problem especially among Adolescents as per the guidelines issued by MoHFW, GoI under Anemia Mukht Bharat, IFA Supplementation initiative for Under-5 children has been rolled out across the State wherein a bi-weekly dose of IFA Syrup is administered by parents/caregivers at home to the eligible children. Parents/Caregivers have been provided with a bottle (with auto dispenser) containing 50 ml of IFA syrup and have been trained by ASHAs to administer the syrup and keep the record in “compliance card” (provided by ASHA). Each such household has been provided with a handout with information regarding anemia, its detrimental effect, ways to prevent and treat anemia, about do’s and don’ts of IFA Supplements, expected events that may follow IFA consumption and how to respond to these and seek help.

IFA supplementation initiative for children in 6-10 years’ age group has also been rolled out in the month of August,2021.

8. Maternal Health:

Maternal health is an important program under RMNCHA and is aimed to reduce Maternal morbidity and mortality through facilitating provision of quality antenatal and delivery services and ensuring postnatal services to pregnantwomen and implementation ofmaternal health programs/ schemes i.e. JSY, JSSK, PMSMA, LaQshya, etc.

Janani Suraksha Yojana:

It is a centrally sponsored scheme. The scheme aims to promote institutional delivery amongst Pregnant women (PW) belonging to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe & BPL families. PW are incentivized for undergoing institutional delivery in urban and rural area @Rs. 600/- and Rs.700/- respectively and BPL women is also incentivized with Rs. 500/- in case of home delivery.

The Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) is an effective link between the Govt. health facility and the pregnant women to facilitate in implementation of this program and she is also incentivized for facilitating the scheme in her allocated area.

The scheme is being implemented in all 11 districts of Delhi w.e.f. 2006.

All the health facilities enroll the eligible JSY beneficiaries i.e. PW belonging to SC/ ST/ BPL families during Antenatal clinics and then register them on RCH Portal and fetch the Aadhar linked Bank Account details of the client and necessary documents and she is given the JSY payment after delivery.

The mode of payment is Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) into the account of beneficiary via PFMS Portal.

JananiShishuSurakshaKaryakram (JSSK):

This scheme was launched in Delhi State w.e.f. September 2011. This is a centrally sponsored scheme. It aims to provide free and cashless service to all pregnant women reporting in all Government health institutions irrespective of any caste or economic status for normal deliveries / caesarean operations, for antenatal / postnatal complications and sick infants (from birth to 1 year of age).

The scheme aims to mitigate the burden of out of pocket expenses incurred by families of pregnant women and sick infants. Under the scheme no cash benefit is directly provided to beneficiary. Only the health facilities/ delivery points are provided fund under JSSK to enable them to provide free services to pregnant women and sick infants to fill the gap in demand under various subheads i.e. Diet, Drugs and Consumables, Diagnostics, Blood Transfusion, Transport & no User Charges levied by the facility, if any.

Comprehensive Abortion Care Services (CAC) Annual Report: Unsafe abortion with its associated complications remains a public health challenge in spite of legalization of induced abortion through MTP Act 1971. Comprehensive Abortion Care(CAC) is an attempt to provide guidance on safe, quality and comprehensive care for abortion within the frame work of MTP Act. It is an integral component of Maternal Health Intervention as a part of National Health Mission (NHM).

PradhanMantriSurakshitMatritvaAbhiyan (PMSMA)

PMSMA was implemented in Delhi State as per MOHFW, GOI guidelines w.e.f. July2016. It aims to provide quality antenatal care, identifying High risk PW beneficiaries and initiating appropriate treatment without delay so that IMR and Maternal mortality ratio can be reduced.

It is held on 9th of every month at all the Govt. health facilities. A due list of all missed out/dropped out pregnant women in 2nd& 3rd trimester & High risk pregnant women from the community is prepared by ASHAs and mobilized to the Govt. health facilities for ANC check-up.

Kilkari messages: This is a mobile service that delivers time-sensitive 72 audio messages (Voice Call) about pregnancy and child health care directly to the mobile phones of pregnant women/ mother/ parents. Essentialities-Entry in RCH portal, Correct mobile no of the beneficiary, LMP, Date of delivery etc.

LaQshya: Labour Room Quality Improvement initiative: Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, India has launched an ambitious program “LaQshya- Labour room quality improvement initiative on 11th Dec. 2017. The program is targeted as an approach to strengthen key processes related to Labour room and Maternity OTs to reduce maternal mortality and morbidity. **In Delhi three public health facilities Pt. Madan Mohan Malviya, Sanjay Gandhi Memorial and Acharya Shree Bhikshu Hospitals are now LaQshya certified.**

Maternal Death Surveillance and Response: Maternal deaths occurring in state are reviewed at facility, district and State level so that gaps are identified and corrective actions are taken to prevent future deaths. Most maternal deaths are reported from Medical Colleges Hospitals and high case load delivery points. Nearly 39% maternal deaths reported belong to neighboring state.

During 2021-22, total 644 Maternal Deaths were reported (Source-HMIS Portal). Out of these 495(77%) were reviewed.

9. PC & PNDT: Directorate of Family Welfare is the nodal department for the implementation of PC & PNDT Act in Delhi. The PC PNDT Act is being implemented through statutory bodies i.e., State Supervisory Board, State Advisory Committee, State Appropriate Authority, District Appropriate Authority & District Advisory Committee as per the provisions of PC & PNDT Act.

The various IEC/ BCC Activities were carried out for the awareness of society in regard to the important girl child

- Community Awareness programs are being conducted by organizing Health Talks, Focal Group Discussion, NukkadNatak, Beti Shakti Abhiyan and the BetiUtsav was celebrated 18th Jan – 31st Jan 2022 and is celebrated every year.

12 DELHI STATE AIDS CONTROL SOCIETY

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1. Delhi State AIDS Control Society, a society formed by Delhi Government, implements the National AIDS Control Programme, a centrally sponsored programme in Delhi. The society became functional on 1st November, 1998. The main objectives of the society are to prevent and control HIV transmission in Delhi and to strengthen state capacity to respond to long-term challenges posed by the epidemic. The society implements various activities under National AIDS Control Programme through various Govt. departments/ institutes/ hospitals and Non-Government organizations in Delhi. Presently phase V of NACP is being implemented.

1.2. NACO has estimated adult HIV prevalence (15-49 yr) in Delhi to be 0.38%, with 67940 persons living with HIV in 2022, 2900 New HIV Infections per year and about 690 HIV deaths. HIV Sentinel surveillance activities were last carried out in 2020-21 in Delhi at 10 ANC, 4 FSW, 3 MSM, 3 IDU, 2 TG, 1 migrant, trucker and 2 prison sites.

1.3. The services under the National AIDS Control Programme provided through various health facilities in Delhi are depicted in Table 1.

BASIC SERVICES DIVISION

1.4. Basic Services Division co-ordinates HIV Counseling and Testing services and sexually transmitted infections/reproductive tract infections. The STI component deals with awareness, prevention, and presumptive/syndromic management of the sexually transmitted infections/reproductive tract infections.

1.5. HIV Counseling and Testing Services: HIV Counseling and Testing Services (HTCS) is critical first step in detecting and linking people with HIV to access treatment and care. The

goal of these services is to identify as many people living with HIV, as early as possible (after acquiring the HIV infection), and linking them appropriately in a timely manner to prevention, care and treatment services. Integrated Counseling and Testing Centers (ICTCs) functioning under Basic Services Division provide the following services:

- i. Counselling and Testing of clients and linkage of detected HIV positives to ART Centres
- ii. Prevention of Parent-To-Child Transmission of HIV (PPTCT) and elimination of Mother-To-Child Transmission of syphilis (EMTCT) and Early Infant Diagnosis (EID)
- iii. HIV-Tuberculosis collaborative activities.

1.6. As on 31/3/2022, 90 Stand Alone ICTCs (including one mobile ICTC), 428 Govt. FICTCs and 365 Private ICTCs were functioning in Delhi. The performance of the Basic Services Division in regard HIV testing, HIV-TB cross-referrals and STI-ICTC cross referrals is depicted in Table 1.

1.7. HIV testing and positivity in Delhi since 2010 are depicted in Figure 1.

1.8. Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Component: This component aims to prevent new HIV infections by prevention, presumptive/ syndromic management of existing STI amongst the general and high risk patients through awareness generation, counseling for STI & HIV, VDRL/RPR testing of potential clients for early detection of Syphilis. Syndromic management of STI cases, supply medicine kits for syndromic management to DSRCs and TIs, suitable linkages to prevent further infections and counseling & testing of pregnant women for Syphilis. The medicines for treatment of sexually transmitted infections are procured by NACO and supplied to health facilities (DSRC and TIs) through DSACS. 28 DSRCs are functional in different hospitals in Delhi.

2. LABORATORY SERVICES DIVISION

2.1. Lab Services division at DSACS coordinates and monitor the following activities:

- HIV testing services
- External Quality Assurance Scheme(EQAS) in HIV testing
- CD4 testing services
- Viral load testing services
- NABL Accreditation of Reference Laboratories & STI laboratories (QA)
- NABL Certification of standalone ICTC/PPTCTC under M(EL)T program
- Conduction of Trainings and workshops

2.2. External Quality Assurance Scheme (EQAS): 89 standalone ICTCs, 1 Mobile ICTC and 3 FICTC centers are linked to four State Reference Laboratories in Microbiology departments of 4 Medical Colleges of Delhi viz. Lady Hardinge Medical College, Maulana Azad Medical College, Safdarjung Hospital and University College of Medical Sciences under External Quality Assurance Scheme (EQAS) program. Besides, 2 National Reference Laboratories functioning in Microbiology departments of National Centre for Disease Control and All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Delhi also participated in the program.

2.3. As part of External Quality Assurance Scheme, State Reference Laboratories send coded samples (panels) to the linked ICTC/PPTCTCs for testing twice in a year and these centers report the result to the SRL within seven days of receiving the coded samples, to check the level of concordance. NRLs also send coded samples (panels) to SRLs for testing twice in a year, and report the results to the NRL within seven days of receiving the coded samples, to check the level of concordance.

2.4. Since 2010, all SRLs have regularly conducted EQAS activities for their linked centers. All linked ICTC/PPTCT Centers have reported with more than 90% participation in

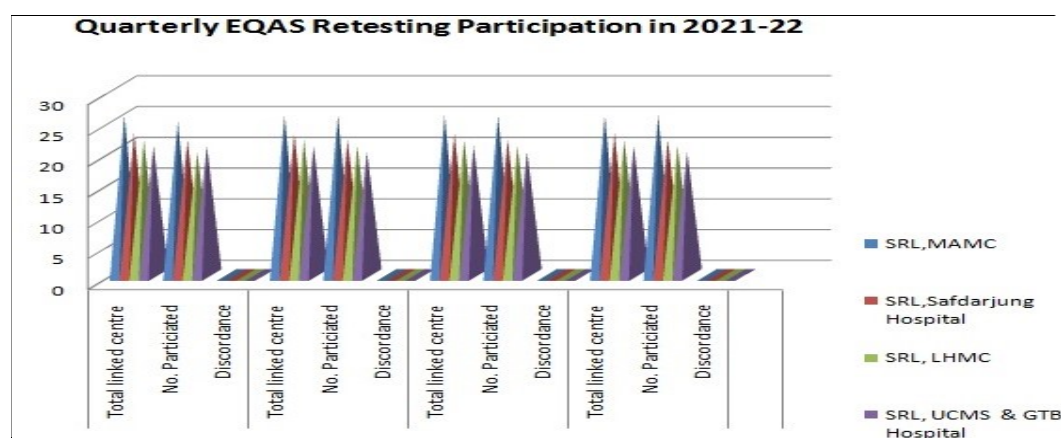
quarterly Re-testing and Bi-annual proficiency panel testing activities to assure quality in HIV testing. The participation of SRLs and NRLs of Delhi has been 100% to their linked NRLs and Apex Laboratory at NARI respectively under National EQAS program during 2021-22. Linked ICTC/PPTCT centres participate in EQAS with their linked SRLs to cross check HIV test results by sending 20% of Positive and 5% of Negative samples tested in the first seven days of the month.

2.5. The participation in the EQAS scheme during 2021-22 by the centers during Quarter1, Quarter2, Quarter3 and Quarter 4 was reported as 95.65%, 96.73%, 97.82% and 97.82% respectively by ICTC/PPTCTs and mobile ICTC in retesting activities with 100% concordance amongst total 92 centres participating in the activity.

2.6. At present CD4 testing is available at 8 centres (7 ART Centres viz. AIIMS, BSAH, DDUH, GTBH, MAMC-LNH, RMLH, SJH and at NCDC). During the year 34553 number of CD4 tests were carried out.

2.7. During the year, Viral Load Testing services were provided at the designated functional centres at IHBAS and AIIMS laboratories for all ART centres. A total of 15770 Viral Load tests of ART patients have been conducted till 31/3/22. Four standalone ICTC/PPTCT centres get the certification from NABL under M (EL)T program in 2021-22

3. TARGETED INTERVENTION (TI) DIVISION

3.1. Seventy Three (73) Targeted Intervention Projects were being implemented in Delhi in partnership with Non Government Organizations (NGOs) and Community Based Organizations (CBOs) amongst High Risk Group (HRGs) during 2021-22. These are peer led interventions wherein services like regular outreach, behavior change communication, STI treatment and management, free condom distribution counseling, provision of clean needle and syringes, abscess management, Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST) for IDUs and other services like HIV testing and ART through referral and linkages are provided at their doorstep.

3.2. Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST): Eight (8) Opioid Substitution Therapy centers were being run in Delhi during 2021-22 under the programme for mitigating habit of injectable drug use. Buprenorphine substitution is provided to eligible clients with active injectable Opioid use at these centres. One of the centres is being run in Central Prison, Tihar for its inmates. The performance of these centres is depicted in Table 8.

3.3. Spa Intervention : Keeping in view the changing pattern of sex work in Delhi, Spas in Delhi are being covered as a strategy through targeted interventions under FSW and MSM interventions. The Spa interventions were piloted during 2018-19 first time in India by Delhi. Brief performance of spa intervention in Delhi is as under:

A.FSW Spa Interventions:

- i. Total registration since inception (year 2018) -10689
- ii. Total Female HRG SPA based registered - 864
- iii. Total HRG found Positive - 28

B.MSM Spa Interventions

- i. SPA intervention started in the year- September 2018
- ii. Number of spas reached - 27 (exclusive only Male to male spas)
- iii. Active spas currently- 22
- iv. Total Number of male masseurs registered since inception - 768
- v. Total HRG found HIV Positive- 68.

3.4. Network Operator Approach

3.4.1. Changing patterns in sex work in Delhi has necessitated to adopt a approach to cover sex workers operating through networks for HIV prevention. Networks are being covered as a strategy through targeted interventions under FSW and MSM interventions since 2018-19.

3.4.2. 2747 Network Operators have been reached under FSW TI intervention program through Network based approach out of which 416 New Network Operators has been registered in the FY 21-22. On an average 2090 Network Operator were contacted by TI each month during FY 21-22.

3.4.3. As on 31st March 2022, total number of female sex workers associated with the network Operator was 38273 and on an average 1106 workers were joining with new network operator per month during the FY 21-22.

3.5. Virtual Intervention for HRG

3.5.1. Delhi State AIDS Control Society (DSACS) has designed and implemented a virtual intervention for FWS, MSM and TGs to address the challenge of sex work being carried virtually or sex workers being hidden or unwilling to get enrolled in Targeted Interventions. This intervention strategy intends to reach less visible and harder to reach high risk populations (FSW/MSM/TG) that are using the internet/mobile apps to ensure the prevention and control of HIV epidemic. This virtual intervention is an innovative web based communication strategy which aims to identify and link the virtual network based KPs with the service provisions. The performance of interventions is depicted in Table 9.

3.6. Programmatic Mapping and Population Size Estimation (PMPSE) status

3.6.1. Programmatic Mapping and Population Size Estimation (PMPSE) exercise for High Risk Group (HRG)/ Key Population (KP) have been rolled out in all the districts of the State as per National AIDS Control Organization (NACO) Guidelines in October 2021. The PMPSE activity includes identifying Hot Spots of Sex workers / TG by the team and conducting Group Discussion (GD) with Key Informants (KI) and stake holders for estimation GRGs/KPs.

3.6.2. Completion of Field level data collection for Hotspot, network operators and Village Information for all the districts (TI & Non-TI) is to be completed by June 2022 and Review of results by state steering committee & recommendation to NACO will be shared in July 2022.

3.7. Food security to Sex Workers

3.7.1. DSACS is working towards food security of Sex workers in co-ordination with Department of Food Supply and Delhi State Legal Service Authority in pursuance of the directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court. DSACS coordinates with TI NGOs in listing of sex workers and sharing the information with concerned departments after obtaining the consent of the beneficiaries. The status of activities in this regard is depicted in Table 10.

5.1 Food security application registration numbers of 80 beneficiaries (applied online) was shared with Food Supply Department for issuance of ration card. Another 717 applications for ration card have been submitted to Food Supply Department.

4. CARE, SUPPORT AND TREATMENT DIVISION

5.2 Care, Support & Treatment division at Delhi SACS is entrusted with the responsibility of providing Antiretroviral Treatment services to PLHIVs through 12 ART Centres, 1 Centre of Excellence and 1 Pediatric Center of Excellence. COE cater to the HIV patient from Delhi and linked ART Centres from Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Uttarakhand and conduct the SACEP for initiating them on second/third line ART Treatment. Two of the ART centres at AIIMS & RML are ART plus centre i.e. centre authorized to start second line treatment for their patients. 5 Care Support Centers are being run by NGOs under Vihaan project in various districts for providing support services to the PLHIVs.

5.3 ART Centers provide ART Treatment and support to all PLHIV registered. The facilities of laboratory tests, CD4 Count and Viral Load testing are also made available to the patient at

the centers. Currently nine CD4 Machines are installed in eight centers and two viral load machines are available at two centers in Delhi.

5.4 A total of 77461 PLHIVs have been cumulatively registered at ART Centers in Delhi since inception as on 31st March 2022 and 34330 PLHIVs were on regular antiretroviral treatment. The performance of the CST division/ART Centres is depicted in Table below.

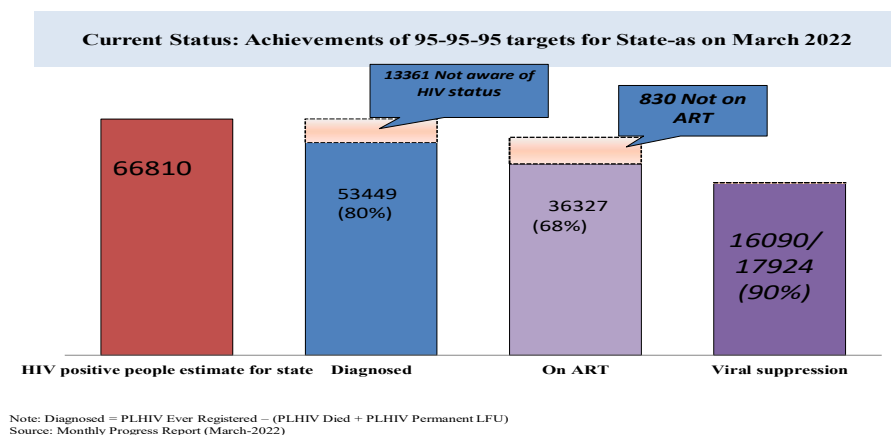

5.5 Status of 95-95-95 in Delhi

5.5.195-95-95 is a strategy to achieve Sustainable Development Goal of ending the AIDS epidemic by 2030. The95-95-95 strategy aims at 95% of all people living with HIV knowing their HIV status,with 95% of these people with diagnosed HIV infection on sustained antiretroviral therapy and 95% of these people receiving antiretroviral therapy having effective viral suppression.

5.6 HIV-TB Convergence at ART Centres

5.6.1 All patients coming to ART Centre are screened for symptoms of TB at every visit (4S Screening). Those suspected to have the infection are referred for testing to ChestClinic. Patient diagnosed with TB are started on Anti-tuberculosis Treatment (ATT) at the ART Centre concerned as per RNTCP guidelines. Status of HIV- TB coordination activities is depicted in Table 13.

5. BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES DIVISION

5.1. Seventy Five (75) blood banks were functioning in Delhi as on 31st March, 2022. Out of these, 20 blood banks of these are NACO supported Blood Banks(AIIMS(Main), AIIMS(CNC), AIIMS(JPNATC), BSAH, DDUH, DHAS, GBPH, GTBH, HRH, ILBS, IRCS, KH, LBSH, LHMC, LNH, RMLH, Rotary, SDNH, SGMH, SJH). NACO supported blood banks gets support in the form of provision of additional manpower, testing kits, blood collection bags and financial assistance for organization of voluntary blood donation camps. Out of the 20 supported blood banks, 9 are supported as RBTCs(at AIIMS(Main), AIIMS(CNC), BSAH, DDUH, GTBH, HRH, IRCS, LNH, LHMC), 2 as Model Blood Banks (DDUH and IRCS), 4 as District Level Blood

Banks (DHAS, LBSH, SGMH) and 2 as Major Blood Banks (KH and SDNH). All these 20 blood banks are having Blood Component Separation Units (BCSUs).

5.2. From April 2021 to March 2022, the total blood collection in Delhi of all blood banks has been 578676 units. Voluntary Blood Donation in NACO Supported Blood Banks & Voluntary Organization Blood Banks was 48% of the total collection (281310) and Blood Component Separation was 91% of total collection (Data being reconciled).

5.3. This component previously under NACP with grant received through NACO has been transferred to Directorate General Health Services (DGHS), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India with grant now routed through DGHS.

5.4. The blood requirement of Delhi during the period has been on lower side due to most hospitals functioning as Covid only hospitals and postponement of elective procedures and accordingly blood collection was also on the lower side.

6. INFORMATION EDUCATION COMMUNICATION & MAINSTREAMING DIVISION

6.1. IEC & Mainstreaming division at DSACS is entrusted with the responsibility to carry out various IEC activities and coordinating with government departments, private sector etc. for welfare of PLHIV and mainstreaming the HIV control activities. Various IEC activities carried during 2021-22 include :

- Participation in Dilli Development & Achievement Expo organized from 25th to 27th August 2021 at Pragati Maidan, Delhi. DSACS provided Counseling & Testing Facility, free distribution of Condom and IEC materials during the expo.
- Celebration of World AIDS Day 2021 at Dr. Ambedkar International Centre on 1st December 2021.
- One month theme based Outdoor campaign on HIV Testing & EMTCT organized from February to March 2022 with displaying of 150 hoardings, 120 bus wrap, 6 public utility advertisement at different location in Delhi.

- iv. 200 Folk shows organized from the month of February to March 2022 by folk troupes in all facilities /hospitals i.e. TI NGOs, ICTC/PPTCT Centres, STI Centres and ELM sites of Delhi.
- v. Participated in 'Delhi Government Achievements & Schemes Expo' organized from 25th to 27th February 2022 at Dilli Haat, Pitampura, Delhi provided Counseling & Testing Facility, free distribution of Condom and IEC materials during the expo.
- vi. Awareness programme at the construction site at Central Vista, New Parliament project on 8th March 2022.

6.2. Youth Intervention

6.2.1. Youth Intervention component deals with promoting awareness activities about HIV/AIDS for the prevention amongst youth and to inculcate good health practices in relation to HIV/AIDS and reproductive health. The Adolescent Education Programme (AEP) sub-component is implemented in secondary and senior secondary schools to build-up life skills of adolescents to cope with the physical and psychological changes associated with growing up. The Red Ribbon Clubs established in colleges/universities are encouraged to organize various awareness and promotional activities. Various activities carried out under this component include :

- i. Signing of MoU with Guru Govind Singh Indraprastha University for establishing 20 Red Ribbon Clubs for awareness on HIV/AIDS,
 - ii. New India@75 Campaign on awareness of HIV/AIDS, TB and blood donation
- Total 3347 students from 16 institutions/colleges and 12 schools participated in the first phase, participating in the campaign with events like Health Talk, Poster making, Debate, Webinars, Face & Nail art, mask making and drawing competition
 - Total 2013 students 11 institutions/colleges and 32 schools participated in the second phase with events like Health Talk, Poster making, Debate, Webinars, Face & Nail art, mask making and drawing competition,
 - Total 1424 students from 22 institutions/colleges and 3 schools participated in third phase organizing Health Talks, Poster making, Debate, Webinars, Face & Nail art, mask making and drawing competition .
 - New India@75 Campaign activities in the districts were coordinated by DAPCUs concerned.

6.3. Mainstreaming

6.3.1. Various Trainings/Sensitizations organized during the year include :

- i. Sensitization programme on HIV and related services for DTC drivers and conductors at DTC training centre Nand Nagri Depot with total 2014 DTC drivers and conductors sensitized ,
- ii. Sensitization programme for 200 Pvt. Doctors and Paramedical Staff on HIV, related services and issues at DMA premises Daryaganj, in collaboration of Delhi Medical Association (DMA),
- iii. Training programme for 80 Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) staff at DMRC Academic centre Shastri Park Depot Delhi,

6.3.2. **The HIV & AIDS prevention & Control Act 2017:** The draft for HIV Rules under the act for Delhi has been prepared, vetted by the Law department and submitted to department of H&FW for obtaining opinion of Hon'ble LG for the Notification of Rules in the Delhi Gazette . The rules provide for designating /appointment of Ombudsman in Delhi. Circular was issued by the Secy. H&FW, GNCTD to all Delhi Government Hospitals and Departments to ensure implementation of all the relevant provisions laid under the Act and designate a Complaint Officer for grievance redressal of the Protect Persons under the Act. Till

6.3.3. **Delhi Government Financial Assistance Schemes for PLHIV**

i. **‘Financial Assistance Scheme for people living with HIV/AIDS & Children/Orphan/Destitute Children infected/affected by HIV/AIDS:** People Living with HIV/AIDS require lifelong antiretroviral treatment to prevent severe life threatening opportunistic infections also requiring extra nutrition in addition to cope up with their compromised immune system. Their suffering from stigma and discrimination by family, society and community at large, is compounded by the fact that many of PLHAs are poor, unable to even meet the cost of transportation to ART centre for antiretroviral treatment. Similarly there are Double Orphan Children infected or/affected by HIV/AIDS in Delhi, whose parents have died (at least one parent died due to HIV/AIDS) and these children eventually are either living with their grandparents or extended families or are in institutional care. They are often malnourished, suffer from stigma and discrimination and cannot afford proper education including cost of buying education related material and transportation to school, affecting their long term survival in the community. Keeping in view the above facts the scheme was approved vide Cabinet Decision No. 1838 dated 7-12-11. The scheme became operational w.e f. 01-04-2012 as a Plan Scheme of Department of Health & FW of Delhi. Till date total 5525 beneficiaries are enrolled with the scheme with following the eligibility criteria and approved financial assistance package is depicted in Table 14. The scheme is funded by Govt. of NCT of Delhi. A total amount of Rs. 11,50,94,013/- was disbursed to eligible beneficiaries during the F.Y.2021-22.

ii. **Travel Concession Scheme:** Most of the persons infected with HIV belong to the low socio-economic and disadvantaged groups of the society and find it difficult to meet the cost of

transportation for visiting the ART centre regularly for Anti-Retroviral treatment and for increased nutritional needs. The Scheme of Travel concession to the eligible PLHIVs/CLHIVs patients attending the ART centres in Delhi for undertaking visits to the ART centres thus has been approved by the Delhi Government Vide Cabinet Decision No. 2782 dated 6/12 2019. Eligibility criteria for enrolment for the scheme of Travel Concession to PLHIV on ART are Person infected with HIV should be on treatment from authorized ART Centre in Delhi under National AIDS Control programme and resident of Delhi at least for last three years. Quantum of Concession under the scheme is Rs. 120/- per visit to the beneficiary with number of visits limited to a maximum of 12 visits in a calendar year and not more than 2 in a calendar month. Funds from Delhi Government are made available through the Department of H&FW with payment on account of travel concession on quarterly basis based on number of visits and criteria laid down, through Aadhaar based after verifying their visits through ART centres. Total no. 120 applications were received up to March 2022, have been found eligible by the Scrutiny Committee and recommended for enrollment under Travel Concession Scheme.

CHAPTER 13

DRUGS CONTROL DEPARTMENT

In order to make the system more convenient / user friendly to public, with lesser interaction of public with the officials and to have greater transparency, the Drugs Control Department, Govt. of NCT Delhi has adopted the new online system i.e. **National Drugs Licensing System (NDLS)** developed by CDAC, Govt. of India in coordination with the Central Drugs Standard Control Organization, Government of India for making services online related to grant / renewal of sales / manufacturing licences for drugs / cosmetics and approval of testing laboratory.

The Department has taken step to strengthen and modernize the Drug Testing Laboratory located at Lawrence Road, Delhi to conform the international standards and NABL accreditation. The project is being undertaken by PWD for renovation of the building.

The Drugs Control Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi has adopted zero tolerance towards pharmaceutical drug abuse and taking stringent action against defaulters. The Department had already cancelled licenses of Medical Stores, who were found indulging in unethical stocking / selling habit forming drugs. The Department is regularly keeping a watch on the quality of drugs & cosmetics moving in the market by way of regularly collecting samples of medicines from various manufacturers and sales outlets of drugs and cosmetics. From 1st April 2021 to 31th March, 2022, the department had collected 716 samples of drugs/cosmetics. Out of which, 11 samples were declared as not of standard quality by Govt. Analyst. Moreover, the Department filed prosecutions in 10 cases during the period of 1st April 2021 to 31th March, 2022 where the nature of contraventions was serious.

The Department is also keeping a watch on the activities of various wholesale/retail outlets by regularly conducting surprise checks. During the period of 1st April 2021 to 31th March, 2022 the Department has observed contraventions in 437 cases out of 1068 firms for which action has been initiated against erring firms by way of suspension of their licenses.

That on 19.04.2021, the Drugs Control Department has also started a Helpline at Karkardooma office / Zonal Office Lawrence Road for convenience of the public for getting the Remdesivir Injection through various stockiest/distributors.

During COVID-19 pandemic, the department has monitored the supply of Remdesivir injections to Hospitals and nursing homes on daily basis. Seven teams have been constituted to monitor all 30 wholesalers and retailers of Remdesivir injections to stop Black marketing and hoarding. Simultaneously it is also ensured that almost all the quantity of Remdesivir injection received in stock is distributed among hospitals, nursing homes, and needy patients.

The officers of Drugs Control Department in association with officials of all respective District Magistrates kept a watch on supply and distribution of Remdesivir injections made to hospitals and also monitoring the supply of life-saving drugs used in the management of COVID-19 treatment and to prevent their black marketing and hoarding.

For more effective enforcement, 15 additional posts of Drugs Inspectors (DI) and 03 Assistant Drugs Controller (ADC) have been created. Recently, five (05) Drugs Inspectors have been promoted into the post of Assistant Drugs Controller.

The Department has also processed for filling of twenty six (26) additional posts of Drugs Inspectors from UPSC, New Delhi.

Six (06) posts of Senior Scientific Assistant (SSA) and one (01) of Junior Scientific Officer (JSO) have been created on regular basis for strengthening of Govt. Drug Testing Laboratory located at Lawrence Road, Delhi.

CHAPTER 14

DEPARTMENT OF FOOD SAFETY

The Department of Food Safety, Govt. of NCT of Delhi has the mandate to implement the Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006, Rules & Regulations, made their under in the NCT of Delhi to ensure the availability of Safe and Whole Some Food. The important issues concerning to the Department of Food Safety is as follows:-

Major Achievements during the year 2021-22.

- The Department of Food Safety has issued **12289** online **FSSAI licenses** and **28323 Registrations** to Food Business Operators from 01/04/2021 to 31/03/2022 which is mandatory requirement to carry out or commence Food Businesses under provision of FSS Act, 2006 Rules and Regulations made their under.
- Further, during this FY the Department of Food Safety has under the compliance of “minimizing Regulatory Compliance Burden” issued office order and through FSSAI owned FoSCoS (Food Safety and Compliance System) portal, which is completely web based PAN India Software. Earlier **License and Registration were issued within 60 days and 07 days from the date of filing application respectively but now under reducing the complianceburden the issuance time of License and Registration has been decreased from 60 to 30 days and for registration, it has been decreased from 07 to 04 days.** This will enable the applicant to get License/Registration within much lesser time and also encourage the Food Business Operators towards these services.
- Furthermore, the Department of Food Safety has **randomized inspection examination and auditing** of Food Business premises and also made register and records **online**.
- During the said F.Y. 2021-2022, Department has lifted 1961**formal samples** of various types of Food articles for its analysis and also drawn 3463 **surveillance samples** for the purpose of analysis and surveillance, survey and research under provision of FSS Act, 2006 Rules and Regulations made their under.
- Department of Food Safety has created awareness among consumer and Food Business Operators to follow the COVID appropriate behavior Through **Food Safety on Wheel (FSW)** in the markets across NCT of Delhi by **distributing pamphlets** and on the **spot testing demonstration about adulterants** in various food articles and conducting all three activities of FSW (Testing, Training and Awareness).
- In this current financial year, out of the 11 districts of FSD department **05 districts i.e. East, West, South, New Delhi and Central out of 11 districts of Food Safety Department** had participated in a PAN India **Eat Right Challenge initiative of FSSAI**.
- Till date **Eat Right Campuses, BHOG, Clean and Fresh Fruits and Vegetable Markets and Clean Street Food Hub** certified are as illustrated below.

As 51 Eat Right Campuses have been certified by FSSAI in Delhi in the FY 2021-2022 which is given in tabular form as follows:

Department of Food Safety has already implemented various **FSSAI initiatives/ programmes** as described above, and elaborated as below; i.e. **Clean Street Food Hub, Clean and Fresh Fruits and Vegetable Markets, Eat Right Campuses @ Schools, @Institution, @Govt. Offices, @Hospitals, @Jails, @Canteen Club, @ Police Station, @ Kitchen Canteen of running under Department of WCD. Temples and Gurudwara (Holy Places) under FSSAI BHOG initiative, implementation of RUCO, Save Food or Hygiene Rating, Clean and Fresh Meat, Serve Safe initiative, Food Fortification and FoSTaC.**

All above mentioned initiatives are undertaken by the Department of Food Safety to improve the quality of delivery of services in respect of safe and wholesome food to the consumer/public in the NCT of Delhi.
