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## Chapter 1

#### INTRODUCTION

Delhi is an old city that has slowly expanded over the years to acquire its present status of metropolis. According to census 2011, the total population of Delhi was 167.53 lakh spread over an area of 1483 Sq. km. The population density of Delhi was 11297 persons per Sq. Km. in 2011, which is the highest in India amongst all states/Union Teritories. People come from all over India for livelihood and settle in Delhi being the economic hub for development.

In Delhi, health care facilities are being provided by both government & non-government organizations. Besides, local self governance agencies such as Municipal Corporations of Delhi, New Delhi Municipal Council and Delhi Cantonment Board are instrumental in delivery of health care facilities in their respective areas. Various agencies of Government of India such as Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, CGHS, ESI, Railways are also providing health care to general public as well as to identified beneficiaries. Amongst the government organizations, Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) of Government of NCT of Delhi is the major agency related to health care delivery. This Directorate actively participates in delivery of health care facilities and co-ordinates with other Govt. & Non-Government Organizations for health related activities for the improvement of health of citizens of Delhi. Services under Directorate of Health Services cover medical & public health. This Directorate plays the key role in co-ordination and implementation of various national and state health programs.





#### **DIRECTORATE GENERAL OF HEALTH SERVICES**

The Directorate General of Health Services is one of the largest department under Department of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of NCT of Delhi providing health care facilities at primary and secondary level to the citizens of Delhi through various types of health outlets, spread all over Delhi viz., Dispensaries & Health Centers, School Health Clinics and Mobile Health Clinics, Aam Aadmi Mohalla Clinics and Polyclinics.

To cope up with the situation regarding need to health outlets, many more health outlets are being added to existing ones from time to time to meet the health needs subject to the availability of resources.

This Directorate also monitors the health services being provided by Registered Private Nursing Homes. The registration is done subject to the fulfillment of prerequisite of Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act 1953 and renewed after every three years. The registration of all private nursing homes is mandatory under the Act.

As far as the monitoring of various health schemes being run by DGHS, the regular information/data is being obtained from various health outlets under the direct control of DGHS, which are then compiled and analysed. On the basis of data and its analysis Dispensaries/Health Centers / Hospitals, the evaluation of various schemes is carried out and necessary corrective measures if needed are taken. In addition to above this Directorate is also collecting information regularly from other agencies on communicable diseases, non-communicable diseases and other public health data for taking appropriate measures related to prevention and control of notified diseases.

## Chapter 3

#### **DELHI GOVERNMENT DISPENSARIES**

#### INTRODUCTION

Primary health care is most important component of health care services for the citizens. This view has been equally echoed by Bhore Committee Report (1948) and accordingly this aspect has been given due consideration in National Health Policy. Directorate General of Health Services, Government of NCT of Delhi is providing primary health care services to the people of Delhi through a network of Dispensaries, Polyclinics, Mohalla Clinics, School Health Clinics and Mobile Health Clinics throughout Delhi to meet the primary health care needs of citizens of Delhi.

Dispensaries (Health Centres) under DGHS are its front-line health outlets that provide treatment for common ailments including provision of essential medicines to all the persons coming to these dispensaries and also undertake various preventive and promotive activities. The vision of this Directorate is to promote these front-line health outlets as the backbone of health services and overall health development and to actively involve these outlets in bottom up planning.

#### **Functioning of Dispensaries**

Planning Branch of this Directorate is responsible for planning and opening of new dispensaries, matter related to identification of area, allotment of land, planning and construction of building etc. and financial aspect are being taken care of by this branch. The operation of dispensaries in the Directorate General of Health Services is based upon district pattern. There are 11 districts functioning under the administrative control of Chief District Medical Officers. Geographically these districts correspond with the revenue districts.

#### **Facilities at Dispensaries**

#### The facilities provided by these dispensaries are:

- General OPD for treatment of common ailments.
- Free distribution of prescribed essential medicines.
- > Treatment of minor injuries and dressing etc.
- **>** Basic emergency care during working hours.
- Laboratory Services (Routine Lab. Services)
- Immunization and Family Welfare activities.
- > Health Education.
- Malaria Clinic (in selected dispensaries only).
- DOTS Center/Microscopy Center (in selected dispensaries only).

# Chapter 4

### MOBILE HEALTH SCHEME

Mobile Health Scheme is an independent plan scheme "Special component plan for scheduled Castes." Rapid urbanization and construction boom has brought about migration of rural population to urban settings in search of food and job. Prevailing high disparity between rich and poor has forced this migrant population to settle in the small groups in unauthorized colonies called J.J. Clusters. Poverty, sub-human conditions, poor quality of life and lack of medical facilities has resulted in higher incidence of diseases in the population. More than 2 million migrant was found to be in Delhi itself with around 35% living in the J.J. Clusters and unauthorized colonies.

### PRIORITY AREAS:

Civic bodies are not able to provide required civic amenities as they are all settled in the area labelled as unauthorized. Among the many initiatives of the Government of Delhi to benefit the population residing in the fringe of society, Mobile Health Scheme was one of them as the Govt took a serious note of poor health status of residents of J.J. Clusters and decided to strengthen the Mobile Health Scheme to provide basic health care to the residents at their door-step according to their felt needs. This was to start with a fleet of 20 mobile dispensaries which was launched covering different J.J. Clusters all over Delhi on weekly basis in 1989, which was strengthened gradually with time and providing health care to the J.J. Clusters / unserved areas / construction sites, welfare homes etc.

### **OBJECTIVES AND SERVICES**

The present status of Mobile Health Scheme is as follows and the functioning of Mobile Health Scheme is as under:

- 1. To provide basic health care to people living in J.J. Clusters / underserved areas / constructions sites, night shelters etc. at their doorstep regularly but as per schedule all areas covered at least twice a week.
- 2. To provide health education.
- 3. To take active participation in National Health Programs like Pulse Polio, Measles and other immunization, Dengue control, Family welfare etc.
- 4. To provide medical coverage in important institute and at activities and special events.
  - a. Haz Manjil pilgrims (for three months at different locations round the clock).
  - b. Urs Mela for pilgrims (For 20 days at Burari ground round the clock)
  - c. Kanwar Camps (for 15 days at more than 100 camps spread all over Delhi round the clock)
  - d. Bhartiyam
  - e. Sant Nirankari Sammagam (10 camps round the clock for 5 days)
  - f. Chhat Puja (More than 100 camps round the clock)
  - g. Bangladeshi Prisoners (As per Court instructions on regular basis)
  - h. Juvenile Home, Majnu ka tilla
  - i. Tahirpur Leprosy Complex (On regular basis)
  - j. Lampur Beggar Home and FRRO (As per Court instructions on regular basis)
  - k. Tilak Nagar, Peeragarhi, Shalimar Bagh, RK Puram, Lajpat Nagar, Shadipur Depot Leprosy colonies
  - 1. Children Home, Ali Pur etc. (Regular Basis) and Arya Anathalaya Daryaganj
  - m. Destitute Home Motia Khan, Old age homes and Senior Citizen homes and welfare clubs
  - n. Matratva Chhaya at Jahangir Puri and Sarai Rohilla (On regular basis)
  - o. Independence Day Celebrations (National and State level) Republic Day Celebrations(National and State level)
  - p. Night Shelter (As per court order more than 200 camps on regular basis)
  - q. Constructions Sites (All over Delhi on regular basis)

- r. IITF Pragati Maidan (15 days), Perfect Health Mela at Delhi Haat.
- s. Global Conference on Mysticism (15 days at Burari Ground)
- t. Other activities such as Public political gatherings, Senior Citizen Screening, disasters management, various melas,
- u. Request from public representative, time to time for providing medical facilities etc
- v. To organise special health camps at underserved areas and JJ colonies and focus groups like workers and laborers.

#### MODUS OPERANDI:

- 1. For the above-mentioned activities, staff, logistics, supply of medicines and equipment for all camps are provided through Mobile Dispensaries Vans.
- 2. Activities of Mobile Health Dispensaries are not stationary but mobile in nature i.e these areas are covered by one Mobile Dispensary two times a week and there are diversions of Mobile Dispensaries to cover the aforesaid activities due to its wider approach and flexibility in terms of spatial area and population. Hence the concept of Mobile Health Scheme is totally different in nature from the concept of Mohalla Clinics.
- 3. Mobile Van Dispensaries for providing basic healthcare facilities to Underserved / JJ clusters where there are no permanent health facilities available nearby.

These Mobile Van Dispensaries as their name suggests are mobile units that cater to the population and which are equipped with staff, medicines, other logistics and move from their respective control room to their working stations or designated places on daily basis. On reaching the J J clusters, the Mobile van parks itself at pre-determined regular spot and renders health care services as per timings and moves to next designated place for functioning. After completion of scheduled work, the mobile teams return to the control room.

The medical facilities include examination of patient and dispensing of medicines to patients and record keeping thereof are being managed by staff in and around the vehicle itself as there is no proper place in JJ clusters, etc. for staff other than vehicle.

Vehicles are also used as Mobile Van Dispensaries to provide health care facilities in night shelters also. Each vehicle assigned for night shelters covers minimum eight to ten night shelters daily.

# Annual OPD 2019-20, New - 108003, Old- 83346

- 1. MHS every year provides medical coverage to all important events organised in the city as per need or as deemed necessary as mentioned above like Kanwar, Haj, Urs Mela etc.
- 2. MHS zones are divided into five main zones and each zone has a QRT or Quick Response Team for emergency and disaster management.
- 3. Conducting health awareness and diagnostic camps in their designated areas, construction areas and welfare homes regularly.
- 4. Contributing towards the various Govt. Health programmes as and when necessary for a common goal of disease control and eradication.
- 5. Creating awareness in its own individual way for various health related international days in its targeted population.
- 6. MHS Staff Training programmes, Refresher programmes and Discussions

### **ACTIVITIES STARTED**

MHS has already provided coverage in URS Mela, Republic Day celebrations, NCC Camp training programme, Ambedkar Jayanti and others.

# IMPLEMENTATION STRUCTURE AT STATE AND DISTRICT LEVEL

Mobile Health Scheme is headed by the Addl. Director MHS which is headquartered at Dwarka. The functioning of MHS has been divided into 5 main zones of Delhi–North, West, South, East and Central. Though there is no clear cut demarcation of areas in district level but for convenience sake, areas from North and North West District are covered by North Zone, from East, North East and Shahdara are covered by East Zone, areas of South, South East are covered by South Zone, areas of Central, New Delhi District areas are covered by Central Zone, South-West and West District areas are covered by the West District. However that is not a strict norm and flexible as per need.

Each zone has a zonal incharge to administer the daily affairs of a particular zone who also has the additional duties of covering his or her assigned areas. Each team is led by a medical officer under whom the following staffs works – PHN/ANM, Pharmacist, Dresser and a N.O.

MHS has a sanction of 35 posts in each category. The team provides the services as stated above.

### REPORTING SYSTEM

Every month a monthly morbidity report is compiled and sent for further submission to the MHS Headquarter. The reporting is done in a modified version of ICD-10 reporting and is further submitted to SHIB.

Immunization and other reports as prescribed by the State Health Department are regularly sent to the DHS. Reports are usually sent monthly, quarterly and annual mode.

At present vehicles are not available with MHS and the dedicated teams are carrying out their assigned duties on their own.

### POTENTIAL:

Mobile Health Scheme is a unique and novel initiative and in a modern system where mobility and flexibility is the order of the day, this scheme can be developed to its full potential for the maximum benefits of its targeted population. In fact it can achieve phenomenal results by not only performing in its targeted population, but also in population beyond its perceived scope.

Its mobility is the biggest plus point as it will have a broader outreach and can cater to a far greater population than a fixed dispensary.

Since it is a mobile dispensary, providing treatment and care for general complaints, it can be incorporated for the promotion and awareness of any government health scheme.

It also can procure data for analysis from a population which is dynamic in nature and is variable, that which is missed during fixed surveys.

These are just a few of the many fold ways a mobile van dispensary can function in the health care system.

**School Health Scheme:-** The School Health Scheme in Delhi was launched in the year 1979, initially in six schools targeted to improve the health and nutrition status of children and to provide them with useful education on hygiene. The specific Services offered through these clinics relate to the promotion of positive health, prevention of diseases, early detection, diagnosis, treatment of disease and referral services to higher health centers for the individuals who required further treatment and management. At present 54 teams are functioning and catering to approx 16 lakhs School Children of Delhi Govt. and aided schools. However, about 3.5 lakh students of 300-350 schools are covered annually. There are 2 special referral centers with sanctioned posts of ENT Specialist. Eye Specialist, Refractionist, Dental Surgeon & Dental hygienist. Children from nearby schools are referred to the SRCs for availing their services Major achievements of SHS during the year 2019-20 are stated as under-

Department of Health & Family Welfare has also taken several novel initiatives for Prevention, Early Identification, and Counseling & Treatment of children / adolescents suffering from various types of Drug/Substance Abuse. 60 beds has been earmarked exclusively for in-patient management of juveniles with Drug/Substance Abuse in seven Delhi Government hospitals & health institution namely, Deep Chand Bandhu Hospital, Dr. Baba Sahib Ambedkar Hospital, Deen Dayal Upadhaya Hospital, Pt. Madan Mohan Malviya Hospital, G.B Pant Hospital, Lal Bahadur Shastri Hospital & Institute of Human Behaviors & Allied Sciences. Dedicated OPD services for juveniles with drug/ substance abuse on at least once a week basis has also been started in these hospitals. In view of inhalant abuse observed in > 40% children/ adolescents amongst those admitted in the last one year, Deptt has issued a Gazette Notification on 31st July 2018 to limit the access of inhalants to vulnerable children / adolescents.

Weekly Iron Folic Acid Supplementation Programme (WIFS) & Mass De-worming programme – Anemia is a serious health problem not only among pregnant woman but also among infants, young children and adolescents. So, in order to reduce the incidence of anemia, WIFS was launched in Delhi in July 2013. The programme is implemented in all Schools of Delhi. & Govt. Aided, NDMC & Delhi Cantonment Board for students from 6th to 12th class and out of School Adolescent girls between 10 to 19 years through Anganwadi centres. coverage- 1228 schools are covered every month with coverage of 56%.

Mass De-Worming Programme was organized on 10 Feb 2020 with Mop up day on 14Feb 2020 & 17 Feb 2020 across Delhi in all Govt. / Govt Aided/Cantonment/Central/Private Schools, having covered around 27.34 Lakh Children with coverage of 88.8%.

### 6.2 HOSPITAL CELL

The planning/establishment of different hospitals are being taken care of by Hospital Cell functioning, in this Directorate under direct supervision of Director General Health services. The responsibilities of Hospital Cell include planning and commissioning of hospital which include preparation of MPF (Medical Function Program), site inspection, monitoring and co-ordination with different Govt. /Semi-Govt. /Autonomous/Pvt. Agencies etc. related to establishment of hospitals. The financial aspects of these upcoming hospitals are also being taken care of by Hospital Cell, like preparation of SFC/EFC memo for cost estimates of hospitals which include estimates of manpower, equipments and other vital components required for establishment of hospital.

The broad functioning of Hospital Cell involves in close coordination with executing agencies and undertakes site inspection etc. along with the engineers. The selected agencies then appoint architects and hospital consultant for preparation of building plans etc. The Director General, Health Services approves the preliminary drawings once the detail drawings are prepared by the consultants which are then submitted for approval of DDA/MCD. Once all approvals are in place, the estimated cost is worked out and proposal submitted to Expenditure Finance Committee (EFC) for approval of the project. The Hospital Cell prepares the EFC Memorandum & Cabinet Note including cost estimates. Estimates of manpower, equipments etc. In addition to above, the Hospital Cell has been coordinating with secondary care hospitals of Delhi Govt. for various hospitals related works.

### Other responsibilities under hospital cell:-

- · Plantation Issues in Hospitals
- Club Foot Management Programme

### Status of Various Hospital Projects Under Hospital Cell (DGHS)

### 1. 600 bedded Hospital at Ambedkar Nagar Delhi.(North):

Proposal for establishment of Ambedkar Nagar Hospital and up gradation from 200 beds to 600 beds at a total cost of RS. 180.95 crores including previously sanctioned Rs. 125.90 Crores approved vide Cabinet Decision No.2055 dated 29/07/13 and an additional cost of Rs. 55.05 crores for addition of 400 beds making total bed strength to 600 has been approved by the Council of Ministers vide Cabinet Decision No. 2434 dt. 22/10/2016. This cabinet decision has also been concurred by Hon'ble LG of Delhi. Approximately 98 % of work has been completed.

# 2. 768 bedded Hospital at Burari, Delhi (North):

Earlier Plan was construction of 200 bedded Hospital. Hon'ble Health Minister decided to increase bed strength from 200 to 768 beds. The revised PE for establishment and up gradation of Burari Hospital has been approved by EFC on 06.03.2018 and the same has been approved by Cabinet. Approximately 92% of work has been completed.

### 3. Hospital Project & Medical College at Sector-9 & Sector-17, Dwarka:

The said project has been revised and proposed bed strength has been increased from 700 bedded hospital to 1725 bedded hospital in two phases with addition to MCH block & Medical College with intake of 150 students. The revised PE Rs. 862.25 Cr. has been submitted by PWD which is under submission to competent authority. The 87 % of construction work in respect of phase-I (1241 bedded hospital) has been completed.

# 4. 200 beds hospital and trauma centre at Siraspur, Delhi:

The Panchayat Department allotted 19.97 acres of Land (main plot in Pocket A 14.17 and Pocket B 5.8 acre) for construction of 200 bedded hospital to DHS. Recently, the proposal has been revised & upgraded by the Hon'ble Health Minister to 2716 bed Hospital building (Block A 1164 beds+ Block B 1552 beds). In Phase (1) - 1164 bedded hospital is being constructed which will have facilities of MCH including Trauma & Emergency and General. PWD has appointed Ms Design Associates Inc. for Consultancy Services for Comprehensive Planning and Designing. The Preliminary estimate amounting to Rs. 487.54 Crore has been approved by EFC on 10/12/2019 for construction of 1164 bedded new hospital work at Siraspur. The tender invited on EPC mode. The work is to be awarded. The EIA has been received.

### 5. 200 beds hospital at Madipur:

The bed strength of said hospital project has been upgraded to 600 bedded hospital by the Hon'ble Health Minister, GNCTD. P.E. for appointment of Consultant for Comprehensive Planning, Designing & Development has been approved by competent authority and conveyed to PWD on 08/03/2018. Consultancy work was awarded to M/s Arcop Associated Pvt. Ltd on 08.11.2018. The Preliminary estimate for construction of hospital project at Madipur has been approved by EFC on 18/11/2019. Now, Detailed Estimate and NIT are being prepared by PWD.

### 6. 200 beds hospital at Jwalapuri (Nangloi)

The bed strength of said hospital project has been upgraded to 600 bedded hospital by the Hon'ble Health Minister, GNCTD. P.E. for appointment of Consultant for Comprehensive Planning, Designing & Development has been approved by competent authority and conveyed to PWD on 08/03/2018. Consultancy work was awarded to M/s Arcop Associated Pvt. Ltd on 08.11.2018. The Preliminary estimate for construction of hospital project at Jwalapuri has been approved by EFC on 18/11/2019. Now, Detailed Estimate and NIT is being prepared by PWD.

### 7. 100 beds hospital at Sarita Vihar, Delhi:

The bed strength of said hospital project has been upgraded to 300 bedded hospital by the Hon'ble Health Minister, GNCTD. P.E. for appointment of Consultant for Comprehensive Planning, Designing & Development has been approved by competent authority and conveyed to PWD on 08/03/2018. Consultancy work was awarded to M/s Arcop Associated Pvt. Ltd on 08.11.2018. Drawings/Designs and plans have been approved. The Preliminary estimate for construction of hospital project at Sarita Vihar is under process.

### 8. 200 beds hospital at Hastsal, Vikas puri, Delhi:

The bed strength of said hospital project has been upgraded to 500 bedded hospital by the Hon'ble Health Minister, GNCTD. P.E. for appointment of Consultant for ComprehensivePlanning, Designing & Development has been approved by competent authority and conveyed to PWD on 08/03/2018. Consultancy work was awarded to M/s Arcop Associated Pvt. Ltd on 08.11.2018. Drawings/Designs and plans have been approved. The Preliminary estimate has been approved by EFC on 18/11/2019 for construction of hospital. Now, Detailed Estimate and NIT is being prepared by PWD.

# 9. 100 bedded hospital project at Bindapur:

Earlier, a Preliminary estimate amounting to Rs. 51,07,000/- was sanctioned to PWD for providing Comprehensive Consultancy services for designing and Development of Bindapur hospital for built-up area of

5500 Sqm. Further, it was observed by the PWD (West) that the built up area of the project may be increased upto 10,000 Sqm and accordingly the tenders were invited by the PWD (West) for consultancy work of built up area of 10,000 Sqm. Hence revised PE amounting to Rs. 73,75,000/-for engagement of consultant for Comprehensive Consultancy services for designing and Development for construction of New Hospital (110 Beds) at Bindapur, for built-up area of 10000 Sqm is under process.

# Following Hospital projects are under planning stage.

- 10. 225 beds hospital at Chattarpur, Mehrauli, Delhi.
- 11. 100 beds Hospital project at Deendarpur, Delhi
- 12. 200 beds hospital at Keshavpuram, Lawrance Road, Delhi.
- 13. Office complex at Raghubir Nagar.
- 14. Construction of hospital at Sangam Vihar, Delhi
- 15. Construction of hospital at Baprolla.

### **6.3 NURSING HOME CELL**

Nursing Home Cell was established in DHS with a view to register the private nursing homes and hospitals under the provisions laid down under Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act, 1953 and Rules thereunder. The main activities of the cell are to receive applications from nursing home owners for new registration and for renewal of registration every third year, carrying out regular inspections in order to ensure maintenance of requisite standards in these nursing homes, & various other task as assigned. The responsibilities assigned to the cell include:-

- 1. Registration & Renewal of nursing homes under Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act.
- 2. Various Court Case matters pertaining to Pvt. Nursing Homes.
- 3. Complaints, RTI,s, PGMS matters w.r.t. private nursing homes in Delhi.

Registration of Nursing Home as per Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act, 1953, amendment 2003 & the Rules made there under 1966, 1992 and 2011. The registration of individuals/institutions carrying out nursing home activities in modern Scientific system of Medicine in NCT of Delhi is mandatory. Besides this, Directorate monitors the quality of health services as prescribed under the said act. The registration is done subject to the fulfillment of prerequisites of Delhi Nursing Home Registration Act & Rules and renewed on every third year.

The registration form alongwith checklist of requisite documents & copy of Act & Rules is available on the website www.health.delhi.gov.nic.in Any complaint/grievance in regard of nursing home by general public may also be sent to the Director General Health Services/ Nursing Home Cell.

### **6.4 ECONOMICALLY WEAKER SECTION (EWS)**

EWS branch deals with the patients who belong to Economically Weaker Section (EWS) of the Society. This branch works in accordance with the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi order dated 22.03.2007 in WP (C) 2866/2002 in the matter of Social Jurist Vs GNCTD & Ors. This Branch refers the patients of EWS category to Identified Private Hospitals (IPH) for the free treatment. Free treatment in all aspects is provided by all Identified Private Hospitals (IPH) of Delhi who were given land on concessional rates by the land owning

agencies of Delhi. Every IPH has obligation to provide free treatment on 25% of total OPD and 10% of total IPD to the eligible patients of EWS category.

The number of EWS patients treated in IPHs during April 2019 - March 2020 is as follows:

OPD : 13,16,217 IPD : 73,680

Total number of EWS patients referred to IPHs from this branch during this duration is 10,521

Total No. of EWS patients referred to IPHs from Delhi Govt. Hospitals is 10,556.

At present, there are 60 identified private hospitals after the inclusion of Sant Parmanand Prakartic Chikitsalaya this year. Out of these identified private hospitals, four hospitals are under renovation namely R B Seth Jessa Ram Hospital, Bimla Devi Hospital, Sunder Lal Jain hospital and Deepak Memorial Hospital.

RTI is being replied within specified time. Answer to Lok Sabha / Rajya Sabha questions are sent within the time period. PGMS complaints, LG Listening portal, CPGRAMS, written complaints and complaints received online via mail on freepatientcell.dhs@gmail.com against any of the IPH are being dealt regularly and action is taken as deemed fit. There are some court cases being defended in High Court of Delhi and Supreme court of India, we sensitize and summarize the case history to the Government Counsel and attend the court hearing.

### **6.5 DELHI AROGYA KOSH**

# (A) Financial assistance to eligible patient undergoing treatment in Government Hospitals of Delhi:

"Delhi Arogya Kosh" (DAK) is a registered society that provides financial assistance to the extent of Rs. 5 lakh to the needy eligible patients for treatment of any illness/treatment/ intervention required by the patient undergoing treatment in a Government Hospital run by Delhi Government or Central Government or Autonomous Hospital under State Government.

### Eligibility:

- 1. Patient having National Food Security Card <u>OR</u> Income certificate of upto 3 Lakhs per annum issued by the Revenue Deptt. GNCTD
- 2. Patient should be a bonafide resident of Delhi for last 3yrs (prior to the date of submission of application)
- 3. Patient requiring treatment for any illness/ treatment/ intervention in a Government Hospital run by Delhi Govt./Central Govt./AIIMS / Autonomous Institutes of the State Govt.

# Requisite documents for verification of income:

- National Food Security Card <u>OR</u>
- 2. Income certificate of up to 3 Lakhs per annum issued by Revenue Deptt., GNCTD

### Requisite document for verification of DOMICILE for last 03 years (any one of the following):

- 1. Domicile Certificate issued from area SDM.
- 2. Ration card
- 3. Aadhar Card
- 4. EPIC (Voter ID)
- 5. Driving License
- 6. Passport
- 7. Extract from the Electoral Roll

#### Note:

In such cases where the patient is a minor, Birth Certificate of the patient and the domicile proof of either of the parent (any one of the aforementioned document) is required to be submitted

#### Where to Apply:

Duly filled Application form along with other supporting documents is to be submitted in the O/o Medical Superintendent/ Nodal officer, DAK of the concerned hospital where the patient is undergoing treatment.

## How to Apply:

Application form to be filled by the patient or through his representative along with the following documents:

- Copy of National Food Security Card/Income certificate
- Proof of residence in Delhi continuously for last 3yrs (Prior to the date of submission of application)
- Original estimate certificate issued by the treating doctor of the concerned Government Hospital indicating the patient's disease and the treatment required along with the estimated expenditure of the treatment duly certified by the Medical Superintendent of the said hospital.
- Two photographs of the concerned patient, duly attested by the treating doctor of the concerned Government Hospital affixed on the application form and estimate certificate
- Photocopies of the treatment record
- Undertaking regarding income details of the family

## Processing of an application:

A complete application form along with all the requisite documents is processed and sent for approval according to the following mechanism:

- **Empanelled** 316 private institutions in Delhi & NCR.
- **Membership**: serving employees compulsory but for pensioners optional . Pensioners can join any time by making payment
- Life time card is issued by concerned department to pensioners. Benefits prospective in nature.
- IAS / AGMUT, DANICS during deputation posting outside Delhi by DGEHS

## **MEMBERS**: Serving employees, pensioners, their dependents,

- Ministers, MLAs, Ex. MLAs, Ex. Metropolitan Councilors of GNCT of Delhi and their dependent, family members.

## **6.7 CENTRAL PROCUREMENT AGENCY (CPA)**

Central Procurement Agency (CPA Cell) for drugs was established in Directorate of Health Services as a part of implementation of one of the main aim of 'Drug Policy' of Govt. of Delhi announced in 1994. The agency is to make available good quality drugs at affordable price in all Government of Delhi Hospitals / Health Centers. The agency was started with the objective of making pooled procurement of essential drugs after inviting tenders and placing supply orders for the drugs for all dispensaries / institutions / hospitals in the state of Delhi. The pooled procurement programme was to be implemented in three phases.

The scheme "Central Procurement Agency" initially implemented under Drug Control Deptt. and now has been transferred to Directorate of Health Service w.e.f. 1.3.2000 now located at S-1, Dispensary Building, School Block, Shakarpur, Delhi92.

The Broad objectives of the scheme was to procure drugs centrally required by the hospitals and various health centers situated different part of Govt. of Delhi and their distribution to these institutions ensuring high quality standards with comparatively low cost. By creating procurement agency, the state will be in a position to procure drugs at competitive rates. Because of larger size of orders being placed with the pharmaceutical firms, ensure the availability of drugs which are uniform and good quality & in generic names in all Health Units of State. CPA also ensures the quality of medicines by testing the randomly picked up medicines & surgical consumables in NABL approved Laboratories.

In this system of procurement, pit falls of multi point procurement system will also be overcome. In the last financial year approx 99.5% of Budget allocated was consumed. Total Budget allocated for the financial year 2019-20 was Rs. 297.8 Cr and consumed Budget amount was Rs. 295.62 Cr.

## **6.8 COURT CASE CELL**

Court Case Cell in DHS (HQ) deals with the court cases filed or defended by the Directorate of Health Services or Health & Family Welfare Dept. of Govt., of N.C.T. of Delhi. It receives petitions from different courts and after perusal of the contents this cell forwards it to law deptt. For appointment of Govt. counsel for defending the case and also forwards the same to concerned branch for para-wise comments for filing counter affidavit. The Court Case Cell also processes and files cases / appeals of different branches in the relevant courts. It also receives summons / attends the courts / briefs the Govt. Counsel.

## 6.10 BIO MEDICAL WASTE MANAGEMENT CELL

Ministry of Environment and Forest, Govt. of India notified the Biomedical Waste (Management & Handling) Rules, 1998 in exercise of power conferred under sections 6,8 and 25 of the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986. However, Ministry of Environment, Forest and climate change, Govt. of India notified the new Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 on 28th March, 2016 as amended 2018-2019. The Delhi Pollution Control Committee has been designated as Prescribed Authority to implement these rules in the National Capital Territory of Delhi. The Lt. Governor of Delhi has constituted an Advisory Committee which has 10 members with Pr. Secretary (H & FW), Govt. of NCT of Delhi as Chairman and Director (Health Services) as Member

## Secretary/Convener.

In order to facilitate the proper treatment of the biomedical waste generated from Hospitals, dispensaries, smaller Nursing Home/Clinics Blood Bank/Diagnostic Laboratories etc., the Government has taken initiatives to establish centralized waste treatment facilities.

The Delhi Government has allowed establishment of Centralized Biomedical Waste Treatment facilities at Nilothi by the name SMS Water Grace BMW Pvt. Ltd.at Nilothi, New Delhi and M/s Biotic Waste Solutions Pvt. Ltd at G.T. Karnal Road, Delhi is functioning as per the authorization of Delhi Pollution Control Committee. Biomedical Waste is collected from Health Care Facilities in Delhi, transported and treated in these Common Bio-medical Waste Treatment Facilities (CBWTF) as per Bio Medical Waste Management Rules, 2016 in accordance with DPCC order dated 15/5/2015.

In order to implement the BMW Management Rules, Bio-medical Waste Management Cell was formed in the Directorate of Health Services, Govt. of NCT of Delhi, for promoting, facilitation and monitoring the Biomedical Waste Management Rules, 2016 in the health care facilities in the state of Delhi.

## **Objectives:**

- 1. Facilitation of BMW Management Rules 2016 and amendments thereof.
- 2. Reduction of health care waste induced infection/illnesses and patient safety.
- 3. Dissemination of the provisions of Acts and Rules to the health care personnel, and also the community at large.
- 4. Capacity building of health care institutions to manage biomedical waste
- 5. Strengthening of monitoring mechanism at state and district level.
- 6. Coordination with other agencies.

# Achievements during the year 2019-20 Trainings: 2019-2020

The Bio Medical Waste Management Cell has been conducting regular trainings of all categories of health care workers from Delhi Govt. Hospitals and Districts of DGHS. Since training is an ongoing process to improve the skills and knowledge, all the Health care workers including doctors, nurses, paramedical staff etc. is to be trained as per Bio Medical Waste Management Rules 2016 as amended 2018 & 2019. The details of training programme conducted by Bio Medical Management Cell, DGHS during 2019-20 is given as under:

- Meeting of Advisory Committee for Bio Medical Management was held on 11-04-2019 & 18-11-2019 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (Health & Family Welfare) & Pr. Secretary in his chamber at 9th Level, Delhi Secretrait, New Delhi -110002 regarding Bio Medical Management and streamlining the system in Delhi.

• District level monitoring committee has been constituted in all districts of DGHS and approved by Secretary Health & Family Welfare. Meeting of all the CDMOs and Nodal Officers of BMW held on 18-11-2019 to review the working of District Level Monitoring Committee. BMW Cell/District Level Monitoring Committee inspected 140 HCFs in Delhi during the year 2019-2020 including Govt. Hospitals, Private hospitals and DGDs.

## 6.11 ANTIQUACKERY CELL

- Judgement of Hon'ble High Court dated 30/06/2014 has been circulated in all districts of DGHS, GNCTD for implementation after taking approval of competent authority.
- Total no of inspection of inspections done by CDMOs on the complaints forwarded by Antiquackery cell/DMC regarding quacks are approx. 126.
- The hearing called by Delhi Medical Council in pursuance of Show Cause Notices issued to various individuals who are alleged to be practicing in modern scientific system of medicine without holding the recognized medical qualifications, was attended by Dr. D.R.Gupta, Addl. Director (AQC) during the year 2019-20.
- Delhi Medical Council has issued 23 Show Cause Notices & 15 closure reports of illegal medical
  practitioner who were reported to be practicing allopathic system without holding any requisite
  qualification during the year 2019-20 in response to complaints received from Anti Quackery Cell,
  CDMOs etc regarding fake doctors as per the information.

## 6.12 TRANSPLANTATION OF HUMAN ORGAN ACT (THOA) CELL

- DGHS has nominated its nominees to Hospital Authorization Committees of all the licensed hospitals in Delhi. DHS is also part of State Level Authorization Committee.
- State Level Authorization Committee meetings are attended by DGHS/Additional DG.
- Attended Hospital Authorization Committee meetings at licensed hospitals.
- Reply of Parliament & Assembly questions.
- Redressal of Complaints.

## 6.13 CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION (CME) CELL

It is a specific form of continuing education in the medical field for maintaining competence, to learn about new and developing areas in medical field and other related subjects. CME is an important part for the development of human resource for the medical field.

CME Cell in the DHS has been established to achieve the above stated objective and to update the knowledge and skill of working medical and paramedical personnel in Delhi Govt. The Cell has been assigned the responsibility for implementing the plan scheme "Continued Multi Professional Medical Education", an in service training of all categories of health care providers.

The Cell has been functioning actively and has gained momentum since 1997, beginning of the IX Plan & has continued to improve till date.

## Main functions of the Cell are as under:

- Organization of CME programme for all categories of staff.
- Co-ordination with Govt. and non-Govt. training and teaching institutions for imparting latest knowledge and skill to the health care professionals.
- Dissemination of information of various training programs being organised through premier institutions to all concerned
- Sponsoring the appropriate Medical, Nursing and Para Medical Personnel for attending workshop, seminar and conferences.
- Sponsorship of appropriate Medical, Nursing and Para Medical Personnel for higher education through distance education.
- Reimbursement of delegation fee wherever applicable to the sponsored candidates.

## 6.17 DISASTER MANAGEMENT CELL

Disasters are known to strike without warning. The government, local bodies, voluntary bodies have to work in coordination & cooperation to prevent or control disasters, wherever the need arises. Being a megacity and capital of India, eventualities in the form of floods and outbreaks like cholera and dengue, terrorist attacks have been witnessed in the past. Delhi is located in a high seismic Zone of the country and the possibility of major earthquakes is very real. Disaster Management Cell works within the confines of mandated functions under Disaster Management Act 2005. The cell is focussing on the lead function "Medical Response & Trauma Care" and support function "Search/rescue and evacuation of victims under expert care in emergencies.

The existing guideline for provision of care in Medical Response & Trauma Care at three levels (Pre-Hospital Care, Transit Care, and Hospital Care) is in place.

- 1. As part of medical rehabilitation of victims arising out of crisis situation in the past, the victims undergoing treatment are being provided with support for medical rehabilitation.
- 2. All the responding units are issued guidelines on regular bases to update the three arms of are for effective delivery of Medical Response & Trauma Care.

  - Hospital Care

## 6.20 NATIONAL LEPROSY ERADICATION PROGRAMME: DELHI

#### **Milestones**

- 2017 Sparsh Leprosy Campaign

## What are its objectives?

- Decentralization of NLEP responsibilities to States/ UTs through State/ District Leprosy
- Societies
- · Accomplish integration of leprosy services with General Health Care System (GHS) and
- Achieve elimination of leprosy at National level by the end of the Project
- Provide good quality leprosy services,
- Enhance Disability Prevention and Medical Rehabilitation,
- Increase advocacy towards reduction of stigma and stop discrimination and Strengthen-
- Monitoring and supervision.
- To achieve elimination of leprosy at national level by the end of the project
- To accomplish integration of leprosy services with general health services in the low endemic states
- To proceed with integration of services as rapidly as possible in the high endemic areas

## Activities in 2019-20 / Achievements

- 1. LCDC or LeprosyCase Detection Campaign was carried out in 8 districts from 21st August 2019 to 3rd September 2019 and 69 lakh population was screened by House to House search teams. 47 cases were identified and Multi Drug Therapy started.
- 3. Focus Leprosy Campaign was carried out in East, Northeast and Southeast districts as they were not covered under LCDC as per criteria.
- 4. Various IEC campaigns and sensitisation and trainings were carried out. IEC campaign was also carried out as a part of Sparsh Leprosy Awareness Campaign.
- 5. LISSA campaign for sensitisation (Leprosy Ignorance Stigma Scare Abolition campaign) was initiated in Southeast District in collaboration with Hind Kusht Nivaran Sangh, Delhi
- 6. Nikusth Online Portal for online recording and data maintenance has been started.
- 7. The Prevalence rate at the end of 2019-20 was 0.95 and the New Case Detection Rate was at 9.07

#### 6.21 HEALTH MELA

DGHS GNCTD participates in various health mela and fairs, Expos etc. as a part of its IEC and awareness campaign in the society. Through participation various Govt health schemes are showcased and information shared. It also opens up a two-way communication between the public and the health officials and their reaction and expectations are perceived. In 2019-20, DGHS GNCTD participated in the Govt. Achievement Expo in August and Perfect Health Mela in October.

5 stalls were hired in the Perfect Health Mela and one stall at Govt. Expo. Information on RNTCP, Dengue and other Vector Born Disease, NLEP, Silicosis, Fluorosis, Aam Aadmi Mohalla Clinic were displayed. A BMI estimation desk was part of both the events. Many visitors appreciated the efforts of the Govt.

## 6.22 STATE AWARD SCHEME

State Awards to Service Doctors working in Delhi was first started in the year 1997-98. Under this scheme 20 Service doctors from Allopathy, Homeopathy and Indian System of Medicine who are working under Govt. of NCT of Delhi for the last 15 years or more with excellent services to the people of Delhi are conferred with the State award, every year.

The purpose of state award is to motivate the medical and paramedical staff for better quality service to the population of Delhi. In the award function held on 29th August 2006, Hon'ble Chief Minister announced that this award should also be given to Paramedical staff. Each awardee is given a memento, Citation certificate and cash award.

The award seeks to recognize work of any distinction and is given for distinguished and exceptional achievements/service in all fields of activities/disciplines, such as Medicine, Social Work, medical research, Public health, etc.

There ought to be an element of public service in the achievements of the person to be selected. It should not be merely excellence in a particular field but it should be excellence plus.

All Government Doctors and paramedical staff who fulfil the criteria without distinction of race, occupation, position or sex are eligible for these awards.

The award is normally not conferred to retired Doctors/Officials. However, in highly deserving cases, the Government could consider giving an award to Retired doctor/official if the retirement of the person proposed to be honoured has been recent, say within a period of one year preceding the Award function.

It was proposed that the award may be given to 20 Doctors and 31 Paramedical & Nursing staff during current Year. Hon'ble Chief Minister confers these awards to the meritorious candidates. At present each Doctor is given a cash award of Rs.100000/- and each Nurse/Paramedical staff is given Rs.50000/-.

## The criteria of selection to the award were as under:

- 1. Meritorious/extraordinary work in the field of healthcare/ health promotion/ social service/ health research/ public health.
- 2. Years or more regular service under GNCT Delhi, MCD or NDMC.
- 3. Vigilance Clearance and Annual confidential report/Work & Conduct report of the candidate.
- 4. Recommendations from Head of the department.
- 5. Vigilance Clearance and Annual confidential report/Work & Conduct report of the candidate.
- 6. Representation to different institutions, weaker sections.
- 7. Representation to different streams like Allopathy, ISM&H, Local bodies (Municipal Corporations & NDMC).

The HODs/ Directors/ Medical Superintendents will invite application from deserving candidate working in their institutions and scrutinise them. The recommended applications of the most deserving candidate will be forwarded to Director Health Services. The state award/search committee will decide the final list of candidates to be awarded.

#### 6.23 SILICOSIS CONTROL PROGRAMME

Silicon Dioxide or Crystallized Silica causes fine levels of dust to be deposited in the lungs. The lungs react in several ways. They get inflamed, create lesions, and then form nodules and fibroids. There are no perceivable symptoms for a numbers of years. Silicosis is difficult to diagnose at its onset. Silicosis symptoms in varying degrees of severity begin to occur. Those affected may experience shortness of breath, fever, chest pain, exhaustion and dry cough. More advanced forms of the disease will show cyanotic mucus membranes and asthma or other breathing difficulties, similar to advanced emphysema. The Silicosis disease may also leave the lung more vulnerable to tuberculosis, and has also been linked to the development of autoimmune disorder such as lupus and rheumatoid arthritis. Since silicosis affects the lungs, it can also affect the vessels leading to the heart. So heart disease and enlargement are common. In the 1990s silicon dioxide was classified as a known carcinogen, and as such. Silica exposure is now linked to the development of lung cancer.

Computerized axial tomography scans and X-rays recognize the lesions and nodules associated with silicosis. Diagnosis is also aided by examining the symptoms of those who may be exposed to silicon dioxide. It is an irreversible condition which can only be addressed by treating the symptoms. Such treatments may include cough syrups, bronchodilators, antibiotics and anti-tubercular medications. Additionally, those affected are advised to avoid exposures to smoking, to any further silica and to other lung irritants. Special filters for drilling equipment have been developed and dry mining is infrequent. Anything that can reduce the silica dust content in the air, particularly the use of water, is employed to make working conditions safer. Precautions developed because of the liabilities for employers, as well as the risk to workers silica exposure lawsuits abound. When the west first began to industries, silicosis contraction was almost certainly if one was employed as a miner or bricklayers. Currently, awareness and government regulations are resulting in fewer new cases of silicosis. Unfortunately; many newly industrialized countries skimp on the cost of prevention at the expense of their workers. These countries will expectedly see a rise in contraction of silicosis until they implement the guidelines protecting their workers. Silicosis will often develop between 20 to 45 years after the exposure. But certain forms of the disease can occur after a single heavy dose to a very high concentration of silica in a short period of time. Workers with Silicosis may have following symptoms:

- Shortness of breath following physical excretion.
- Severe and chronic cough.
- Fatigue, loss of appetite,
- Chest pains and fevers.

Silica particles end up the air sacs of the lung, causing inflammation and scarring that damages the sacs, preventing gas exchange and normal breathing. The disease will be fatal as the inflammation spreads and lung tissue becomes damaged.

## **Objectives:**

- 1. Reduction of new cases of Silicosis in Delhi.
- 2. Capacity building of health care personnel
- 3. Strengthening of diagnostic facilities in health care institutions
- 4. Awareness generation in the community through IEC/BCC activities specially silicosis prone area.
- 5. Clinical care and rehabilitation of silicosis affected people in collaboration with social welfare and urban development department.

## Strategies:

- 1. Reduction of new cases of Silicosis in Delhi adopting engineering measures specially PPE and keeping fly dust wet.
- 2. Capacity building of health care personnel through trainings, seminars, workshop and advocacy meetings
- 3. Strengthening of diagnostic facilities in health care institutions
- 4. Awareness generation in the community through IEC/BCC activities specially silicosis prone area.
- 5. Clinical care of people affected with silicosis
- 6. Rehabilitation of silicosis affected people in collaboration with social welfare, urban development department and involvement of NGOs

## There are three main types detailed below:

- 1. **Acute Silicosis:** Occurs after heavy exposure to high concentrations of silica. The symptoms can develop with in a few weeks and as long as five years after the exposure.
- 2. **Chronic Silicosis:** Occurs after long term exposure of low concentration of silica dust. This is most common form of the disease and is undetected for many years because a chest X-Ray often does not reveal the disease for a long as 20 years after exposure. This type of the disease severely hinders the ability of the body to fight infections because of the damage to the lungs, making the person more susceptible to other lung diseases including tuberculosis.
- 3. **Accelerated Silicosis:-** Occurs after the exposure to high concentrations of silica. The disease develops with in 5 to 10 years after exposure. In all three types, silica dust can kill people and can cause many serious diseases besides silicosis. Silicosis can lead to other dangerous lung diseases.

## The progression of the Silicosis:

Once in the lungs, the particles cause acute toxicity and damage to the lung cells. Scientists believe that the surface and sharp structure of the silica particles are to blame for the extreme danger and toxic nature of the dust. It has been observed that freshly crushed silica particles cause more inflammation and kill more cells than silica that has in the air. The silica particles are quickly attacked and ingested by the body's defense system releasing enzymes and radicals. This release of these byproducts can result in death of the lung and white blood cells which causes inflammation and can result in acute silicosis.

As scar tissue is created, it will from lesions in the later stages of the disease. As the body develops chronic inflammation, dark areas becomes visible in X-Ray. The Silicosis nodules are dense spherical structures which collect together and become visible on chest X-rays usually in the upper lung fields. As Silicosis develops the lungs become increasingly susceptible to infection with tuberculosis, fungi and bacteria of many kinds.

## The changes in Lungs as Silicosis Progresses:

**Acute Silicosis:** Acute silicosis is caused by a massive outpouring of protein debris and fluid into lung sacs due to short term exposure to extremely high concentration of silica dust. Acute silicosis is treated with a high dose of steroids, but the prognosis is generally poor. This is because the ongoing accumulation of debris in the lungs air spaces causing respiratory failure which is largely untreatable. Additionally, acute silicosis reportedly has caused many deaths among workers exposed at the same time, at a single work site. Lung Transplants for young workers with this form of silicosis provides some hope.

**Chronic Silicosis:** In this form of Silicosis, also called chronic nodular silicosis the silicosis nodules collect to form a mass, which can be identified on chest X-ray. These masses cause the upper lobes of the lungs to contract, which appears as an "angel wing pattern" on the X-rays. Doctors and radiographers refer to this pattern as angel of death because it is a poor prognostic sign.

**Accelerated Silicosis:** Accelerated Silicosis is a very rare form that progresses rapidly from intense short term exposure to silica particles. In this form, the nodules develop at a much faster rate and are usually fatal within a few years.

## Prevention of other complications of the disease:

<u>Infections:-</u> Fungal infections are believed to result when the lung scavenger cells that fight these disease are overwhelmed with silica dust and are unable to kill mycobacterium.

Silico tuberculosis: - Patients with silicosis have a greatly increased risk of developing tuberculosis.

**Systematic Sclerosis:** - Silica exposure has been associated with systemic sclerosis and its many forms. Systemic sclerosis is a disorder of connective tissues and joints and small blood vessels. Scleroderma involves skin changes and injury to the joints and small blood vessels. Sclerosis involves skin changes and injury to the joints changes are seen on the skin, particularly over the fingers and face.

<u>Silica Associated Lung Cancer</u>: - Lung cancer has been associated with preexisting silicosis. However, lung cancer may also occur in person exposed to silica in the absence of silicosis. Doctors believe that silicosis produces increased risk for lung cancer and that the association between silica exposure and lung cancer is causal.

**Silicosis Diagnosis & Treatment:** Workers have been overexposed to silica dust should visit a doctors specializing in lung disease, a pulmonologist. Silicosis often goes untreated and undiagnosed especially chronic silicosis because its symptoms are not unique. A person's occupational history with silica dust exposure will help doctors evaluate possible medical problems. Through medical examination using chest X-rays and lung function test can determine if a person has silicosis. Workers at risk of exposure, such as miners or sandblasting should have lung examination at least every 3 years. Above all, prevention of the disease is key action to control silicosis, because there is no way to reverse the disease. Lung function tests are useful in early diagnosis of the disease, often showing poor airways and bronchitis associated with irritation from the dust.

Using tools like CT Scans, MRIs, invasive procedures are almost never required to make the diagnosis of silicosis as a simple Chest X-ray is a good tool. Patients at risk should let their doctor know, because the doctor may not think to look for the disease. There are risks of misdiagnosis. It may be misdiagnosed as pulmonary oedema and Tuberculosis. Few lasting treatment are available for silicosis. The first step is obviously stopping continuing exposure. This will not stop the gradual progression the disease, but will prevent it from an even faster rate of progression.

**Treatment aim to relieve pain and suffering**: Patients are administered oxygen and steroids to help them breathe as the disease runs its course. Unfortunately the only good treatment for end-stage silicosis is a lung transplant, which can be a lifesaving treatment.

## The General Control of the Disease:

- 1. Use of Oxygen
- 2. Patients stops smoking
- 3. Monitoring the person for signs of lung infection
- 4. Experts have also tried aluminum powder, d-pencillamine., and polyvinyl pyridine-N-Oxide.

Govt. Effort for Silicosis Control in Lal Kuan Area:-Lal Kuan is a small urban village near the Mehrauli-Badarpur Road. It has been an active mining and quarrying area with a large numbers of stone crushers that have helped in building of Delhi. All the crushing and mining operations came to a halt in 1992 by Supreme Court Order. This judgment, though reduced the pollution level of Delhi, its ambiguous position on the issue of occupational health hazards made the lives of the poor workers more vulnerable. When mining crushing activities were on, everything in Lal Kuan used to be covered by a thick layer of dust. Most of the victims are migrant workers. Both husband and wife are suffering from silicosis/others respiratory problems in majority of households.

Today, Lal Kuan is the home of former mine workers and stone crushers ailing from silicosis. PRASAR (An NGO) claims that at least 3, 000 residents have died in the last 15 years from silicosis tuberculosis and other breathing ailments in Lal Kuan area. NGO must be having some records or Gastimates only? But it is sensitive to the problem of silicosis in poor population. Chief Minister Delhi convened a meeting in Delhi Secretariat to discuss the problem of silicosis in the Lal Kuan area. The meeting was attended by the Health Minister of Govt. of Delhi, Food Minister, Principal Secretary (Health & Family Welfare), Directors Social welfare, and Director Health Services (DHS) and other officers of different departments. Representatives of NGO-Prasar along with the silicosis victims were also present to explain the sufferings of silicosis victims in Delhi. Chief Minister asked the officials to find long term rehabilitation for the silicosis victims. The medical examination and physical survey of the area was advised to provide benefits to needy population.

**Physical Survey:** Physical survey was the joint venture of directorate of social welfare and directorate of health services. The team consisted of 1) District Social Welfare Officer, 2) Research Officer, DHS, 3) Kanungo, Revenue Department 4) CDPO of Area 5) NGO-PRASAR, 6) Anganwadi workers (AWWs) involved=17. The Social welfare Departments has carried out its physical survey to bring the silicosis victims into Antyodaya schemes and granting of pensions.

**Strengthening of Services:** Health department is generating awareness about silicosis in the community. Doctors are being sensitized to suspect and detect cases of silicosis. The media interest on occupational hazards has triggered the voice to review occupational safety rules and implement them strongly across the country. The most significant effect has been on the minds of the inhabitants of Lal Kuan. It has driven away the feeling of hopelessness and instilled sense of empowerment among the people giving them a new zeal to look forward to life. Active involvement of NGOs has brought public private partnership.

Mobile medical vans are now visiting for four days a week. It is distributing free medicines for silicosis and other respiratory and Occupational diseases. The building of the Hospital/PUHC at Tajpur with X-ray facility needed for the detection of the silicosis is almost complete. The survey of the medical team is complete a short report on the health survey has also been submitted to the Delhi Government.

**Medical Survey:** The health survey results show that, about 68 percent of the symptomatic people surveyed suffer form silicosis, silico-tuberculosis. A large percentage of people also suffer from hearing loss and malnutrition. The survey stressed on the need for continued surveillance of the health of the people and a further comprehensive study on the health of Lal Kuan victims.

Clinical Examination: The Dean MAMC constituted a task force comprising Dr. T.K Joshi from COEH, Dr. K.S. Baghotia of DHS, and Dr. Neeraj Gupta of COEH. Two surveyors were appointed who were trained and provided guidance in feeling up the interview schedules. The chest X-ray Blood & Urine investigations were required for the subjects under study were carried out at NTPC Hospital Badarpur. The radiographer as per norms were read by:- Dr Arthur Frank, chief of occupational health, Drexel University, Philadelphia. Dr. Rahul Mukherjee, MRCP, a Respiratory Physician in Birmingham Hospital U.K and Dr T.K. Joshi, Occupational Physician of COEH trained in UK and USA. Pulmonary function testing was performed by Dr. Neeraj Gupta of COEH.

**Findings:** Out of 240 cases suspected to be symptomatic only 165 symptomatic subjects presented for the study and 111 turned up for X-ray. Out of this only 104 subjects had occupational history. Almost 98 subjects presented with a history of working in stone crushers. Out of this 41 were found to be having silicosis. Only one case of silicosis did not have exposure. It appears that the exposure to dust was associated with silicosis in about 45% of those who worked on stone crushers. 43% patients were also having deafness. In addition to this 82% subjects had low hemoglobin levels i.e., Anemia.

**Validation of Silicosis Cases:** Forty four (44) candidates were identified by the medical team headed by Dr. T.K. Joshi suffering from silicosis/ silico-tuberculosis. An expert group was constituted in MAMC under Prof. M.K. Daga to further examine these patients and provide medical help/health care. Twenty one (21) patients were confirmed by the experts group and validated to be suffering from silicosis/silico-tuberculosis in Delhi. This list has been sent to concerned Commissioner under Workman compensation Act and Chief Inspector Factories for further action and Help to the silicosis victims.

**Awareness Activities:** Directorate of health services has conducted outdoor awareness activities involving metro trains and metro railings keeping in view widely distributed construction workers engaged all over Delhi.

**Rehabilitation Strategies:** A medical team consisting of occupational health experts' conducted clinical survey of the affected person in Lal Kuan area.

- 1. A multi purpose Community Health Centre (CHC) for the treatment of the occupational disease has been established at the Tajpur near Lal Kuan.
- 2. The social welfare department, health department and the urban development department will also explore and provide alternative livelihood opportunities for the citizens of Lal Kuan.
- 3. A seed PUHC opened at Lal Kuan to cater the needs of Lal Kuan people.
- 4. Next of kin of fifteen deceased person's due to silicosis have been compensated @Rs. Four lakh by revenue department.
- 5. CDMO South east is providing free medical treatment through PUHC, Lalkuan and MO I/c is coordinating for the referral for further management and diagnosis to National Institute of TB and Respiratory Diseases (NITRD), New Delhi through CATS Ambulance.
- 6. A Workshop on Silicosis was conducted for health care personnel of GNCTD in 2019-20
- 7. A committee under the chairmanship of Dr J.K. Saini, (MD TB and Chest Disease, NITRD) was constituted for establishing the diagnosis of suspected Silicosis cases. An arrangement has been arrived

- at with Senior Chest Physician Dr. J. K. Saini of National Institute of Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease for a special weekly OPD for Silicosis cases and suspected cases of Silicosis from Lal Kuan.
- 8. As majority of old and suspected silicosis patients reside in Lal Kuan, ASHA workers of Lal Kuan Dispensary under CDMO (South East) were sensitised regarding silicosis with reference to their occupational history and clinical symptoms so that they recognize these patients and bring them in silicosis OPD to ensure free treatment and rehabilitation. These link workers are continuously visiting the area where silicosis affected patients are residing.
- 9. Further all patients in this area are being screened under RNTCP Programme and provided free treatment at DOTS centre for tuberculosis
  - Reporting of new cases of Silicosis from Hospitals and districts has been started for further follow up and treatment.

#### 6.24 NATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR HEALTH CARE OF THE ELDERLY

## Aiming Healthy & Happy Ageing

The population of persons over the age of 60 years has tripled in last 50 years in India. The population of Senior Citizens was 7.7% of total population in 2001 which has increased to 8.14% in 2011. It is estimated that around 16 lakh senior citizens are living in Delhi. Senior Citizens at large require holistic care to meet their social, emotional, health and financial needs. Delhi Government has already framed State Policy for Senior Citizens with commitment to provide Financial and Social security in form of Old Age Pension, Protection of Life and Property and Priority Health care.

Senior Citizens suffer from multiple chronic diseases like Hypertension, Cataract, Osteoarthritis, Chronic Heart Diseases, Diabetes, Neural deafness and several types of Mental Disorder. These diseases results in disabilities affecting the activities of daily living . It has been reported that 8% of senior citizens are confined to their home or bed.

The following provisions have been made and being implemented to provide special health care services to Senior Citizens in Delhi –

- 1. General Health Care is being provided to all senior citizens on preferential basis in most Delhi Government Hospitals & Dispensaries.
- 2. Sunday Clinics for Senior Citizens are running in 17 hospitals under Delhi Government Hospitals except super speciality and maternity & child hospital. These Clinics are multispeciality with facilities of lab, X Ray & Ultrasound at these hospitals. Tertiary care hospital and hospitals under Central Govt, MCD, ESI and others are also being requested for same.
- 3. Daily Geriatric Clinic: for senior citizens is running in 19 hospitals
- 4. Specific days earmarked for Geriatrics Clinic
  - a) Dispensaries: Every Thursday 12 to 2 PM
  - b) Polyclinic: Wednesday and Saturdays 12 to 2 PM
  - c) Distt Hospital: Daily Geriatrics Clinic under Medicine Deptt
- 5. Reservation of Indoor beds: Minimum 10 beds reserved in each distt hospital (6 Medicine Deptt, 2 Surgery and 2 Ortho deptt). Tertiary care hospital and hospitals under Central Govt, MCD, ESI and others are also being requested for same. 15 hospitals are following this guideline
- **6. Provision of Separate Queues for Senior Citizens** at OPD, Pharmacy, Diagnostic Facilities etc. Has been established
- $\textbf{7. Senior Citizen Help Desk} \ \text{in most Delhi Government Hospitals has been set up at OPD}.$
- 8. Designated Nodal Officer exist in hospitals to address the grievances.
- 9. It has also been provisioned that inmates of various Old age home to be attended on priority in each hospital.
- **10. Screening of Senior Citizens at dispensary level & Mohalla Clinic** for identification of hidden diseases / disabilities for which one is not aware or which have not been manifested and referral to appropriate higher level. In this activity ASHA worker has been engaged.
- 11. Training of Medical / Para medical staff on Geriatric Health care so that senior citizens can be attended with care and on priority basis.

12.IEC / Awareness Generation / Observation of International Day for Older Person and similar activities has been organised. International Day for Older Person was observed as fortnight campaign with awareness / sensitization / trainings and health camp activities

## 6.25 NATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF DEAFNESS (NPPCD)

The Programme was a 100% Centrally Sponsored Scheme during 11th Five Year Plan. The Programme was initiated in year 2007 on pilot mode in 25 districts of 11 State/UTs. In the 11th Five Year Plan and in 2012-2013 the programme was expanded to 20 States /UT's in192 districts .Inthe 12th Five Year Plan, It expanded the programme to all States/UT's by covering 200 additional districts, thereby taking the number of districts served to 384

## **Objectives**

- 1. To prevent avoidable hearing loss on account of disease or injury.
- 2. Early identification, diagnosis and treatment of ear problems responsible for hearing loss and deafness.
- 3. To medically rehabilitate persons of all age groups, suffering with deafness.
- 4. To strengthen the existing inter-sectoral linkages for continuity of the rehabilitation programme, for persons with deafness.
- 5. To develop institutional capacity for ear care services by providing support for equipment, material and training personnel

#### **Achievements:**

- 1. Surveillance Activities
  - Surveillance activities were carried out in collaboration with Private Hospital and Agencies sporadically and not as a year round activity due to lack of fund or logistic support.
  - The surveillance activities were carried as deafness screening camps in target population at construction sites, underserved communities, orphanages and at public places like metro station as a part of World hearing day campaign and a Pilot Trial.
    - No of persons screened in Ear Screening Camps- 21736.
    - No of persons referred for ENT OPD 357
- 2. IEC has been diligently carried out since last 2 years by printing flyers, posters, other materials etc which has been distributed in Health Melas and the community throughout the year. IEC has also been carried out as a part of NHAC (National Hearing Awareness Campaign.
  - a. In 2019 World Hearing Day, various activities were carried out as a part of it through out the fortnight
  - b. Total Pledges collected from Health Units =100779. (figures exclude some school children due to the below mentioned reason)
  - c. Around 100 Schools were actively involved in the World Hearing Day Activities, which could have been more but for the final examination during that period. Pledges were taken by the students in the assembly.
  - d. Health talks and rallies were carried out.
  - e. No of persons screened in Ear Screening Camps-21736.

- f. No of persons referred for ENT OPD 357
- g. In 2020, as a part of NHAC, pledge ceremonies as per guidelines were held in the PHCs and SPO and DPO offices and Nukkad nataks and Rallies were organised.
- h. Health talks and display of awareness messages in public places like hospitals and DM offices
- i. A training of MHS staff and a Quiz on Deafness was conducted
- 3. Two batches of training had been conducted in the last two years. Participants were District ENT Surgeons, District Programme officers, Nodal officers School Health, Mobile Health Scheme and PHC Medical Officer
- 4. Sensitisation programmes of Paramedical and ASHA workers were carried out as a part of National Hearing Awareness Campaign and World Hearing Day Fortnight.

## 6.26 FLUOROSIS MITIGATION PROGRAMME

After a survey high levels of Fluoride were reported in 230 districts of 20 States of India. The population at risk as per population in habitations with high fluoride is 11.7 million as on 1.4.2014. Rajasthan, Gujarat and Andhra Pradesh are worst affected states. Punjab, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra are moderately affected states while Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and Assam are mildly affected states.

The Rajiv Gandhi National Drinking Water Mission worked for Fluorosis Control between the years 1987-1993.

In 2008 – 2009, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India launched a National Programme for Prevention and Control of Fluorosis.

In Delhi, the Fluorosis mitigation program works for the prevention and control of Fluorosis.

## The Objectives of the Fluorosis Mitigation Program, Delhi are

- 1. To collect and assess data of fluorosis cases and report onwards
- 2. Monitoring areas where there is a suspicion of fluorosis
- 3. Capacity building for prevention, diagnosis and management of fluorosis cases.

## Programme Specific Coordination Required from Agencies:-

- a. Coordination with Other Health Deptts like School Health Scheme and Mobile Health Scheme for screening among target population of children and in underserved areas. Dental Departments in Hospitals are major components for treatment and detection.
- **b. NGOs** NGOs can be a huge support in achieving a common goal for the population effectively by creating awareness and detection of problem areas.
- **c. Jal Board** For regular analysis of fluoride in water levels.
- d. International agencies for support and capacity building.
- e. Social Welfare to coordinate for beneficial schemes and rehabilitation of the fluorosis induced disabilities.

## Activities in the year 2019-20:-

- A two-day State Level Workshop on Fluorosis was organised in December 2019 for capacity building of Delhi Govt. Health personnel at Dwarka, Delhi.
- A total of 90 participants were trained in 3 batches.
- IEC on fluorosis were also done at Health Melas and events.

#### 6.27 TOBACCO CONTROL PROGRAMME

In Delhi, Tobacco Control programme is being executed through State Tobacco Control Cell, Directorate of Health Services, Dept of H & FW, GNCTD. Two act namely, Cigarettes and Other Tobacco

Products Act (COTPA) 2003and Delhi Prohibition of Smoking and Non – Smokers Health Protection Act 1996 are applicable in Delhi. Delhi is among the pioneer states in India which has separate tobacco control legislation even before enactment of Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act (COTPA) 2003. Strict Enforcement of these acts is the main objectives of tobacco control programme in Delhi. Apart from that STCC Delhi is also implementing Tobacco Free Delhi Project with the aims to make Delhi Tobacco free Capital of India, DRY DAY for TOBACCO and various other activities to protect the people from the ill effects of Tobacco use.

Since, Education Dept. is one of the main stakeholder departments under the National Tobacco Control Programme, sensitization of students and training of teachers is widely being advocated. During the COVID-19 pandemic, regular continuous webinars are being conducted by STCC for school teachers and students.

## Major Activity Going On Under Tobacco Control Programme In Delhi:

## 1. DRY DAY FOR TOBACCO ON LAST DAY OF EVERY MONTH:

Government of Delhi is observing DRY DAY for TOBACCO on last day of every month. On this particular day we appeal to all Tobacco Vendors for not to sell any Tobacco Products and also to Public for not to consume any Tobacco Products on that day. This is on voluntary mode only. We publicized this concept to government / private offices/Departments and various social medias. Apart from this, Intensive Awareness & Enforcement Drives are being conducted throughout Delhi on this day. Every month a different theme is used and particular population is targeted for awareness cum enforcement drive under various sections of COTPA, 2003.

## 2. TOBACCO FREE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE GUIDELINES

Regular online trainings/webinars are being conducted in various schools of Delhi. Students are sensitized regarding harmful effects of tobacco along with tobacco industry manipulations to target young children and teachers are sensitized regarding revised TOFEI guidelines and Cigarettes and other tobacco products act 2003.

## TOBACCO FREE DELHI INITIATIVE:

A campaign to Make Delhi Tobacco Free has been initiated with the aim to make Delhi, Tobacco Free Capital of India in phase manner. **The main focus stakeholder departments are Delhi Police, Transport, Education and Health**. Other departments will also be included gradually. The following activities has been focused under this initiative-

- Display 'Tobacco Free Zone' board at the entrance of boundary wall in Hindi & English languages.
- Display of 'No Smoking Signage' along with the name and contact detail of Nodal Officer within the building at entrance, reception, prominent places of every floor, staircase, lift and other important places.
- Banning selling of tobacco products in all building under the departments by issuing self administrative order.
- IEC programme / awareness generation programme. Maximum utilization of departmental display board for dissemination of anti tobacco messages.
- Ensure No-Smoking / Tobacco Free status within the premises.
- Instruction also sent for fine / challan procedure in case of non compliance of Tobacco Control Legislations & presence of direct evidence of smoking / use of gutkha like tobacco products within the premises.
- Ensuring ban on direct / indirect advertisement of Tobacco Products on State / Interstate Bus Services / Taxies / Autos / Trucks / Tempos / Others
- Display of Anti Tobacco messages on Transport department properties, public service vehicles and bus / train / flight tickets etc

- Ensuring Smoke free / Gutkha like Tobacco free status in all public service vehicles Buses, Taxis, Autos etc
- Apart from that regular inspection / monitoring is being conducted through State as well district units.

#### 2. DLCC

- State cell has done lot of efforts in getting the District Level Coordination Committee constituted in all 11 districts in this year. Thereby, the programme implementation has further strengthened at district level.
- DLCC meetings have also been held under the Chairmanship of DM/DC for all the districts with the efforts of STCC.

#### 3. AWARENESS / SENSITIZATION PROGRAMMES:

As per Tobacco free Delhi Initiative sensitization programmes held in Health, Education, Transport, Police, other Deptt & communities.

TOBACCO FREE SCHOOL/Educational institute INITIATIVE- Tobacco Free School Initiative has been started under the umbrella of Tobacco Free Delhi Initiative and In the FY 2019-20, 2174 Educational Institutes have been declared Tobacco Free. Efforts are being made to make all schools tobacco free premises by implementing 5 parameters namely identified nodal officer, mandatory display of Tobacco Free Zone Boards and No Smoking Signage, Constitution of Tobacco Free Committee, prohibition of Tobacco sale within 100mt radius of any Educational institute along with periodic awareness activities and Ensuring Tobacco Free Status. STCC is also regularly communicating with CBSE/ NCERT to incorporate a chapter / topic on Tobacco control issues in the course curriculum of CBSE for 6th – 12th standard students but final outcome is yet awaited.

- Prohibition of Sale of Tobacco within 100 Meter Radius of all health facilities Implemented through an Administrative Order (Unique in Country). This concept of ours has been adopted by J & K Government.
- Focus is being layed on declaring Government Offices Tobacco Free.
- With the efforts of STCC, Delhi Metro has become Tobacco Free. Mandatory display of tobacco free zone board and no smoking signages with name of Nodal Officer have been displayed at all the metro stations and metro trains but the matter to stop the carriage of 1 matchbox and lighter by the commuters of Delhi Metro is still pending to be resolved at the level of higher authorities.
- Delhi International Airport has been issued instructions to display Tobacco Free Zone Boards and no smoking signages on all Terminals on IGI Airport, Delhi as per the instructions issued by ST & ensure Compliance of COTPA.
- Instructions Have Been Issued To Hotels, Eatery Houses And Restaurants Of Delhi To Display New Modified No Smoking Boards/Signages. Many Of The Hotels In Delhi Have Already Displayed These Signages.

#### 6.28 THALASSEMIA CONTROL PROGRAMME 2019-20

Thalassaemia major is genetic disorder, passed from parents to children. Thalassaemia carrier are common in general population. Every year around 10,000 to 12,000 children are born

with **thalassaemia** major in **India**. There are around three lakh **thalassemia** affected people in **India** currently. According to ICMR study 1 out of every 18 births is a thalassemia carrier in Delhi. In Delhi around 200 Births of Thalassaemia major takes place every year. All these patients require repeated & regular blood transfusion (Every two to four weeks) and iron chelation therapy for survival. The average cost per patient is Rs.50,000 – Rs.2,00,000 per year which is bound to increase further with inflation. A Thalassaemic child on an average requires 30 units of blood every year. All these thalassaemia major births can be completely prevented through awareness/sensitization & timely screening.

- 1. Every year International Thalassaemia Day is observed on 8th May around the world to create awareness on Thalassemia among general public. On this occasion, GNCT of Delhi also observed the day in an innovative manner to further strengthen the Thalassaemia Prevention & Control Programme. The day was observed as Thalassaemia Awareness Pakhwada wef 01-05-2019 to 15-05-2019 for 15 days in the form of Awareness / Sensitization/ Training Programme for Medical / paramedical & communities on Thalassaemia, with the aim to prevent each Thalassaemia major birth. Extensive awareness and screening procedure along with Special programme for the Thalassaemic Patients registered with the hospital/ health facility were arranged. This Pakhwada was observed within hospital / Polyclinic/ Dispensary/ Mohalla Clinic / Schools & nearby communities.
- 2. As policy matter all 10<sup>th</sup> Class students of Delhi & All pregnant women in the first trimester of pregnancy in Delhi are to be screened mandatorily for Thalassaemia actively apart from cases in family history of Thalassaemia, premarital, preconception screening etc.
- 3. It is mentionable that diagnostic (Hb electrophoresis test) & treatment facilities for Thalassemia major patients are available with GTB Hospital, Lok Nayak Hospital, Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya, BSA Hospital and DDU Hospital under GNCTD & Central Govt hospitals like AIIMS, Safdarjung H, Lady Harding, RML hospital & MCD hospital Hindu Rao, Kasturba Gandhi Hospital & NDMC Charak Palika Hospital . Remaining hospitals/ health facilities were instructed to refer suspect patient to these hospitals for the confimation of diagnosis of thalassemia trait after usual screening proceedures.
- 4. As per already circulated guidelines Screening is to be done through CBC (with RBCs Indices) and those with MCV< 80 fl and MCH <27 pg with raised RBC count in relation to HB% should be subjected to Hb electrophoresis testing.
- 5. All the hospitals providing diagnostic & treatment facilities as mentioned in para (3) above were instructed to ensure:
  - a) Free HPLC testing facilities on all working days for public & referred persons from other health facilities
  - b) Free Safe Blood transfusion facilities to all thalassaemia patients through Luco-depleted blood transfusion sets on all 7 days of the week including holidays.
  - c) Free regular supply of medicines for Iron Chelation to all thalassaemics
  - d) These above instructions should be well displayed outside Thalassemia care centre/ ward.
- 6. A unique Reporting Format has been evolved & got implemented through out Delhi . This Format not only capturs the data of thalaasaemia minor & major both but also acts as educating / informative and Monitoring tool also.
- 7. Though many distt and health facilities did not share the data of screened patients. However as per received data, In FY 2019-20:
  - a) 1.4 lakh pregnant mothers were screened for Thalassemia Minor
  - b) Around 5000 students were screened for thalassemia minor
  - c) School Principals & Nodal teachers of around 350 schools were sensitized on Thalassemia Prevention issues.
  - d) Around 250 awareness campaign were organized in different parts of Delhi including schools, health facilities, community etc

- e) In various hospitals around 2400 Thalassemia major patients are registered for which repeated instructions were issued for timely blood transfusion on all days including Sundays / holidays with leuco-depleted blood bags without donor and free supply of iron chelators to each patient
- 8. Trainings: All Distt Nodal Officers, all distt RCH nodals and heads of Gyne deptt of all health facilities under GNCTD, CGHS, ESI, MCD and others were given orientation trainings
- 9. 3 Review meetings cum training workshops were organized for dist nodal officers for strengthening the prog in Delhi State.

This branch is looking after dialysis services being provided on Public Private Partnership mode in GNCTD hospitals. The dialysis facility on PPP mode is being provided under the following Project and Programme:-

## I. PPP Dialysis Project, GNCT Delhi:

Its objective is to provide high quality haemodialysis services at low price to the entire populace of Delhi and free of cost to poor & identified patients. Under this project, the Dialysis Centres are functioning in three Delhi Govt. Hospitals on PPP mode with following number of dialysis machines:-

- 1. Lok Nayak Hospital 10 machines
- 2. Rajiv Gandhi Super Speciality Hospital 30 machines
- 3. Dr. Hedgewar Arogya Sansthan 20 machines

- 4. Deep Chand Bandhu Hospital 10 machines

## 6.30 PROJECT DIVISION

Achievement/ information / data of Projects Division, Directorate General of Health Services, Govt. of NCT of Delhi is as follows:

## 1. Free Non-Radiological Diagnostics:

Outsourcing of the OPD Laboratory Diagnostics (Non Radiological) from the Mohalla Clinics to the tertiary care level health institutions was initially proposed in 11.03.2016, while the IPD and the emergency services of the hospitals were to be augmented 24x7.

The approval by the Council of Ministers was accorded vide Cabinet Decision No: 2527 dated: 12-12-2017 and the concurrence of the Hon'ble LG was conveyed vide Office Order dated: 19-01-2018.

The Contract has been awarded to successful vendor and service of vendor has been initiated w.e.f. 01-01-2020.

## 2. Tele-radiology:

A feasibility study of the existing manpower and equipment status/ availability and future procurements was undertaken with respect to the proposal for Tele- radiology in Delhi Government Hospitals. The Tender Document is under processing.

## 3. Good Samaritan:

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India has issued guidelines for the protection of Good Samaritans in the WRIT PETITION (C) No. 235 of 2012 (Save life Foundation and Others Versus Union of India and Others). In this regard, the Cabinet has approved and concurrence of the Hon'ble LG obtained for the implementation of the scheme of rewarding Good Samaritans/Bystanders for offering help to Road Traffic Accident (RTA) victims to reach hospital for immediate medical attention.

The scheme has been implemented w.e.f. April 2018-19 by all health care service providers within the territorial jurisdiction of GNCTD. Good Samaritans/By Standers are being rewarded with Rs. 2000/-(Rupees Two Thousand) only, per victim as incentive and an Appreciation Certificate from GNCTD is also being issued for this generous act.

The implementation of the scheme of "Good Samaritan" by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi has been approved as a regular scheme vide Cabinet Decision No. 2752 dated: 03-10-2019 on the modalities as approved vide Cabinet Decision No. 2456 dated: 06-01-2017.

## 4. Training of Auto-Rickshaw Drivers on Adult First Aid:

A pilot training of auto-rickshaw drivers on adult First-Aid was conducted to study the financial implications on conducting further such trainings. The training was conducted by Max Institute of Health Education and Research (MIHER), S. Pushpinder Singh Memorial Trust in collaboration with DHS. The Department of Health & Family Welfare, GNCTD proposes to motivate, encourage and also facilitate the initiative of Good Samaritans and have identified that one of the effective ways to propagate, disseminate and popularize this concept would be through roping in the numerous three wheeler auto rickshaw drivers whose presence is found in every nook and corner of Delhi and one of the common modes of public transport. They are available and operational round the clock. They are also conversant with the geographical locations of various hospitals in the locality where they operate. Further, training of auto-rickshaw drivers would facilitate the presence of trained cadre of Good Samaritans under the Good Samaritan incentive scheme so that road Traffic victims are reached to hospitals for immediate medical attention and within the golden hour. The proposed scheme is under processing.

## 5. Health Helpline:

The Government intends setting up an inbound Medical Helpline for the convenience of the general public. This call center will function as a public 24X7 Toll- free helpline. Details of the project are being worked out.

## 6. Installation of Mobile Towers in institutions under H & FW, GNCT of Delhi:

The proposal for infrastructure development by installation of mobile towers in Delhi Government institutions for improving cellular communication services has been put up to Competent Authority for further necessary directions in the matter.

## 7. Aam Aadmi Dental Clinics:

Dental Cell has been established for implementation of Dental Health in Delhi in May 2019.

## 8. Pradhan Mantri Bharatiya Jan Aushadi Pariyojna (PMBJP):

The Government of India has rolled out the establishment of Generic Pharmacies under the banner of Pradhan Mantri Bharatiya Jan Aushadi Pariyojna (PMBJP).

This project was processed for seeking a policy decision in the matter as the Delhi Government was committed to ensure availability of 100% free drugs to the patients visiting Delhi Government Health Facilities for treatment. Currently, 03 hospitals have been directed to implement the scheme.

## 9. Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar:

Initially, it was directed that the Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar was to be outsourced to HLL Life Care Ltd on nomination basis along with five identified Delhi Government Hospitals. Proposal in this regard was sought from the said agency and processed. Relevant Cabinet Note was also prepared and submitted.

However, a fresh proposal was sought from HLL Life Care Ltd in July 2017; wherein, none was received with regard to Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar.

Fresh modality for establishing a Jan Aushadhi Generic Pharmacy at Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, Sarita Vihar, is under processing.

## 10. Hospital Information Management System (HIMS):

It has been communicated that a robust Hospital Information Management System (HIMS) is to be put in place at all Delhi Government Health Facilities with currently available state of the art technology.

Deployment of IT consultants has been processed in April 2019. Deployed IT Consultants started work on HIMS Project w.e.f. 29.04.2019 after issuance of work order. Coordination Committee and Core Committee have been constituted in May 2019 and August 2019 respectively.

The Industry Consultation has been conducted on 14-10-2019 wherein an open platform and opportunity was provided to all interested industry players to discuss, exchange view and provide valuable feedback & suggestions on the HIMS initiative.

The Study tour for Best Practices materialized in November 2019. Detailed Project Report has been submitted and Draft RFP is ready and under processing for approval.

# 11. Academic Programmes abroad for the in service Medical Professionals / Paramedical / Nursing Staff of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi.

A meeting was chaired on Outcome Budget 2018-19 by Hon'ble MOH on 19.02.2018 in the Conference room, 7th Floor, A-wing, Delhi Sachivalaya, in which the Hon'ble MOH has desired that a new head of account be created to facilitate and enable Academic Programmes abroad for the in service Medical Professionals/Paramedical/Nursing Staff of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi. It was also directed that initially an amount of Rs. 20 Crores may be sought under this proposed new Head of Account in BE 2018-19.

New Head of Budget has been created and funds amounting to 1000 lakhs have been approved and allocated to DGHS under (A) Major Head 2210 Medical Sector Sub Major Head 01 at serial no: 50 Training and Exchange Programme (Management Skills and Staff Skills) -06 003 89 00 13 OE in BE 2017-18.

A multidimensional committee of experts has been constituted for deliberating and submission of proposal for encompassing all aspects of the proposed scheme.

Proposal for Short Term Courses for MOs/ Specialists/ Nurses received from BAPIO and MoU is under consideration and Identification of courses/institutions is under process.

# Chapter 7

## **NATIONAL HEALTH PROGRAMMES**

#### 7.1 DELHI STATE HEALTH MISSION

National Rural Health Mission was launched on 13/04/2005 across the country. However, in line with National Rural Health Mission, Delhi State Health Mission was notified in October 2006.

On 15/05/2013 National Urban Health Mission was launched as a sub mission of National Health Mission with National Rural Health Mission being the other sub mission.

The implementation is done through State Health Society (Delhi) at the State level under the Chairmanship of Secretary Health and Family Welfare, GNCTD and 11 Integrated District Health Societies at the district level under the Chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner (Revenue).

State Program Management Unit and 11 District Program Management Units have been setup to implement these programs as per approval of the State Program Implementation Plan received from Govt. of India.

# 5. Infrastructure Maintenance

## REPRODUCTIVE, MATERNAL, NEWBORN, CHILD AND ADOLESCENT HEALTH:

Some Key Initiatives under RCH are as follows:

#### **MATERNAL HEALTH:**

**Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY):** The scheme aims to promote institutional delivery amongst BPL/SC/ST families. The pregnant women belonging to SC/ST/BPL category are incentivized for undergoing institutional delivery in urban and rural area with Rs. 600/- and 700/- respectively and BPL women is also incentivized with Rs. 500/- in case of home delivery.

#### Janani Shisu Suraksha Karyakram (JSSK):

The scheme was launched in Delhi State w.e.f. September 2011. The scheme aims to provide free and cashless service to all pregnant women irrespective of any caste or economical status including normal deliveries and caesarean operations, for antenatal & postnatal complications and to sick infants (from birth to 1 year of age) in all Government health institutions. The scheme aims to mitigate the burden of out of pocket expenses incurred by families of pregnant women and sick infants.

## Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matritva Abhiyan (PMSMA):

Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matritva Abhiyan envisages to improve the quality and coverage of Antenatal Care (ANC), Diagnostics and Counselling services as part of the Reproductive Maternal Neonatal Child and Adolescent Health (RMNCH+A) Strategy. It is being held on 9th of every month in all public health facilities of Delhi.

#### **Family Planning Activities:**

The State of Delhi has a population of over 20 million as per Census 2011. The salient achievements in terms of Family Planning services are a drop in the growth rate in last 10 years (**decadal growth rate from 47.02** to 20.96 & average annual expected growth rate from 3.93 to 1.92) and achievement of Total Fertility Rate of 1.6 (SRS 2016). The national goal of 2.1 was achieved in the year 2005.

#### **Routine Immunization:**

Including Mission Inderdhanush to improve immunization coverage in Delhi.

#### **Mission Flexi-pool**

## Operationalization of Ambulances:

Centralized Accident Trauma Services is being supported for operationalization of basic life support ambulance and Patient Transport Ambulances procured through DSHM as per National Health Mission norms.

As on date, 168 ambulances are functional.

#### Intensifed Pulse Polio Immunization Programme:

Delhi Govt. is implementing the rounds of INTENSIFIED PULSE POLIO IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME on the recommendations of Govt of India. Pulse polio round comprises of Booth Activity (NID / SNID) followed by five days of House to House search & immunize activity. For Booth Activity more than 7500 booths are created during each round throughout Delhi. During House to House activity about 46 lac households are visited by about 9400 teams (Each team comprising of 2 members) deployed for carrying out House to House Activity from about 400 Team Movement Points supported by more than 1750 Supervisors, during each round for vaccinating all children under five years of age. About 22-23 lac children are vaccinated during each round. Delhi had been polio free since 2009. India has been declared polio free by WHO on 27th March 2014.

## **National Iodine Deficiency Disorder Control Programme**

This involves surveillance of Iodization status in the community and Iodization of salt in Delhi.

#### **National Urban Health Mission**

**Coverage of unserved / underserved areas:** Almost all the unserved / underserved areas have been identified across the State. 60 Seed PUHCs have been set up under this initiative.

Health Management Information System (HMIS): Dedicated web portal for capturing all Public

health / indicator based information from the end source and generate reports /trends to assist in planning and monitoring activities. Data generated at facility level is captured on this web based portal on monthly basis. At present there Delhi Govt, MCD, CGHS & ESI, NDMC, Autonomous, NGO & other health facilities (dispensaries & hospitals) are reporting on HMIS on monthly basis. Excluding these facilities, some Private hospitals and nursing homes are also reporting on HMIS Portal. The performance of health care services is being utilized by various departments of State and GOI for monitoring and planning health policies and strategies.

**ASHA:** The health care delivery system is linked to the community with the help of Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs). At present, State has 6001 ASHAs (approx.) in place. These ASHAs have been trained in knowledge and skills required for mobilizing and facilitating the community members to avail health care services. They also provide the home based care for mothers and newborns, identify and help the sick individuals for prompt access of the available health services. They also help in field level implementation of National Health Programs, facilitate checkup of senior citizens. Certain State specific incentives have been added to the National list to provide better services and a sustainable package for ASHAs.

1. **Mobile Dental Clinic** Operationalization of 2 Mobile Dental Clinics & 4 Mobile Dental IEC Vans is being done by MAIDS to provide dental care in Primary Health Care facilities of vulnerable area with support of Delhi State Health Mission.

**Rogi Kalyan Samitis:** Rogi Kalyan Samiti (Hospital) is a simple, effective management structure registered under the Society Registration Act. It is facilitating and supporting structure for supplementing the management at hospital / dispensary. At present, 27 hospitals in Delhi have a registered Rogi Kalyan Samiti of which 26 are Delhi Govt. Hospitals and Swami Dayanand Hospital of East Delhi Municipal Corporation. Besides these, Rogi Kalyan Samiti are registered in 8 Maternity Homes of East Delhi Municipal Corporation

**Quality Assurance**: Five hospitals have been accredited at the State level as per compliance with **National Quality Assurance Standards (NQAS).** National level valuation of four hospitals is underway. Four hospitals have attained entry level NABH accreditation

## Communicable Disease Flexible Pool

**Integrated disease Surveillance program (IDSP)-** IDSP is a decentralized program intended to detect Early Warning Signals (EWS) of impending outbreak or epidemic prone diseases and help to initiate an effective response in a timely manner with State Surveillance Unit (SSU) at DHS and 11 District Surveillance Units DSUs) at present. 22 epidemic prone diseases and 5 state specific diseases are covered under IDSP and data is collected from various reporting units (DGDs/SPUHC/MCD dispensaries and Hospitals/ESIC/Railway/CGHS/Medical colleges/Private hospitals) in S, P & L formats and compiled & entered in IDSP portal on weekly basis.

**National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme (NVBDCP):** NVBDCP is for the prevention and control of vector borne diseases i.e. Malaria, Dengue, Chikungunya, Kala-azar, Japanese Encephalitis and Lymphatic Filariasis in India. 39 sentinel surveillance hospitals, blood banks and mother labs are strengthened to control VBDs

**National Leprosy Eradication Programme (NLEP):** There is a strong political commitment to further reduce the burden of leprosy. NLEP is ensuring availability of MDT Drugs through districts to all health care institutions Disability Care and Medical Rehabilitation including reconstructive surgeries (RCS)

**National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP)** (Er.Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme): Delhi has been implementing the NTEP with DOTS strategy since 1997. Delhi State NTEP was been merged with NRHM (DSHM) w.e.f. 01.04.2013. The Delhi State NTEP is being implemented through a decentralized flexible mode through 25 Chest Clinics equivalent to District TB Centre (DTC). Out of 25 Chest Clinics, MCD are running 12, GNCTD-10, NDMC -1, GoI-1and NGO-1 chest clinics respectively.

A Vision for TB Free Nation by 2025 with the goal of zero death and end the Global TB Epidemic.

# National Program for Control of Blindness (NPCB):

- Prevention of blindness by cataract surgery.
- Free spectacles for school going children and
- Prevention of diabetic retinopathy

# National Program for Healthcare of Elderly (NPHCE):

Under National Programme for Health care of elderly it is planned to open eleven Geriatric Clinics and Wards for Senior Citizens in eleven district hospitals to prioritize the preferential health care to elderly people

## National Tobacco Control Program(NTCP):

Under the mission the program is being implemented in two districts i.e. -New Delhi & East only .The main objectives are awareness/sensitization/training and enforcement of tobacco control acts-COTPA 2003 and Delhi Act 1996. The other activities are implementing Tobacco control in coordination with various dept like police, transport, food safety, education , industry and excise/VAT dept etc.to make Delhi tobacco free capital of India.

**National Mental Health Program (NMHP):** District mental health program is being implemented in 5 districts of Delhi by Institute of Human Behaviour and Allied Services (IHBAS).

**National Viral Hepatitis Control Program (NVHCP):** The program is being implemented since 2019-20. A model treatment Centre has been set up at Lok Nayak Hospital.

**Pradhan Mantri National Dialysis Programme (PMNDP):** 60 machines have been operationalized on PPP mode @ Rs. 1274/- per session. All BPL are provided free service.







#### **DENGUE:**

Dengue is one of the major vector borne disease, which is a self-limiting, acute mosquito transmitted disease and is characterized by fever, headache, muscle & joint pain, rashes, nausea and vomiting. Dengue is a viral disease and spread by *Aedes* mosquitoes. Some infections result in Dengue Hemorrhagic Fever (DHF) and in its severe form Dengue Shock Syndrome (DSS) can threaten the patient's life. Dengue virus has four serotypes. Dengue fever can be caused by any one of these four serotypes. Infection with one dengue serotype gives lifelong immunity to that particular serotype, but there is no cross-protection for other serotypes. One person can have dengue infection up to four times in his/her lifetime. Persons who were previously infected with one or more types of Dengue virus are assumed to be at higher risk for developing severity and complications, if infected again. The clinical presentation depends on age, immune status of the host and the virus strain.




#### **CHIKUNGUNYA**

Chikungunya is a mosquito-borne viral disease transmitted to human by infected mosquitoes. It causes fever and severe joint pain. Other symptoms include muscle pain, headache, nausea, fatigue and rash. Joint pain is often debilitating and can vary in duration. The disease shares some clinical signs with dengue and zika, and can be misdiagnosed in areas where they are common. There is no cure for the disease. Treatment is focused on relieving the symptoms.


#### **MALARIA**

#### **Community Awareness**

Three days "People movement" on a campaign mode program from 17th to 19th July 2019 has been organized, to engage with the community to create greater awareness on vector borne diseases and vector control measures. 272 ward-wise teams were constituted with 20-25 members comprising the officials from Municipal Corporation, Central Government and Govt. of NCT of Delhi. Each team took up activities in its ward over the three days from 9 AM to 12 PM. The teams incorporated field workers from MCD, NVBDCP, NCDC, NIMR.

#### Following activities were done ward-wise from 17th to 19th July 2019:

- Meeting with RWAs, School children, Social & religious leaders and sensitizing them on their role and responsibilities for prevention and control of mosquito breeding and motivate them for changed behavioral practices.
- Inspection & cleanliness drive of various types of containers /sites/rooftops supporting mosquito breeding at source
- Distribute the information, Education and Communication (IEC) material.
- Motivating the residents, RWAs and school children to sustain and spearhead the movement in their localities.
- Motivating the School administration to undertake activities in Schools around the theme of vector control/ personal protective measures.

- Involving corporate sector, wherever possible, to contribute to the community efforts through their CSR activities.
- State Surveillance team visited to Aruna Nagar (Majnu ka Teela) and Chandrwala area to create awareness regarding prevention and control of vector borne diseases in Delhi on dated 07.08.2019. Health talk given and pamphlets were distributed.
- 11 District surveillance teams also organized awareness campaign to create awareness regarding prevention and control of vector borne diseases in Delhi. Health talk given and pamphlets were distributed during awareness campaign. Various places under jurisdiction of districts were covered (Slum areas, underprivileged areas, School, Hospitals, RWAs, Market places, Dispensary, colonies, police station, Metro station, any other department and offices etc). Total 270 awareness campaign was done.

Students were advised to wear full clothing and use of mosquito repellent on uncovered body part, use of Bed net and weekly cleaning of coolers. They were also informed about possible mosquito breeding sites in their schools premises and houses.

Principal was informed to designate Nodal teacher in the school, who will looking after the vector control related activities in School and its premises. Teachers Teachers informed to sensitize students in Morning assembly.









#### Talk on News Channels

Dr. S.M. Raheja, ADGHS, Public Health participated as an expert panel in the News Channel on 25.04.2019 for on Malaria and other vector bone diseases (Youtube awareness generation https://youtu.be/GC\_dP54moF8). News channels broadcasted this message several times. He informed people about prevention, control and management of Malaria diseases. He also spoke about role of community as they can play an important role in containment of vector borne diseases (Malaria, Dengue, Chikungunya), community participation and empowerment is one of the most important elements of the prevention and control of vector borne diseases.

#### IEC & BCC ACTIVITIES (District level)

- District Surveillance Officers (IDSP) delivered health talk for Malaria prevention and control in their health facilities.
- Sensitisation activities were carried out at OPDs, registration counters etc for patients and staff.
- Awareness message regarding pre transmission preparedness was circulated among all doctors and staff.
- Pamphlets regarding do's and don'ts to prevent Malaria and other vector borne diseases were also circulated.
- Students were also sensitised regarding prevention and control of Malaria and other Vector Borne Diseases.

#### **National Dengue Day**

- On 16.05.2019, a team of PH-IV & IDSP consisting of Public Health Specialist, Epidemiologist and Pharmacist along with MCD official visited Educational Institutions for creating awareness about prevention and control of Dengue. The teaching staff, Students and support staff was informed about simple measures of dengue control. IEC materials in the form of hand bills were distributed to the school personnel. Assurance was given by school authorities that they will continue the prevention measures as routine during morning assemblies.
- Team of State and MCD officials has also visited health institutions for awareness generation at CGHS wellness. Team briefed them about daily Do's and Don'ts to be practiced for prevention and control of Dengue. Hand bills regarding IEC awareness about Dengue were given to wellness centre in charge, patients and support staff.
- Another team from State comprising of Entomologist, IDSP and Public Health Nurse, PH-IV visited Meer Dard Road Jhuggi/ scrap market and Servent Quarter, Railway Colony, Tilak Bridge to create awareness regarding prevention and control of VBDs. People made aware regarding potential mosquito breeding sites in their houses. Health talk was given and IEC material distributed. They have also been informed about DO's and DON'Ts.
- Community have been informed regarding health facilities available at their vicinity and free treatmet and diagnosis facilities can be avail from there.

#### **Awareness Activities at District Level**

• District Surveillance Officers (IDSP) delivered health talk for Dengue prevention and control.



- Advertisement regarding prevention and control of Vector Borne Diseases (Dengue, Chikungunya and Malaria) will be published in leading newspapers of English, Hindi, Urdu and Punjabi Languages from August 2019 onwards on weekly basis, in order to create awareness in the community.
- Pamphlets on prevention and control of vector borne disease (Dengue, Chikungunya and Malaria) are being distributed by State HQ to all the 11 Districts as per their requirement for further distribution at community level and at the OPD of ospitals/ Dispensaries for mass community awareness.

#### **Noval Coronavirus (N.Cov-2019)**

In the month of December WHO declared the recent Noval Corona Virus (nCoV-2019) epidemic affecting 23 countries as International Public Health Emergency of International concern. Approximately 11000 cases and approx 350 deaths have been reported till January.

Cases of pneumonia were being reported from Wuhan city, Hubei province in China. Chinese authorities had identified it to be caused by new type of Corona virus.

This virus belongs to large family of viruses with some causing less severe diseases such as common cold and other more severe diseases such as MERS and SARS.

The Health & Family Welfare Department had started preparedness activities for prevention and control of disease. It was recommended that State Surveillance Officer intensify the Surveillance system for acute respiratory infections and screening at community level as well as health facility level to identify and respond to clustering of cases for early detection of impending SARI outbreak through IDSP network.

#### **Activities Initiated by Delhi**

24x7 Control room for facilitating community regarding noval coronavirus 2019 established at DGHS (HQ) and at 11 Districts.

#### Task Force/Coordination Committee

- State Level coordination committee had been constituted under the Chairmanship of In-Charge PH-IV, with the members from Public Health, WHO, MCD, NDMC and DFW, to monitor ground level activities and for implementation strategy.
- Rapid Response Team (RRT) had been constituted/ updated at all 11 districts including District Project Officer (DPOs) from Disaster Management Department.
- District Level Task Force had been constituted in all 11 districts (South, Southeast, Southwest, West, Northeast, Central, North, Shahdara, New Delhi, Northwest) and meeting under the Chairmanship of DM had also been done by these 11 districts.

#### Surveillance

- Bureau of Immigration shared list of Passengers coming from 12 affected countries (China, Hongkong, Italy, Iran, Singapore, Thailand, Nepal, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, Japan, South korea) to State Surveillance unit and same was circulated to all the 11 districts. DSO and other health staff involved for field level surveillance for all asymptomatic cases for next 14 days.
- While screening at Airport, passengers with symptoms of fever and cough, were shifted to RML hospitals for hospitals isolation for next 14 days and sample testing for covid-19.
- All the Tourists who were coming from China and other affected countries and staying in different hotels of Delhi were screened by Deputy Health Officer of Concern MCD zone with the coordination of DSOs.

Daily data was shared by MHOs and compiled by State Surveillance Unit.

## Direction given to GMR

- o All staff dealing with de-boarding of passengers/Luggage need to be sensitized with nCoV-2020 and provided with PPE (mask and gloves).
- o Crew member of Airlines coming from China also screened and sensitized so that any suspected case may be identified within the Airline and must be isolated after deboarding.
- o Airlines coming from China should have separate air-bridges and passengers may be thermal screened at the time of de-boarding so that suspected case could not mixed up with normal passengers.
- o Ground services for environmental cleaning and disinfection at point of exit may be done as per protocol.
- o Staff working at airport must be aware of the appropriate action to manage ill passengers and provided with PPE. In case any crew member/staff developed any influenza like symptom may be taken seriously and may be referred to RML hospital.
- o There may be mechanism of safely transportation of ill travelers to designated hospitals, including the identification of ambulance services.
- All District Surveillance officers directed to send daily report of person monitored for nCoV-2019 in provided format. Following activities done at district level.
- ✓ Health talk/awareness session organized at dispensaries/health facilities to create community awareness.
- ✓ To maintain adequate stock of N95 mask and PPE kit at district level.
- ✓ Health Advisory must be circulated to all health facilities
- ✓ DO's and DON'Ts must be displayed at prominent place.
- All advisories and guidelines received from GoI regarding noval coronavirus was circulated to all concern departments for further dissemination.
- Advisory for general public in English and Hindi for nCoV-2019 was prepared and uploaded on DGHS website and published in leading newspapers in vernacular languages.
- Public notice with control no of all 11 districts was published in leading newspapers in vernacular languages on 11.02.2020.
- Communication done with all H1N1 designated hospitals for preparedness in view of isolation ward, PPE, N95 mask, designated Nodal officer, designated staff for tackling any situation to combat nCoV-2019.

## Preparedness of H1N1 designated Hospitals for COVID-19

- RML & Safdarjung hospital was designated as Nodal hospital for treatment and management of suspected cases of nCoV-2019. Dr. Amit suri and Dr. Nitesh Gupta designated as Nodal officers for the same.
- 25 (19 Govt. and 06 Pvt.) H1N1 designated hospitals directed to strengthen their isolation wards with all the necessary logistics and designated staff.

# **CHOLERA**


Cholera is an acute diarrhoeal infection caused by ingestion of food or water contaminated with the bacterium *Vibrio cholerae*. Cholera remains a global threat to public health and an indicator of inequity and lack of social development. Researchers have estimated that every year, there are roughly 1.3 to 4.0 million cases, and 21000 to 143000 deaths worldwide due to cholera.

Delhi has recorded 158 confirmed cases till (05.12.2018). Mostly cases are being reported from North (Azad Pur, Lal Bagh) & East district. The worst affected areas include unauthorised resettlement colonies with poor sanitation facilities and lack of safe drinking water. A multifaceted approach is key to control cholera, and to reduce deaths. A combination of surveillance, access to safe water, adequate sanitation and basic hygiene, social mobilisation and treatment is essential.

# **SEASONAL INFLUENZA (H1N1):**

H1N1 virus has now taken on the behaviour of a seasonal influenza virus, hence H1N1 influenza episode and seasonal influenza are to be treated on similar lines. Such cases occur round the year with peaks occurring generally during autumn and winters. Since there is no antigenic drift (mutation) of the virus from the one found during pandemic 2009-10, hence, the community has acquired herd immunity against this virus and the present influenza is behaving like seasonal influenza.

#### **CLINICAL PRESENTATION:**

The course of illness may vary. Severity varies from a febrile symptoms mimicking common cold to severe prostration without major respiratory signs and symptoms, especially in the elderly. Fever and systemic

symptoms typically last 3 days, occasionally 5-8 days, which gradually diminish. Cough may persist for more than 2 weeks. Second fevr spikes are rare. Full recovery may occasionally take several weeks longer, especially in the elderly. Usually symptoms are body ache, cough, running nose, head ache. Less commonly symptoms like diarrhoea, abdominal pain etc. may occur.

#### 7.3 REVISED NATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL PROGRAMME



# Performance of Delhi State RNTCP/NTEP upto 31-03-2020

- Tuberculosis is the most pressing health problem in our country as it traps people in a vicious cycle of poverty and disease, inhibiting the economic and social growth of the community at large. Tuberculosis still remains a major public health problem in Delhi. 40% of our population in Delhi is infected with TB germs and is vulnerable to the disease in case their body resistance is weakened.
- Delhi has been implementing the Revised National TB Control Programme with DOTS strategy since 1997. Delhi State RNTCP has been merged with NRHM (DSHM) w.e.f. 01.04.2013. The Delhi State RNTCP is being implemented through a decentralized flexible mode through 25 Chest Clinics equivalent to DTC. Out of 25 Chest Clinics, MCD are running 12, GNCTD-10, NDMC -1, GoI-1and NGO-1 chest clinics respectively. Delhi is the only state in the country where one NGO Ramakrishna

Mission, has been entrusted the responsibility to run the RNTCP in a district. The NGOs and Private Medical Practitioners are participating in the implementation of the RNTCP in a big way.

- RNTCP Delhi integration with Urban Health Mission involving multiple stakeholders (NDMC, MCD, NGO, GOI and Delhi. Govt.). Delhi Government dispensary DEO, MOs/ESIC MOs & ASHA workers have been trained in RNTCP at State level
- Framework of integration of RNTCP services with Mohalla Committees in the State is in place.
- The diagnosis and treatment for drug sensitive TB & drug resistance TB is provided free to the patients by all the partners under the RNTCP.
- TB Control Services for the homeless population in 200 Night Shelters. The night shelters staff are trained as Community DOT Provider, and for collection and transportation of sputum samples.
- Mobile TB Clinic for pavement dwellers/ homeless by NGO DTBA.
- Diabetic screening for all TB patients initiated at all the Chest Clinics in Delhi from January 2015.
- Counselling services by NGO's to promote adherence to MDR-TB
- Quality TB diagnosis for paediatric cases by upfront testing of presumptive TB cases among the homeless in 'Asha kiran'
- RNTCP Services in Tihar Jail is being initiated by posting TBHV and LT's.
- Intensified TB screening among the floating population Truck Drivers, slums/unauthorized colonies along with night shelters, pavement dwellers, prisons.
- Nutrition support & Counselling services to MDR TB patients by NGOs like UNION, RK Mission, DFIT, TB Alert, GLRA.
- The RNTCP has 192 diagnostic centres and 551 treatment centres located all over Delhi. LPA, Liquid Culture & Solid Culture facilities are available at 3 C&DST Labs to diagnose Drug Resistance TB. Implementation of DOTS Plus services for DRTB Patients is done through 4 Nodal DRTB Centres & 25 District DRTB Centres. 32 CBNAAT labs (GenXpert) in 25 Chest Clinics/Medical Colleges for Rapid TB Diagnosis are in place. The Rapid TB Diagnostic Services through CBNAAT are available free to the all the patients (Specially for paediatric group, HIV Positive patients & to diagnose Drug Resistance TB) besides Universal DST for all TB patients for initiation of therapy.
- Roll out of daily regimen across the State w.e.f. 1st Nov. 2017.
- Delhi has been the first State in the country to have full coverage with DOTS (WHO recommended treatment strategy for TB) since 1997 and with DOTS-PLUS (treatment schedule for Drug resistant TB) since 2008. Roll out of Baseline SLDST across the State w.e.f. Q2 2014. Expanded DST for 2nd Line drugs across the State w.e.f April, 2016. Pan State Roll out of Bedaquiline -new drug in MDR TB treatment in 2016.
- NIKSHAY is an online web based system for live reporting of TB patients for surveillance and monitoring under public & private sector.
- A Vision for TB Free Nation by 2025 with the goal of zero death and end the Global TB Epidemic.

## 7.4 NATIONAL PROGRAMME FOR CONTROL OF BLINDNESS AND VISUAL IMPAIRMENT (NPCBVI)

The nomenclature of the scheme is changed from 'National Programme for Control of Blindness' to 'National Programme for Control of Blindness and Visual Impairment'.

National Programme for Control of Blindness was launched in the year 1976 as a 100% Centrally Sponsored scheme with the goal to reduce the prevalence of blindness from 1.4% to 0.3%. As per Survey in 2001-02, prevalence of blindness is estimated to be 1.1%. Rapid Survey on Avoidable Blindness conducted under NPCB during 2006-07 showed reduction in the prevalence of blindness from 1.1% (2001-02) to 1% (2006-07). Various activities/initiatives undertaken during the Five Year Plans under NPCB are targeted towards achieving the goal of reducing the prevalence of blindness to 0.3% by the year 2020.

## Goals & Objectives of NPCB in the XII Plan

- To reduce the backlog of blindness through identification and treatment of blind at primary, secondary and tertiary levels based on assessment of the overall burden of visual impairment in the country.
- Develop and strengthen the strategy of NPCB for "Eye Health" and prevention of visual impairment; through provision of comprehensive eye care services and quality service delivery.
- Strengthening and upgradation of RIOs to become centre of excellence in various sub-specialities of ophthalmology
- Strengthening the existing and developing additional human resources and infrastructure facilities for providing high quality comprehensive Eye Care in all Districts of the country;
- To enhance community awareness on eye care and lay stress on preventive measures;
- Increase and expand research for prevention of blindness and visual impairment
- To secure participation of Voluntary Organizations/Private Practitioners in eye Care

#### Activities and Achievements

- 1. Coordination with Other Health Deptts like School Health Scheme, Mobile Health Scheme for organising screening camps in coordination with Partner NGOs, among school children awhich is an important component of NPCB and other underserved population.
- 2. Observation of Eye Donation fortnight in which Art and Writing Competitions were conducted among school children and general population. The winning entries and others were compiled to publish a Souvenir magazine– Jyotirmyay.
- 3. 66516 Cataract Surgeries were done, 2706 corneas were collected and 45252 school children were screened for refractive errors.
- 4. Diabetic retinopathy screening camps were conducted in collaboration with Shroff Eye Centre and a training and sensitisation on Trachoma for Medical Officers was organised at AIIMS.
- 5. MOU was signed with two NGOs for Cataract Surgery as per guidelines of the programme. Logistics supply in PHCs and District hospital strengthening has been initiated in 2019-20.

# Chapter 8

## **DIRECTORATE OF AYUSH**

Directorate of ISM & Homoeopathy was established in September 1996 and has ISM Wing functioning from A & U Tibbia College Campus and Homoeopathic Wing has been allotted separate budget head since September 2003. Govt. of NCT of Delhi is determined to encourage and develop these systems of medicine and make available these facilities to public. Govt. of NCT of Delhi encourages development of these systems of medicine by establishing Educational, Healthcare Research Institutions.

Directorate of ISM & Homeopathy was established in September 1996 and has ISM Wing functioning from A&U Tibbia Colege Campus and Homoeopathic Wing is functioning.

## **Functioning of the Directorate:**

Director, Dte. of AYUSH is assisted by technical personnel like Deputy Directors, Asstt. Directors, Licensing Authority (ISM) etc in each system of medicine. Presently, the Directorate of AYUSH is located at A&U Tibbia College Complex at Karol Bagh, New Delih-5 & Homoeopathic wing located at CSC-III, 1st Floor, B-Block, Preet Vihar, Delhi.

The Directorate is also conducting re-orientation training programmes in Ayurveda / Unani / Homoeopathy for practitioners and also gives grant-in-aid to Delhi Bhartiya Chikitsa Parishad, Board of Homoeopathy System of Medicine, Chaudhary Brahm Prakash Ayurvedic Charak Sansthan, Dilli Homoeopathic Anusandhana Parishad, Jamia Hamdard and Examining Body of paramedical courses which are the autonomous bodies under the Govt. of Delhi. The Directorate is also providing financial assistance to some NGOs working in the field of Ayurveda, Unani, yoga, and Homoeopathy etc. A Drug Control Department for Ayurveda and Unani Systems of medicine is also functioning at Headquarter of the Directorate and Drug Testing Laboratory of Ayurvedic, Unani & Homoeopathic medicines is likely to be established in near future. Survey Samples of Ayurvedic and Unani drugs are being tested by NABL accredited labs as per D&C Act 1940 and enforcement of DMR Act 1954 is also being done by the Directorate.

# **Chapter 9**

#### HOSPITALS OF GOVT. OF NATIONAL CAPITAL TERRITORY OF DELHI

The Hospitals are integral part of Health Care Delivery System of any State. Hospitals are expected to be the partners and supporters of Health Care Delivery System rather than limiting their role to medical care only. In the present scenario, the role of Hospitals range from providing Primary Level Medical Care to Hospital Care (Secondary / Tertiary Level).

The planning/ establishment of new Hospitals are taken care of by Hospital Cell / Planning Branch of the Directorate of Health Services. The broad functions of Hospital Cell involve planning and commissioning of Hospitals which include site inspection, monitoring and co-ordination with different Govt. Semi Govt. / Autonomous/ Pvt. Agencies etc. related to establishment of Hospitals. The financial aspect of these upcoming hospitals such as preparation of SFC Memo for cost estimates of Hospital which include estimates of manpower, equipments and other vital components required for establishment of Hospital are also being taken care of by Hospital Cell. Presently 38 Hospitals are functioning independently under overall administrative control of Department of Health & Family Welfare.

#### 4. AYURVEDIC & UNANI TIBBIA COLLEGE HOSPITAL

Tibbia was re-established into the new building at Karol Bagh by Masih-Ul-Mulk Hakim Ajmal Khan Saheb. The foundation stone of the Institute was laid by H.E. Lord Hardinge (the then Viceroy of India) on 29th March, 1916. This institution was inaugurated by Father of the Nation Mahatma Gandhi on 13th February 1921. Previously this college and allied units were managed by a board established under Tibbia College Act, 1952. This Act now has been repealed by a new Act known as Delhi Tibbia College (Take Over) Act, 1998 and enforced by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi w.e.f. 1st May, 1998.

The college is affiliated to the University of Delhi since 1973. It provides 4 ½ years regular course of study followed by one year internship leading to the award of the degree of Bachelor-of- Ayurvedic Medicine & Surgery (BAMS) and Bachelor-of-Unani Medicine & Surgery (BUMS). There are 28 Departments (14 Departments for each system) and a Hospital with 240 beds (functional) attached to the College to give practical training to the students.

The admission in BAMS & BUMS / M.D. (Ay.) & M.D. (Unani) are dealt by Faculty of Ayurveda & Unani Medicines, University of Delhi. The Post Graduate Course (M.D) in the subject of Kriya Sharir & Kayachikitsa of Ayurved Medicine and in the subject of Moalejat of Unani Medicine has been started from Academic Session 2002 with intake capacity of 3 students in each discipline.

The hospital is providing OPD services, round the clock emergency and casualty services, labour room, Nursery and Indoor facility in all basic clinical specialities. Rogi Kalyan Samiti has been established in Babu Jagjivan Ram Hospital w.e.f. 04-06-2010. The Hospital was established with 100 indoor beds Casualty Labour Room O.T. services, OPD path lab, X-Ray, Pharmacy Mortury etc. & was being run as a multispeciality secondary level Hospital. Subsequently the Hospital has been expanded to increase the bed strength from 100 to 150, USG facility, strengthening of Labour Room & wards setup of NICU & PICU in ward -2. Number of pharmacy counters increased from 3to 5 counters. Establishment of Fever Clinic waiting Area close to OPD & Labour Room, OPD Registration counters increased to 13, provision of seprate Registration Counter & pharmacy Counter for Children & Senior Citizens & Hospt. Staff, Establishment of separate Medical & Surgical Store.

Provisions of EWS patient to get treatment as well as necessary investigation for the Govt Empanelled private Hospital is also established & operational from Room No. 101.

OS-I counters for deaddiction of patients is also running.

The Hospital provides Accidents & Emergency Services, Flu Clinic OPD services, special clinic services. Diagonastic services (path Lab, Micro Biology Lab X-Ray). Therapeutic services, immunization services, Operation facilities, Maternity & Nurseryservices, Indoor services, Biomedical Waste Management Services, MRD, Mortury, Ayush (Ayurvedic, Homeopathy, Unani).

#### 8. CENTRAL JAIL HOSPITAL

Central Jail Hospital located in Tihar Jail Complex provides the medical care to the inmates of Tihar Jail in New Delhi, which is one of the largest prison complexes in the world. The complex comprises of seven prisons in the Tihar Complex with sanction capacity of 4000 prisoners and accommodates over twelve thousand prisoners. The hospital is having 270 beds, 150 in main hospital and 120 in De-Addiction Centre (DAC). DAC is ISO 9001-2008 certified unit.

The hospital has separate medical, surgical, tuberculosis and psychiatric wards. The hospital has an Integrated Counselling and Testing Centre (ICTC) for HIV, functioning in Central Jail Hospital functioning since June 10, 2008, a DOTS Centre for Tuberculosis treatment and also a Dental Unit. The hospital provides round the clock casualty services for the inmates. Pulse Polio Immunization Programmes are carried out regularly as per kept separately. Various NGO's are also working with Tihar Prison and contributing towards medical services.

# Major Achievements during the Year 2019-20

- 1. Active surveillance of the tuberculosis patients is being done in close assistance of the NDTB (New Delhi Tuberculosis Centre) Centre. This project was started for identification of asymptomatic T.B. patients by CBNAAT.
- 2. One ART centre is also being run with the assistance of NACO/DSACS. Screening of all the inmates for HIV started in all jails CJ-1 to CJ-10. - 4. Casualty: Old casualty has been marked exclusively for Psychiatry patients and addicted patients on withdrawal symptoms, while 06 bedded new casualty for non psychiatry patients has been made. All civil works have been finished and it has started functioning properly.
- 5. Physiotherapy services: Physiotherapy services started in CJ-1 to CJ-10 with posting of two physiotherapists from H & FW department. SRPM (NGO) is providing physiotherapy services in CJ-04.
- 6. Behavioral therapy ward: Bed strength of 20 bedded B.T. Wards has been increased to 40 beds.
- 7. Oral Substitution Therapy (OST) started in CJH. 15 patients at CJH are on OST.
- 8. Psychological First Aid Services: PFA is being run successfully with the help of counselors of NHFI. About 13000 inmates have been screened for presence of mental disorders.
- 9. Human Resources: Overall strength of Medical & Paramedical staff has improved with recruitment of residents and engagement of retired employees as consultant.

# 9. CHACHA NEHRU BAL CHIKITSALAYA

Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya (CNBC) is a 221 bedded Pediatric Superspeciality hospital, situated in Geeta Colony, Delhi- 110031, in existence since 2003, initially functional under direct administrative control of Delhi Govt. and thereafter converted into autonomous institute under Delhi Govt. since 03.10.2013.

Earlier, CNBC was an Associate Hospital of Maulana Azad Medical College (MAMC) and remained affiliated with MAMC up to 02.10.2013.

Since 03.10.2013, Chacha Nehru Bal Chikitsalaya became an autonomous institute under GNCT of Delhi and was registered under Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860, with Reg. No. District East/Society/730/2013.

After getting converted to an autonomous institute since October 2013, this hospital is being governed by a Governing Council, whose Chairman is the Chief Secretary of the Government of NCT of Delhi and Member Secretary is the Director of the hospital.

Chacha Nehru BAL Chikitsalaya was established in September 2003 and is now fully functional 221 bedded paediatric Super speciality hospital to provide preventive & curative services to children up to age of 12 years. CNBC caters patients not only from Delhi but also from U.P., Bihar, Haryana, and Punjab. Almost 30% patients visiting CNBC are from outside Delhi.

CNBC is first public hospital in India to get NABH accreditation in Feb 2009 and completed 4th cycle of reaccreditation in September 2018.

Chaudhary Brahm Prakash Ayurvedic Charak Sansthan, an ayurvedic teaching institute with 210 bedded hospital was established in 2009 in Khera Dabar in rural Najafagarh area for providing Ayurvedic treatment to the public. This prestigious institute is fully financed and controlled by the Health & Family Welfare Department, Govt. of Delhi, running as a society provides Ayurveda Health Services, Education and Research.

The institute is spread over 95 Acres of Eco-friendly & Huge Campus with total built up area of 47,150 Sq. Mtr. and 4 storyed building with basement in Hospital Complex. The institute has five lecture theatres and 01 seminar hall equipped with audio visual facility. Other amenities are separate boys and girls' hostel, Doctors Hostel, Central Library, Sports Ground, Canteen and Housing Complex.

The admission capacity of institute for Ayurvedacharya degree (graduate course-B.A.M.S.) is 100.

Emergency Lab provides 24 hours services throughout the year for all emergency investigations. The hospital has two Panchakarma Units one for male and another for female which are providing Special Ayurvedic Treatment to the Chronic Patients of Paralysis, Joint Disorders, Disc. Related Ailments, Migraine, Skin Disorders like Psoriasis, Eczema, Acne, Chronic Sinusitis etc. Kshar Sutra Unit is

providing specialty treatment to the patients of Anorectal Disorders like Hemorrhoids, Fistula & Fissures. Leech application unit is providing specialty treatment to the patients of DVT, Psoriasis, Diabetic Ulcers/Foot, Varicose Ulcers etc. Ambulance Facility with BLS and AC is available to transfer patients to other hospitals or meet any Exigency/Disaster Situation.

- 11. Renovation at the main casualty done with more space and additional 3 medical gas point for better management of sick patients attending Emergency department.

## 12. DELHI STATE CANCER INSTITUTE

Delhi State Cancer Institute, a Cancer Hospital with 100 sanctioned beds is situated in UCMS-GTBH Complex at Dilshad Garden in East Delhi Started on 5/04/2006 and 50 sanctioned beds in West C2/B, Janakpuri started on 13.03.2013.

First phase facilities at this Institute with OPD services, Chemotherapy and Linear Accelerator based Radiotherapy facility were formally inaugurated by the Hon' ble Chief Minister of Delhi on the 26th August 2006. The Institute has been making consistent progress in all its activities ever since its establishment. One hundred bedded in-patients facility consisting of General Wards, Semi-Private Wards, Private Wards and Deluxe Suites have been commissioned during FY 2010-11 alongwith the existing thirty-two bedded day care set up. All facilities including medicines are provided free to all the patients. While the OPD and all support services for all the patients are available from 7.00 AM to 5.00 PM on all working days the emergency services are available on round-the-clock basis.

The hospital has the latest technology Radiodiagnosis facilities with 128-slice CT Scanner with RT Simulation, Digital X-Ray, Digital Mammography, high-end Ultrasound with Breast Elastography and RFA. All these equipments are on PACS and LAN for online reporting and access. Ultra-modern, fully automated Lab

equipments for Hematology, Biochemistry, Immunoassay and Microbiology all connected through LAN for instant online reporting and access are available to provide necessary laboratory support.

This institution was donated to Govt. of NCT of Delhi on 1st October 1998. The medical college is having a 50 bedded attached hospital. This institution is situated in Nanak Pura, Moti Bagh, New Delhi and is built on a land measuring one acre and has 27,000 sq. ft. covered area on three floors. The institution is affiliated to Indraprastha University imparting Bachelor in Homoeopathic System of Medicine (BHMS) Degree Course of 5 ½ years with an admission capacity of 50 students every year. There is a common entrance test conducted every year by Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University. The hospital runs special Sunday Clinic for senior citizens.

The Foundation stone of Govind Ballabh Pant Hospital was laid in October 1961 and was commissioned by the Prime Minister Late Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru on 30th April 1964. From a very humble beginning with 229 beds, indoor admissions of 590 patients and Outdoor Department (OPD) attendance of 8522 in 1964-65, the hospital has gradually expanded over the years. Now this is a 758 bedded hospital. The hospital is a nationally recognized tertiary care institution for Cardiac, Neurological and Gastrointestinal Disorders. It offers specialized medical and surgical treatment.

It is one of the reputed centers for post-doctoral teaching and training and recognized for many path breaking researches. The Institution is recognized by Medical Council of India and University Grants Commission as an independent post graduate college affiliated to University of Delhi. The institution offers Post-Doctoral D.M. degrees in Cardiology, Neurology and Gastroenterology and M.Ch. degrees in Cardio thoracic Surgery, Neuro Surgery and Gastrointestinal Surgery. Students are also admitted in M.D. courses in the fields of Microbiology, Pathology, Psychiatry and Radio-Diagnosis-in-association with Maulana Azad Medical College - a sister institution. ## 18. GURU NANAK EYE CENTRE

Guru Nanak Eye Centre was conceived in 1971 with a view to provide best eye centre to residents of Delhi. The name of institution was adopted as GNEC with a view to maintain the teaching of Guru Nanak & initial support was provided by Gurudawara Prabandhak Committee Delhi. The Outpatient Department Block started functioning in 1977 and the Indoor Patients were kept in eye ward of LNJP Hospital. GNEC became administratively independent on 14th March 1986 with complete indoor facility. 184 bedded hospitals started functioning in small building.

Guru Nanak Eye Centre, presently a 212 bedded eye hospital is part of MAMC-LNH-GBPH- GNEC Complex. The hospital is attached to Maulana Azad Medical College. The Eye Centre, each year, imparts comprehensive training in Ophthalmology to post-graduates and undergraduates (as part of MBBS course) of Maulana Azad Medical College. The postgraduate training includes clinical, research and other academic activities. Besides, the centre also trains faculty members from other institutions coming for specialized training. A number of Ophthalmologists are trained under national programme for prevention of Cataract Blindness and the Centre gets a number of observers from all over the country and visitors from different parts of the world.

It provides comprehensive eye health care services to the public. The Eye Centre started functioning independently in 1985. The various services provided by the Centre includes OPD services, Indoor Services, Operation Theatre (24 hours) facilities, Emergency Services (24 hours), Speciality Clinics, Eye Banks, Community Eye Services through peripheral health center at Narela, Delhi and by being a referral centre of the Motia-Mukti-Bind Abhiyan Programme of Government of NCT of Delhi.

Guru Teg Bahadur Hospital is the prestigious and largest hospital situated in Dilshad Garden area of Trans-Yamuna (East Delhi) with 1512 sanctioned beds. The hospital started functioning in 1985 with 350 beds. The hospital is tertiary care teaching hospital associated with University College of Medical Science. The hospital serves as a training center for undergraduate and post-graduate medical students. The hospital also runs  $3\frac{1}{2}$  Years Diploma in Nursing and Midwifery course in its School of Nursing. The hospital provides round the clock Emergency Service in common clinical disciplines including Neurosurgery Facilities for road side accident and other trauma victims, Burn Care Facilities, Thalassemia Day Care Center, CT-Scan, Hemodialysis and Peritoneal Dialysis besides OPD/IPD services in broad basic specialties.

G.T.B. Hospital runs a fully equipped regional Blood Bank Centre which apart from fulfilling the needs of this area as a Blood Bank also has facilities for providing various fractionated blood components. OPD and IPD registration, Blood Sample Collection Centres, Admission and Enquiry, Lab. Investigation Services and Medical Record Data have already been computerized and integrated through LAN.

#### 20. INSTITUTE OF HUMAN BEHAVIOUR AND ALLIED SCIENCE

The Hospital for Mental Diseases (HMD), Shahdara, was established in 1966 in the Eastern outskirts of Delhi across the Yamuna River at a time when custodial care of mentally ill was order of the day. During this era, the society had lost hopes for recovery of such patients and kept them far away. It was a virtual dumping ground for society's unwanted people. There used to be inadequate facilities, paucity of trained staff and often ill-treatment to patients. The hospital was converted into a multidisciplinary institute under the Societies Act and registered as a Society by Supreme Court order in response to public interest litigation. Since its inception in 1993, it has served as a good example of how judicial intervention can bring about changes for the benefit of the patients. At present, it is functioning as an autonomous body with support from Central and Delhi Governments for its maintenance and developmental activities.

Institute of Human Behaviour & Allied Sciences (IHBAS) is a tertiary level Medical Institute deals in patient care, teaching and research activities in the field of Psychiatry and Neurological Sciences. The Institute is an autonomous body registered under the Societies Act 1860, funded jointly by Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India and Government of NCT of Delhi. This institute has hospital with 500 sanctioned beds with 336 functioning beds.

- Under DAK, surgeries and special investigations are being provided by RTRMH to Delhi residents in Pvt. Empanelled Hospitals.
- Regular CMEs are being organized.
- EWS scheme is available for free treatment and diagnostic services in private empanelled hospitals for eligible residents of Delhi.
- Good Samaritan scheme is functional in this hospital.
- For covid -19 services, flu corner and isolation ward have been started.

#### 32. SANJAY GANDHI MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Sanjay Gandhi Memorial Hospital situated in Mangolpuri Area of North-West Delhi was commissioned in April 1986 as one of the seven 100 bedded hospitals planned by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi during the 6th five year plan under Special component plan for Schedule Cast/Schedule Tribes. Later it was augmented to 300 beds in 2010.

The hospital now caters to the health needs of a population of 15-20 lakh residing in the JJ Clusters & Resettlement Colonies of Mangolpuri, Sultanpuri, Nangloi, Mundka & Budh Vihar etc. The hospital provides O.P.D. facility of all General Departments in forenoon and 24 hours services in Casualty, Laboratory and Radiological investigations, Delivery (Child Birth), Operation Theatres and Blood Bank Services.

#### 33. SARDAR VALLABH BHAI PATEL HOSPITAL

Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel Hospital, a 50 sanctioned bedded secondary level hospital is located in thickly populated colony of Patel Nagar (Part of West Delhi), surrounded by adjoining colonies of Baba Farid Puri, Rajasthan Colony, Prem Nagar, Baljeet Nagar, Ranjeet Nagar, Shadi Pur, Kathputli Colony, Regar Pura etc inhabited by large population of people belonging to Low and Middle Socio – economic status. About 7 – 8 lakhs of people fall in the catchment area of the hospital and are dependent on this hospital for their day-to-day health needs. Earlier this was an MCW Centre with MCD, which was taken over from MCD by Govt. of NCT of Delhi on 01.10.1996 by a special act passed through assembly.

The prime aim of the takeover was to upgrade this hospital to 50 bedded capacities so that it acts as a Secondary Level Health Care delivery outlet in the area. Its main objective is to provide minimum free basic health care services. This hospital is spread over 1.37 Acres of Land. The Hospital is three storey building divided into two wings spread on an area of 5339 Sq m with built up area of 2334 sqm.

## **CHAPTER 10**

## CENTRALISED ACCIDENT & TRAUMA SERVICES (CATS)

Centralised Accident & Trauma Services (CATS), an Autonomous Body of Govt. of NCT of Delhi is providing 24x7x 365 ambulance through toll free number "102" for accident & trauma victims, medical emergencies, transportation of pregnant women, delivery and post delivery (drop back at home), inter hospital transportation etc. CATS ambulances are equipped with trained ambulance manpower to deal with all kind of medical emergencies including on board deliveries.

## Major achievement of 01.04.2019 to 31.03.2020

- a) During this period 320590 service calls has been received in CATS Control Room and same was attended by CATS ambulances.
- b) Total 194528 patients have been shifted by CATS ambulances.
- c) To reduce the response time and also to provide medical aid in narrow street within shortest time, During the month of February 2019 CATS had launched a pilot project "First Responder Vehicle" (FRV) with 16 Motorcycle and trained ambulance manpower, in East Delhi (East, North East & Shahdara District.), total 7564 call has been attended by these First Responder Vehicles (FRVs).

## 9. **Directorate of Family Welfare**

Directorate of Family Welfare (DFW) is responsible for planning, Co-coordinating, monitoring, supervising and evaluating activities with other agencies of Delhi Government including NGO's in the following health care activities:

- 1. To facilitate provision of Antenatal and Natal and Post Natal services to pregnant women with an aim to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality.
- 2. Implementation of maternal health programs i.e. JSY, JSSK, PMSMA, LaQshya, SUMAN.
- 3. Essential new born care (at every 'delivery' point at time of birth) through NBCC.
- 4. Facility based sick newborn care (at FRUs & District Hospitals) through SNCU.
- 5. Home Based Newborn Care (HBNC) & Home Based Young Care (HBYC) & Programmes.
- 6. Promotion of Infant and Young Child Feeding Practices (IYCF) under Mother's Absolute Affection (MAA) Programme.
- 7. Management of Childhood Diarrhoeal Diseases.
- 8. Acute Respiratory Infections & Social Awareness and Action to Neutralise Pneumonia Successfully (SAANS) programme (to be launched).
- 9. Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC): KMC started in 21 units in the first instance and later will be extended to all delivery points.
- 10. District Early Interventions Centre (DEIC): To counter 4Ds (Defects, Deficiencies, Diseases, Developmental Delays & Disabilities), DEIC planned in 5 centres.
- 11. Nutritional Rehabilitation Centre (NRC): Establishment & Strengthening of NRC to take care of severely malnourished children (SAM).
- 12. Early Intervention Centre (EIC)/Centre of Excellence (CoE) :-2 EICs/CoE are in the process of establishment at LHMC and MAMC. MoU is in the process of signing.
- 13. Lactation Management Unit: is in the process of functioning. HR support from NHM is being processed in Supplementary PIP.
- 14. Provision of family planning services (Basket of Contraceptives, female/male sterilization, Counseling, follow-up, support & referral etc.).
- 15. Support ASHA in providing support to eligible couples through scheme likes Home Delivery of Contraceptive (HDC).
- 16. Implementation of UIP (Universal Immunization Program).
- 17. Surveillance of VPD (Vaccine Preventable Diseases) Services.
- 18. Prevention and control of the growing menace of Anemia, as public health problem especially among Adolescents, Test-Treat-Talk (T3) Anemia camps are being organized across schools & colleges of Delhi, as per the guidelines issued by MoHFW, GoI under Anemia Mukt Bharat, as a part of POSHAN Maah
- 19. Bi-annual rounds of Nation De-Worming Day (NDD) are being held in state as part of anemia prevention and control strategy among children and Adolescents.
- 20. "UDAAN" schemes has been rolled out with an aim to improve accessibility of adolescent girls (non-school going) to sanitary napkins and also make them more aware of Menstrual Hygiene Management.
- 21. Weekly Iron & Folic Acid Supplement (WIFS) program to ensure provision of a weekly prophylactic dose of IFA tablet to adolescent to prevent Anemia.
- 22. Implementation of PC & PNDT & MTP (Medical Termination of Pregnancy) Act.
- 23. Co-ordination and execution of IEC activities, campaigns through Mass Education Media.
- 24. Procurement of vaccines (through CPA), stocking, maintaining cold chain, disbursing vaccines and family welfare logistics to all health providing agencies in the state.
- 25. Capacity Building to update knowledge & skills of various categories of health functionaries by providing RMNCHA+N trainings by the H&FW Training Centre.

#### **Essential Immunization Program:**

Directorate of Family Welfare under its RCH Program Unit is engaged in delivery of immunization services through more than 600 health delivery points. The immunization program aims to protect the children against more than 12 diseases namely Tuberculosis, Poliomyelitis, Hepatitis-B, Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus, Hip related diseases (Meningitis, Pneumonia and Septicaemia), Measles, Mumps, Rubella and Typhoid as reported on HMIS portal by all public health facilities & some private facilities.

During 2019-20, Rota Virus Vaccine was introduced in the State in the month of July. About.4, 76,697(all three) doses of Rota Virus Vaccine were administered during the year. State Level VPD Surveillance Workshop was conducted for Surveillance of Vaccine Preventable Diseases followed by roll out of VPD surveillance in the State. IMI 2.0 was implemented for three months in the North east district.

During the Same year, Electronic Vaccine Intelligence Network (eVIN) was implemented successfully in the State. eVIN offers innovative use of technology for temperature monitoring, system strengthening, improving program Governance and real time visibility of vaccine data.

#### 1. Child Health:

Child Health is one of the important component of RCH Programme. The State is making concerted efforts to reduce Mortality and Morbidity among children. Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) of Delhi has shown decline from 24 to 13 (SRS 2018).

The **aim** of the State is to reduce Neonatal Mortality Rate (NMR), Infant Mortality Rate to single digit. To reduce Neonatal Mortality Rate, State has improved Newborn Care Facilities by establishing Special Newborn Care Units (SNCUs), and New Born Care Corners (NBCCs).

**Specialized Newborn Care Unit (SNCUs)** have been established in 16 Public Hospitals which provide intensive care & resuscitative to the babies who are sick & small newborns care.

**New Born Care Corners (NBCCs)** at all 61 delivery points within the labour room and OTs in the State ensuring essential New born care at all the delivery points.

**Nutritional Rehabilitation Center (NRC)**- Establishment & Strengthening of Nutritional Rehabilitation Centre (NRC) in 02 hospitals to take care of severely malnourished children (SAM). NRCs are facility based units providing medical and nutritional care to SAM Children under 5 years who have medical complications. Also skills of mother on child care and feeding practices are improved so that child receives care at home.

**Home Based Newborn care (HBNC)-** State is organizing Home Based New Born Care by upgrading the skills of ASHAs in New born care and timely referral. Home based Newborn Care is care for every newborn through a series of home visits by ASHAs. During her visits, she identifies, detects illnesses & provides special care to the Newborn and timely and prompt referral. So linking HBNC to FBNC is important in order to save Newborn lives.

**Intensified Diarrhoea Control Fortnight (IDCF)-** observed from 1st -15th July, 2020 & 16th -31st July, 2020 across the State to sensitize and bring awareness among the masses. **515736** no. of children provided with ORS. **12852** no. of children with diarrhea provided Zinc for 14 days. To reduce Post neonatal mortality rate and Infant mortality rate, ARI and Diarrhoea sensitization trainings were conducted in Districts for awareness generation among the heath care providers.

**Mother Absolute Affection Programme (MAA)-** MAA focus mainly on awareness campaign to improve the breastfeeding indicators, at all 61 delivery points.

**Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC):**-\_Kangaroo mother care has been started in 21 Units (16 SNCUs & 5 Medical Colleges) in the first instance in the first phase and will further be extended to all delivery points.

CDR launched in Delhi to find out the gaps in child health delivery mechanisms and taking corrective actions.

#### New Activities Started in the year 2019-2020

**Newborn Screening:**- Comprehensive Newborn Screening Programme is aimed at holistic evaluation of all newborns at various institutions in the Delhi State. The aim will be to cover at least 1.5 lakhs births per year.

## **Planned Activities**

**District Early Interventions Centres (DEIC)** :-\_To counter 4 Ds (Defects, Deficiencies, Diseases, Developmental Delays & Disabilities) DEIC is planned in 4 centers in the first instance.

**SNCU:**- 30 Bedded SNCU to be established at LHMC.

**Model Early Intervention Centre/CoE**:- Model Early Intervention Centre to be established at Lady Hardinge Medical College(LHMC) & Maulana Azad Medical College(MAMC).

**Lactation Management Unit (LMU)**:- Establishment of LMU at Ram Manohar Lohia (RML) hospital is under process. State has planned to establish second Lactation Management Unit at AIIMS.

**Strengthening of Public Sector Nurseries:-** To Strengthen the SNCU portal State has planned to strengthen the Public Sector Nurseries to report on SNCU Software.

## 2. Family Planning:

Delhi has a population of 1.67 crores as per Census 2011. The salient achievements in terms of Family Planning services are a drop in the growth rate in last 10 years (decadal growth rate from 47.02 to 20.96) and achievement of Total Fertility Rate of 1.5 (SRS) 2018. The national goal of 2.1 was achieved in the year 2005.

As the scope and impact of Family Planning program is much beyond population control or stabilization, it is a robustly planned and implemented program. Further, the program has had to take up fresh strategies to salvage the needs of eligible couples from being unmet due to COVID situation.

#### **Family Planning Services:**

In terms of FP services, plethora of services are provided through primary, secondary and tertiary care facilities. The details and performance figures (2019-20) are submitted in Table below.

## **Temporary methods:**

Condoms, Oral pills (2 types) and IUCD (2 types) and Injectable contraception services are provided at all health facilities and are available to the masses at nearest dispensaries. Besides, pills for emergency use in contraceptive accidents (ECP) are also available. Special emphasis is laid to fulfil contraceptive needs of postpartum and Post abortion women.

#### Limiting methods of Contraception:

Delhi Provides high quality sterilization services through hospitals of different agencies (Delhi Govt., MCD, NDMC, CGHS, ESI, NGOs and accredited private facilities). The Revised compensation scheme is followed for incentivizing the beneficiaries through PFMS portal. Adverse events following sterilization services are covered through Family Planning Indemnity Scheme (FPIS).

## 4. Adolescent Health:

Delhi has an adolescent Population of nearly 35.0 Lac which is nearly 21% of its entire population. This represents a huge opportunity that can transform the social and economic fortunes of the State if substantial investments in their education, health and development are made.

As a part of strategy to address the Health & Development needs of adolescents a strategy in the form of Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK) has been adopted in Delhi. RKSK is a strategy based on a continuum of care for adolescent health & development needs, including the provision of information, commodities and services through various Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics (AFHCs) and also at the community level. It aims to provide an amalgamation of Preventive, Promotive, Curative, Counseling & Referral services to the adolescents.

#### Weekly Iron & Folic Acid Supplementation (WIFS) Program

WIFS Program is being implemented through Govt. / Govt. aided Schools under the Directorate of Education as well as through Anganwadi Centres under the Deptt. of Women & Child Development in Delhi wherein IFA supplement in the form of "BLUE" tablet is administered to adolescent girls & boys on each Wednesday throughout the year with alternative day of administration as Thursday.

# The overall compliance of beneficiaries under Delhi WIFS Program reported from F.Y. 2015-16 to 2019-20 can be seen below:

## National De-worming Day, February 2019

As a part of Anemia prevention and control strategy among the children and adolescents, both male and female, school going and out of school, with an aim to intensify efforts towards reducing the prevalence of Soil Transmitted Helminths (STH), National De-worming Day was conducted across the State through schools (both public & private) and anganwadi centres. The campaign involved administration of Albendezole to all children & adolescents (3-19 years of age).

## **Celebration of Adolescent Health Day**:

Activities to increase awareness about adolescent health & development issues and to dispel various myths and misconceptions regarding various issues particularly related to Nutrition, Mental Health, Sexual & Reproductive Health and Menstruation etc. apart from various important adolescent issues plaguing the State in particular Menstrual Hygiene, Substance Misuse, Teenage Pregnancy besides the increasingly relevant issue of Anemia and malnutrition were undertaken.

# The activity was conducted at 100 venues - DISHA Clinics & outreach venues including Anganwadi Centres across Delhi.

#### Menstrual Hygiene Scheme:

Scheme to ensure easy accessibility of the products to manage menstruation in a healthier manner at a subsidized cost of Rs. Six (for a pack of six sanitary napkins per month) to all non school was rolled out on 3rd April, 2019. The scheme also involves educating all adolescent girls about the ways to manage menstruation in a healthier manner and to dispel various taboos, myths and misconception related to menstruation safe besides making them aware about the environment friendly disposal of sanitary napkins after use. All preparations including the procurement of sanitary napkins, supply of the same to all Districts and allocation of funds to carry out awareness generation and educational activities has already been completed. The scheme has been christened as "UDAAN". Number of sanitary napkin packs provided to adolescent girls during 2019-20 are 2, 92,336.

#### **Anemia Mukt Bharat:**

As a part of prevention and control of the growing menace of Anemia as public health problem especially among Adolescents as per the guidelines issued by MoHFW, GoI under Anemia Mukt Bharat, Test-Treat-Talk(T3) Anemia camps were held across Delhi as a part of POSHAN Maah Sept-Oct,2019. A total of 63 camps in schools, screening 15,115 adolescent besides 30 camps in college, screening 6,313 held.

## 5. Maternal Health:

#### Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY) Program:

It is a centrally sponsored scheme. The scheme aims to promote institutional delivery amongst Pregnant women (PW) belonging to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe & BPL families. PW are incentivized for undergoing institutional delivery in urban and rural area @Rs. 600/- and 700/- respectively and BPL women is also incentivized with Rs. 500/- in case of home delivery.

The Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) is an effective link between the Govt. health facility and the pregnant women to facilitate in implementation of this program and she is also incentivized for facilitating the scheme in her allocated area.

The scheme is being implemented in all 11 districts of Delhi w.e.f. 2006.

All the health facilities enroll the eligible JSY beneficiaries i.e. PW belonging to SC/ ST/ BPL families during Antenatal clinics and then register them on RCH Portal and fetch the Aadhar linked Bank Account details of the client and necessary documents and she is given the JSY payment after delivery.

# The mode of payment is Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) into the account of beneficiary via PFMS Portal.

#### Janani Shishu Suraksha Karyakram (JSSK):

The scheme was launched in Delhi State w.e.f. September 2011. This is a centrally sponsored scheme. The scheme aims to provide free and cashless service to all pregnant women reporting in all Government health institutions irrespective of any caste or economic status for normal deliveries and caesarean operations, for antenatal & postnatal complications and to sick infants (from birth to 1 year of age).

The scheme aims to mitigate the burden of out of pocket expenses incurred by families of pregnant women and sick infants. Under the scheme no cash benefit is directly provided to beneficiary. Only the health facilities / delivery points are provided fund under JSSK to enable them to provide free services to pregnant

women and sick infants to fill the gap demand under various subheads i.e. Diet, Drugs and Consumables, Diagnostics, Blood Transfusion, Transport & User Charges levied by the facility, if any.

It is an integral component of Maternal Health Intervention as a part of National Health Mission (NHM).

## **Maternal Death Surveillance and Response:**

Maternal deaths occurring in state are reviewed at facility, district and State level so that gaps are identified and corrective actions are taken to prevent future deaths. Most maternal deaths are reported from Medical

Colleges Hospitals and high case load delivery points. Nearly 39% maternal deaths reported belong to neighboring state.

During 2019-20, total 603 Maternal Deaths were reported. Out of these reported Maternal Deaths, 598 reported at health facilities, 2 at home and 3 in-transits.

#### 12. DELHI STATE AIDS CONTROL SOCIETY

#### INTRODUCTION

Delhi State AIDS Control Society, a society formed by Delhi Government, implements the National AIDS Control Programme, a centrally sponsored programme in Delhi. The society became functional on 1st November, 1998. The main objectives of the society are to prevent and control HIV transmission in Delhi and to strengthen state capacity to respond to long-term challenges posed by the epidemic. The society implements various activities under National AIDS Control Programme through various Govt. departments/institutes/ hospitals and Non-Government organizations in Delhi.

The services under the National AIDS Control Programme provided through various health facilities in Delhi are depicted in Table 1.

# BASIC SERVICES DIVISION:

Basic Services Division provides HIV Counseling and testing services for HIV infection, and awareness, prevention, Presumptive/syndromic management of the existing sexually transmitted infections/reproductive tract infections.

#### **HIV Counseling and Testing Services:**

HIV Counseling and testing services is critical first step in detecting and linking People with HIV (PLHIV) to access treatment cascade and care. The goal of these services is to identify as many people living with HIV, as early as possible (after acquiring the HIV infection), and linking them appropriately and in a timely manner to prevention, care and treatment services. Integrated Counseling and Testing Centers (ICTCs) under Basic Services Division provide the following services:

- i. Counselling and Testing of clients and linkage of detected positives to ART Centres
- ii. Prevention of Parent-To-Child Transmission of HIV (PPTCT) and Elimination of Mother-To-Child Transmission of Syphilis (EMTCT) and Early Infant Diagnosis

#### iii. HIV/Tuberculosis collaborative activities

As on 31/3/2020, 90 Stand Alone ICTCs (including one mobile ICTC), 420 Govt. FICTCs and 342 Private sector FICTCs were functioning in Delhi.

#### Early Infant Diagnosis (EID):

HIV exposed infants born to infected pregnant women have to undergo DNA-PCR tests using dried blood spot and whole blood specimen at 6 weeks, 6 months, 12 months and 18 months. All babies born to born to infected pregnant women are given ARV prophylaxis. The test at 6 months is done using dried blood spot blood sample through DNA PCR Lab at AIIMS, Delhi. Antibody detection test of the babies over 6 months is carried out and those found reactive are confirmed through DBS- DNA PCR test.

The performance of the Basic Services Division in regard HIV testing, HIV-TB cross-referrals and STI-ICTC cross referrals is depicted in Table 2. There has been around 104% achievements in General Client testing, 105% achievement in ANC clients in 2019-20.

# **Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Component:**

The objective of the component of Basic / Preventive services is to prevent new HIV infections by prevention, presumptive / syndromic management of the existing STI amongst the general and high risk patients through awareness generation, counseling for STI & HIV, VDRL / RPR testing of potential clients for early detection of Syphilis. Syndromic management of STI cases, supply medicine kits for syndromic management to DSRCs and TIs, suitable linkages to prevent further infections and counseling & testing of pregnant women for Syphilis. The medicines for treatment of sexually transmitted infections are procured by NACO and supplied to health facilities (to DSRC and TIs) through DSACS.

## LABORATORY SERVICES DIVISION:

The activities carried out by the Lab Services division include:

- HIV testing services
- External Quality Assurance Scheme(EQAS) in HIV testing
- CD4 testing services
- Viral load testing services
- NABL Accreditation of Reference Laboratories & STI laboratories (QA)
- Conduction of Trainings and workshops

# External Quality Assurance Scheme (EQAS):

• 88 standalone ICTC, 1 Mobile van and 3 FICTC centers are linked to four State Reference Laboratories in Departments of Microbiology of 4 Medical Colleges of Delhi viz. Maulana Azad Medical College, Lady Hardinge Medical College, Safdarjung Hospital and University College of Medical Sciences & Guru Teg Bahadur Hospital under External Quality Assurance Scheme (EQAS) program. Beside,2 National Reference Laboratories are functioning in Departments of Microbiology at National Centre for Disease Control and All India Institute of Medical Sciences.

- As part of External Quality Assurance Scheme, State Reference Laboratories send coded samples (panels) to the linked ICTC/PPTCTCs for testing twice in a year and these centres report the result to the SRL within seven days of receiving the coded samples, to check the level of concordance.
- Since 2010, all SRLs have regularly conducted EQAS Activities for their linked centers. All linked ICTC/PPTCT Centers have reported with more than 90% participation in quarterly Re-testing and Biannual proficiency panel testing activities to assure quality in HIV testing. The participation of SRLs and NRLs of Delhi has been 100% to their linked NRLs and APEX laboratory at NARI respectively under National EQAS program during 2019-20. The Linked ICTC/PPTCT centres participate in EQAS with their linked SRLs to cross check HIV test results by sending 20% of Positive and 5% of Negative samples tested in the first seven days of the month.
- The participation in the EQAS scheme during 2019-20 of the centers in the Quarter1, Quarter2, Quarter3 and Quarter 4 was 98.91%, 100%, 100% and 98.91% respectively by ICTC/PPTCTs and mobile van in retesting activities with 100% concordance amongst total 92 centres participating in the activity.
- At present CD4 testing is being done at 8 centres (7 ART Centres viz. AIIMS, BSAH, DDUH, GTBH, MAMC-LNH, RMLH, SJH and at NCDC). During the year 53865 number of CD4 tests were carried out under the programme.
- During the year, inhouse Viral Load Testing services were available at the designated functional centres at IHBAS and AIIMS laboratories. Viral load testing for ART centres except AIIMS and GTBH ART centres have been outsourced through Metropolis by NACO. A total of 16146 Viral Load tests of ART patients have been conducted till 31/3/2020.




Figure 1: Quarterly EQAS retesting participation of ICTC/PPTCT Centers from April 19 - March 2020.

# TARGETED INTERVENTION (TI) DIVISION

As on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020, Delhi State AIDS Control Society (DSACS) was implementing 77 Targeted Intervention (TI) Projects in partnership with Non Government Organizations (NGOs) and Community Based Organizations (CBOs) amongst High Risk Group (HRGs). TI is a peer led intervention wherein services like regular outreach and behavior change communication, STI treatment and management, free condom distribution to High Risk Groups, counseling, provision of clean needle and syringes, abscess management, Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST) for IDUs and other services like HIV testing and ART through referral and linkages are provided at their doorsteps.

#### **Virtual Intervention**

Delhi State AIDS Control Society (DSACS) has designed and implemented a virtual intervention for FWS, MSM and TGs to address this challenge and reach less visible and harder to reach high risk populations (FSW/MSM/TG) that are using the internet/mobile apps to ensure the prevention and control of HIV epidemic. This virtual intervention is an innovative web based communication strategy which aims to identify and link the virtual network based KPs with the service provisions. The intervention was piloted during 2019-20 and implemented in 2020-21.

#### The specific objectives of virtual intervention are as follow:

- To identify unidentified KPs including those active on virtual networks and social media platforms and to link them with virtual intervention for service provision.
- To enhance the coverage of HIV testing and treatment services.
- To provide contextually-relevant information virtually to the KP communities based on their sexual practices, identities and HIV status.

The Virtual intervention comprise of interactive web portals managed by the Community and TI team. The interactive web portal allows the KPs to create own user ID/ password, log in to the portal to seek services and book appointments anywhere in any TI Project in Delhi at their convenient day and time. The virtual intervention has adopted an Online to Offline service delivery model. A four pronged implementation strategy as outlined below has been adopted to promote the online community to seek anonymous and confidential HIV services that meet their needs as under:

- **a. Virtual Drop in Centre (VDIC):** VDIC is a web based communication strategy to reach to the virtual population. Web pages have been designed for providing online counseling/chatting facility to the KPs to address their questions related to HIV. Features of this VDIC web application include:
  - Risk Calculator
  - Online counseling
  - Service points locator
  - Appointment system for HIV services
  - Order free condoms
  - Online outreach and events / Campaign
  - HIV information messages / Video
- **b. Promotion of Virtual DIC**: TIs are promoting the web portal services on various social media platforms, such as Whatsapp groups and mobile dating apps identified through virtual mapping to reach out to the key population available on such platforms.
- **c. Online Outreach:** Online outreach workers, volunteers and Digital communication officer reach out to individual HRG on social media platforms such as Whatsapp, dating apps, and messenger apps to provide information on HIV/AIDS and motivating them to seek services through Virtual DIC.
- **d. Service Provision:** The HIV services facilities like existing DIC of FSW/MSM/TG TIs, ICTC, DSRC and ART centers of Delhi have been linked with virtual web application platform through features like HIV service locators, book appointment, order free condom and online counseling and instant messaging

- application like Chatting. The community can book appointment to seek anonymous and confidential HIV testing, counseling and treatment services as per their choice at any facility in Delhi.
- e. Monitoring and Evaluation: A dash board has been developed at the website which gives the information about the KPs registrations and took appointment for seeking services. Referral data base and service uptake by the client is also available for monitoring the activities of the virtual intervention Through the virtual intervention 1441 HRGs have been reached out of which 581 have availed clinical services and 10 were diagnosed with STI. 662 underwent syphilis screening and 761 were screened for HIV. Out of 761 18 were detected HIV positive and all were linked to ART.

#### CARE, SUPPORT AND TREATMENT DIVISION:

Care, Support & Treatment division of Delhi SACS is entrusted with the responsibility of providing Antiretroviral treatment services to PLHIVs through 12 ART Centres, 1 Centre of Excellence and 1 Pediatric Center of Excellence. Two of the ART centres at AIIMS & RML are ART plus centre where second line treatment is also provided. 5 Care Support Centers are being run by NGOs under Vihaan project in various districts for providing support services to the PLHIVs.

A total of 72124 PLHIVs have been cumulatively registered at all its ART Centers since inception. As on 31st March 2020 and 33376 PLHIVs are on regular antiretroviral treatment. The performance of the CST division/ART Centres is depicted in Table 10 and 11.



#### **BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES DIVISION**





IEC & Mainstreaming division is entrusted with the responsible for carrying out various IEC activities and coordinating with other government departments, private sector etc. for welfare of PLHIV and mainstreaming the HIV control activities.

- x. Training of 288 ANMs all over Delhi were conducted and clubbed with Saksham Trainings being conducted by NACO nationwide.
- xi. HIV & AIDS awareness, legal aid and Aadhaar Camps were organized in Sultanpuri, Shakurpur basti and Timarpur areas in coordination with Delhi State Legal Service Authority (DSLSA), TPDDL and DAV Welfare Society.

# 'Financial Assistance Scheme for people living with HIV/AIDS & Children/ Orphan/ Destitute Children infected/affected by HIV/AIDS:

Main objective of this Financial Assistance Scheme of Govt. of NCT of Delhi is to improve compliance & access to Anti-Retroviral Treatment. Financial aid is provided to eligible PLHIV of Delhi to cover the cost of transportation for accessing Anti-Retroviral Treatment Centers thus helping achieving the requisite level of drug adherence, preventing emergence of drug resistance and obviating the need for costly second line treatment & improving nutritional status and physical capacity of the person to earn livelihood, help orphan children in accessing Anti-Retroviral Treatment, treatment of other infections that they are at risk, nutritional support, education and skill building.

The budget for the scheme is released by Government of NCT of Delhi as Grant in Aid to DSACS. Vide cabinet decision number 2606, financial assistance to the beneficiaries under the scheme was doubled w.e.f. 7/8/2018. Also a provision was made that "in future this amount will be increased annually by indexation to inflation capped at 5% per annum" on existing amount of assistance w.e.f. 7/8/2019. The assistance was increased by 5% per annum to all the eligible beneficiaries w.e.f. 7/8/2019.

The payment to the beneficiaries is released subjected to their regular treatment from the centres and is disbursed on Aadhaar Based Direct Benefit Transfer through Public Finance Management System.

The performance of the scheme and grants received/disbursed is depicted in Table 14-16 below:

- 1. The Department has taken step to strengthen and modernize the Drug Testing Laboratory located at Lawrence Road, Delhi to conform the international standards and NABL accreditation. The project is being undertaken by PWD for renovation of the building.
- 2. The Department has taken step to renovate the space provided for Drugs Control Department, at F-17, Karkardooma, Delhi.
- 3. The Department has adopted zero tolerance towards pharmaceutical drug abuse and taking stringent action against defaulters. The Department had already cancelled licenses of medical Stores, who were found indulging in unethical stocking / selling habit forming drugs.

#### **CHAPTER 14**

#### **DEPARTMENT OF FOOD SAFETY**

The Department of Food Safety is a regulatory Department whose basic mandate is to make available safe and wholesome food to the citizens of Delhi. For the purpose, the Department endeavors to bring the Food Business Operators (FBOs) within the regulatory framework of Food Safety & Standards Act, 2006 by way of granting them registration/license. In order to minimize the interface between its officer and the FBOs, the Department has introduced online system of Registration and Licensing. It has also established a 'Facilitation Centre' in the heart of the city at 8th Floor, Mayur Bhawan, Connaught Place, New Delhi to facilitate online filing of applications.

# **Awareness Programme**

The Department Food Safety, Govt. of Delhi has organized several Awareness Programme in each of 11 revenue districts fo NCT of Delhi by coordinating with the Market Associations of the respective areas since July, 2018. The essential components of the awareness programmes were as follows:

- 1. Licensing & Registration.
- 2. Food Safety, Hygine & Sanitary practices.
- 3. Lebeling & packaging of packaged commodities of articles of Food.

The audience mainly consisted of the members of the trade associations like retailers, wholesalers, restaurants, manufactures etc. Who were educated about the essential and mandatory requirements of Food Safety and Standard Act,2006 and FSS Rules / Regulations, 2011.

## **Registration Camps**

In order to achieve the regulatory compliance by the FBOs Department of Food Safety in collaboration with several trade unions organized Registration camps wherein FSSAI Registration was granted to the FBOs running their business without a valid food safety license /registration.

During the current year 2019-20, 10808 licenses and 23864 registrations have been issued to FBOs.

# **Enforcement Activities**

In order to keep surveillance over such articles of food which can be potentially harmful to the health of the customers, the Department keeps vigil by way of lifting 'Surveillance Samples', and also lifts 'Formal Samples' on the basis of complaints received from the public or as part of the routine vigil, and takes action against defaulters/violators of FSS Act and Rules/Regulations made there under.

- 1. During the current year 2019-2020, 2114 formal samples and out of which 374 samples were found not conforming to the safety standards laid down under the FSS Act, 2006 and Rules/Regulations 2011
- 2. A number of 1282 surveillance samples were lifted.

# Emergent ground level task during COVID-19

The Department has also actively continued this process during **COVID-19** lock—down period from March to June 2020. Designated Officers and Food Safety Officers were performing their duties with District Task Force and under the provision of Disaster Management Act 2005 with respective District Magistrate of the Revenue District , concerning for prevention of spread of **CORONA Various** (COVID -19) in all over GNCT, Delhi on war footing basis.

In Continuation of Awareness programmes during this year initiated among General public to Eat healthy, Eat safe and Fortified Food as follows:-

➤ Department organized 26 awareness programmes at different girls and women's hostels of various institutions i.e. University Colleges and working women hostels across NCT of Delhi about Anemia under Poshan Abhiyan and more than 2000 participants were sensitized and made aware about Anemia.

- > FSSAI provided three Food Safety of wheels and 283 food samples were lifted and checked on the spot.
- Four trainees were shortlisted for the purpose of imparting training of Food handlers under (FOStac) and during the period 13 training hld and 1261 food handlers were trained.
- > 56 FBOs were directed for implementation of RUCO (Repurpose use cooking oil) for disposal of cooking oil which has become unfit and unsafe for re-use.

The Department remains committed to ensure availability of safe and wholesome food to the citizens of Delhi by implementing the provisions of FSS Act and Rules/ Reglaions made there under in the letter and spirit.
